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DRUG HABIT

This is a good time to reprint some remarks concerning economic controls that were made several months ago by Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston in testimony given before a Congressional joint committee.

"I must say right now," said Mr. Johnston, "that wage and price controls will not be effective for long. It is essential that we begin to cure the reasons why we have to put wage and price controls into effect. The main objective of economic stabilization is to secure a stable dollar and by that we mean, of course, the stable purchasing power of the dollar.

"It is easential that we preserve freedom in this country, which means that we should get rid of wage and price controls at the earliest practical moment." Mr. Johnston then went on to say that it is absolutely vital that we balance the budget, restore confidence in the dollar, and control the supply of credit.

There are two basic dangers in price and other controls. One is that the people

will gradually drift into the idea that these artificial restrictions on the normal functioning of the economy are a permanent necessity - just as the drug addict drifts into abject dependence on dope. Many of the politicians, who always want more and more power for power's own sake, encourage that kind of thinking.

The second danger is that we will fall for the fallacy that price controls are actually a cure for the disease that is inflation — where, actually, they treat only certain symptoms and don't even do that very effectively. The current uproar over the meat situation is a good example. The controllers have tried, in effect, to repeal the natural law of supply and demandand the result is scarcity, growing black markets, and the probability of failing production.

Mr. Johnston was right-if we are to remain a free, strong and progressive nation, price and wage controls must be abandoned at the earliest possible time.

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

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

Pre-Inductees May Enlist in Marines

Young men who have taken their pre-induction examination or who have received orders for that examination may now be enlisted in the Marine Corps, it was announced by Capt. Welby W. Cronk, officer in charge of Marine recruiting in Michigan.

Previously men who had their pre-induction orders ordinarily could not be accepted for enlistment in the Marines.

This special recruiting program, starting June 15, will end on July 15, 1951.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PARAGRAPHS 2.01 AND 2.02. SECTION II—DISTRICTS, PARAGRAPH 4.06, SECTION IV-RESIDENCE DISTRICTS, AND TO ADD PARA-GRAPH 4.06(A) TO SAID SECTION IV OF ORDINANCE NO 80 ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRADES AND INDUS-TRIES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DE-SIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE HEIGHT AND BULK OF BUILDINGS HEREAFTER ERECTED, TO REGULATE AND DE-TERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS, COURTS, AND OTHER OPEN SPACES, TO LIMIT AND RESTRICT THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF FAMILIES WHICH MAY BE HOUSED IN DWELLINGS HEREAFTER ERECTED OR ALTERED AND FOR SAID PURPOSES DIVIDE THE VILLAGE (NOW CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS) INTO DISTRICTS, TO PROVIDE A METHOD OF AD-MINISTRATION. AND TO PRESCRIBE THE RENAL-TIES FOR THE VOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms Ordains:

Section 1. Paragraphs 2.01 and 2.02 of Section II-Districts, Paragraph 4.06 of Section IV-Residence Districts, of Ordinance No. 80 entitled An Ordinance to Regulate and Restrict the Location of Trades and Industries and the Location of Buildings Designed for Specified Uses, to Regulate and Limit the Height and Bulk of Buildings Hereafter Erected, to Regulate and Determine the Area of Yards, Courts and Other Open Spaces, to Limit and Restrict the Maximum Number of Families which may be Housed in Dwellings Hereafter Erected or Altered and for Said Purposes Divide the Village into Districts, to Provide a Method of Administration, and to Prescribe the Penalties for the Violation of its Provisions, and to Repeal Ordinance No. 34 as Amended, are hereby amended and new paragraph 4.06(A) added to said Section IV to read as follows:

SECTION II - DISTRICTS

2.81 Districts. For the purpose of this ordinance the City (formerly Village) of Grosse Pointe Farms is hereby divided into the following districts:

> Residence A Districts; Residence B Districts: Local Business Districts; Commercial Districts; Parking Districts.

2.02 Boundaries of Districts. The boundaries of said districts, shown upon the map attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance, are hereby established, said man being designated as the "1948 ZONING MAP REVISED," and said map and all notations, references and other information shown thereon shall be as much a part of this ordinance as if the matter and information set forth by said map were all fully described herein.

SECTION IV — RESIDENCE DISTRICTS

4.06. Area. In Residence A Districts no private dwelling. together with its accessory buildings, shall be hereafter erected or used on any lot having an area of less than five thousand (5000) square feet and with a width of not less than fifty (50) feet; provided that this requirement shall not apply to any lot which at the time this ordinance becomes effective is narrower at the street line or lesser in area than the specifications herein provided if such lot was of record on November 14, 1948.

4.06(A). In Residence B Districts no private dwelling, together with its accessory buildings, shall be hereafter erected or used on any lot having an area of less than ten thousand (10000) square feet and with a width of not less than seventyfive (75) feet; provided that this requirement shall not apply to any lot which at the time this ordinance becomes effective is narrower at the street line or lesser in area than the specifications herein provided if such lot was of record on November

Section II This ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall be effective upon adoption hereof.

Called to order at 8:00 p.m.

Present on roll call: Councilmen Daniel W. Goodenough, William G. Kirby, Richard L. Maxon, Neil S. McEachin and George L. Schlaepfer.

Absent: Mayor William F. Connolly, Jr., and Councilman John M. S. Hutchinson.

Mayor pro tem Richard L. Maxon presided.

The Council honored the following three Korean veterans Sergeant Martin G. Beer-269 Grosse Pointe Blvd. Corporal William J. Ryan, Jr.-225 Muir Road.

Seaman Donald F. Piche-355 Hillcrest Road. The Engineer was authorized to contract for the removal of certain trees to the extent of the unexpended balance in the budget account.

The following two extras were approved as an addition to the Public Works garage contract.

(a) Roof in an area between the new garage and existing Sewer Station. (b) Make repairs to roof of Sewer Station. The total

cost of both extras estimated at about \$500.00. The Engineer reported that the owners of the Punch & Judy Block on Kercheval between Fisher and McKinlev had deposited sufficient money to repair damaged sidewalk in the area.

The Engineer reported that analysis of daily samples of the water at the City Pier showed the water safe for swimming.

Acting on a complaint of Moran Road residents, the Public Works Committee reported that it had requested the bus company to reduce speed of buses on Moran Road, and the Engineer had taken steps to smooth out pavement joints. The committee's action was approved.

The Council discussed certain phases of the fence ordinance and instructed the Engineer to eliminate a specific violation and ordered the fence ordinance reviewed by the Engineering Committee and Attorney.

The Council meeting was adjourned to permit the Council to sit as a Board of Appeals on proposed sign for the Mack Avenue Kroger store following which the meeting continued:

A vote of appreciation was extended to the Engineer, Murray M. Smith, and the Assistant Engineer, Sidney DeBoer, on the occasion of their twenty-fifth anniversary in the employ

A proposal to trade manpower between the City of Grosse Pointe and the Farms was removed from unfinished business on the basis that no feasible plan could be found at present.

The Council received a communication from Mr. George Elworthy, Director of Civil Defense, advising that Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe Shores had withdrawn from the central organization. The Council instructed Mr. Elworthy to continue to make every effort to maintain a central Civil Defense along and commanded him for the progress report Defense plan and commended him for the progress report

At the request of the Pier-Park concessionaire, the Council eliminated a 10% building depreciation clause in the agree-

A special audit for settlement of the Township assets due the Farms was approved.

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial committee was given approval to stage a fireworks display at the War Memorial Center in connection with its Carnival to be held June 23, 1951. Renewal of workmen's compensation coverage with the Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company of Wisconsin

Fire insurance coverage provided on the new Public Works garage and concession was approved.

The Finance Committee was asked to study and report on all insurance carried by the City.

A public hearing was held on proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance which would create the requirement of wider lots and greater lot area in certain districts. No citizens appeared either for or against the proposed amendment and it was unanimously adopted by the Council, Publication appears elsewhere in this paper.

A request for an adjustment of a large water bill was denied after hearing the report that the meter was found to be registering correctly.

A request for re-zoning of a parcel of land on Moross Road immediately in the rear of the business frontage was deferred pending receipt of a fovorable report for re-zoning from the residents in the area. The Engineer submitted a complete report on the progress

hearing to determine responsibility for the use of Fox Creek as a drainage outlet.

The City's jail was reported found in excellent condition on inspection made May 22, 1951, by the State Inspector.

Bids on new scout cars were ordered retaken after a reported misunderstanding of the specifications.

The Brown Investment Company's request for permission to construct three homes on Kerby Road, prior to formal approval of its proposed plat of the Ridge Ton Subdivision No. 2, was denied, however, tentative approval was given the proposed plat.

The request for an option to purchase the City-owned property at the northwest corner of Chalfonte and Moran, for the sum of \$3,000.00, was tabled pending appraisals by local

A special notice to be included with the 1951 City tax hills due for payment July 1, 1951, was ordered printed.

A resolution of sympathy was extended to the family of Kenneth L. Moore who died on June 11, 1951.

The meeting adjourned at 11:00 p.m
