The new library will complete the master plan of public libraries developed by Joseph K. Wheeler, of the Baltimore Public Library, and Robert Orr, director of the Grosse Pointe Library.

It will supplement the Park Branch, located in the Pierce Junior High School building, and the Woods Branch, located in the Parcells Junior High School Building.

Preliminary plans for the library have been approved by the Board of Education and Ferry. Final plans will be published in THE REVIEW within several weeks.

Contracts for the new building are scheduled to be let before Labor Day.



ity. Mr. Ferry has shown a keen interest in our library from its earliest beginnings. The origin and growth of the library may be well-known to the old-timers but we sketch briefly here some of the highlights of this growth to acquaint more recent Point-

ers of our background. The Grosse Pointe Public Library was originally a branch of the Wayne County Library under the direction of birs. 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



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
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
