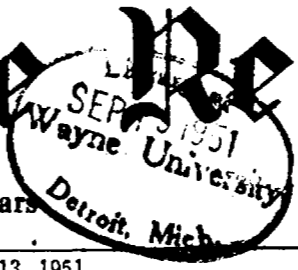

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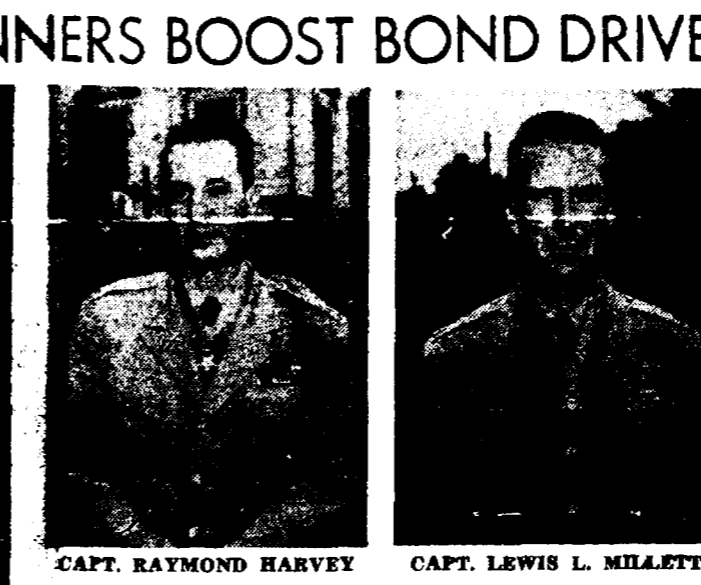
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To Broadcast Vet Program

SEALED BIDS for the purchase of Special Assessment Roll No. 77 Improvement Bonds of a par value of forty-four thousand (\$44,000.00) dollars, to be issued by the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan, will be received by the undersigned at the Municipal Building, until 8:30 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on September 25, 1951, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated September 1st, 1951, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 44 both inclusive, will bear interest from their date at a rate, or rates, not exceeding 5% per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1%, said interest will be payable on March 1st, 1952, and semi-annually thereafter on September 1st and March 1st. The interest rate for each coupon period of any one bond shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by purchaser at time of delivery.

The Special Assessment Roll No. 77 Improvement Bonds will mature serially without option of prior payment: \$4,000.00 on September 1, 1951 and \$5,000.00 September 1st each year 1953-1950 both inclusive.

Both principal and interest will be payable at the Detroit Trust Company, in the City of Detroit, Michigan.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from October 1, 1951 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the City. Each bidder shall state in his bid the interest cost to the City computed in the manner above specified. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds, or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

These bonds are to be issued pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 10 of the City Charter, in anticipation of the collection of City of Grosse Pointe Woods Special Assessment Roll No. 77, and will pledge the full faith and credit of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods for the payment of the principal and interest when due.

A certified or cashier's check in an amount of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company, and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks or unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative, or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, which opinion will be furnished, without expense, to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof approving the legality. The purchaser shall furnish bonds ready for execution at his expense. Bonds will be delivered at the Detroit Trust Company, Detroit, Michigan, or such other place as may be agreed upon with the purchaser.

Four hundred eighty-seven eager young people came to the Richard School on the opening day ready to begin the 1951-52 school year of challenging and enriching experiences. They were met by 17 staff members; the secretary, Mrs. Laux; three custodians, Mr. Post, Mr. Schmidt, Mr. McCrossin; and their principal, Mr. Messner.

Twelve former members of the teaching staff returned from vacations, restful and relaxing in nature and professionally inspiring. The most distant traveler was Miss Norris, who visited with her brother's family in British Honduras. Miss Blank toured the Snokey Mountain area. Miss Nault was on our own Grosse Pointe summer school faculty. Miss Tomb attended a series of educational programs at Chataqua, New York.

Several of the staff enjoyed the outdoors at their cottages in the Michigan north country. Mrs. Ayres at Hess Lake near New-Age, Mrs. Dombrowski at Bear Lake near Lewiston; and Miss Bockes at Mullet Lake. Several spent most of the time in the city, attending the 250th anniversary celebration activities and enjoying the pleasantries of the metropolitan area offers.

The Messners camped, hiked, canoeed and photographed in the Michigan wilderness and he participated in two scientific natural history surveys parties. He helped a group headed by Dr. Van Tyne of the University of Michigan Museums in a population survey in Crawford County of the very rare bird, the Kirtland's warbler. The organization of the school for the new year is as follows: Mrs. Arends and Mrs. Kyriat guide three kindergarten sections, with Mrs. Kyriat being a half day only at Richard; Miss McCormick, Miss Kerr and Mrs. Drew in grade one; Miss Norris, Miss Roberson and Mrs. Drew in grade two; Miss Bourg, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Stringer in grade three; Mrs. Dombrowski, Miss Tomb and Mrs. Stringer in grade four; Miss Blank, Miss Nault and Mr. Mabon in grade five; and Miss Bockes and Mrs. Schwaller in grade six.

Mrs. Drew has a combination class of grades one-two. Mrs. Stringer has a combination three-four. Miss Bockes has a 6B-6A. Besides these staff members our school is served by a vocal music teacher, an instrumental music teacher, counselors in music, art and physical education, a speech correctionist, a visiting teacher, and a nurse.

The entire staff extends a most cordial welcome to the parents of the children to visit at any time.

VA Hospital Needs Aides

Ask Support of All for Bond Drive

Support for the recently initiated bond drive for the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds was urged this week by Congressman Louis C. Rabaut.

The Bond Drive received a nationwide send-off in ceremonies at Grand Rapids in connection with a Labor Day celebration jointly sponsored by the A. F. of L., the C. I. O., and the Railroad Brotherhoods. Headline speakers were Michigan's Governor Wilson, Mennen Williams and Treasury Secretary John Snyder who introduced President Truman on a five-network national hook-up.

"The popular payroll savings plan is a systematic saving method enjoyed today by more Americans than at any time since World War II," said Rabaut.

The Congressman declared that timely payroll savings plans help in the fight against inflation "by helping to reduce the tremendous supply of consumer purchasing power now straining the economy."

"Widespread purchases of savings bonds by the people of America is the democratic way to carry the national debt," he said. "Savings bonds are an investment in the future of America with a rate of return that is measured as much in the value of our free democratic institutions as in dollar-and-cent interest payments."

The current bond drive will end on the 27th of October and Congressman Rabaut urged "all Americans to do their part in supporting the fortress of democracy that is America."

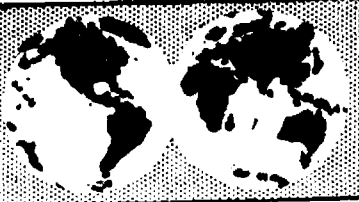

ORE FROM COUNTRY OF EX-SLAVES AIDS U. S. DEFENSE

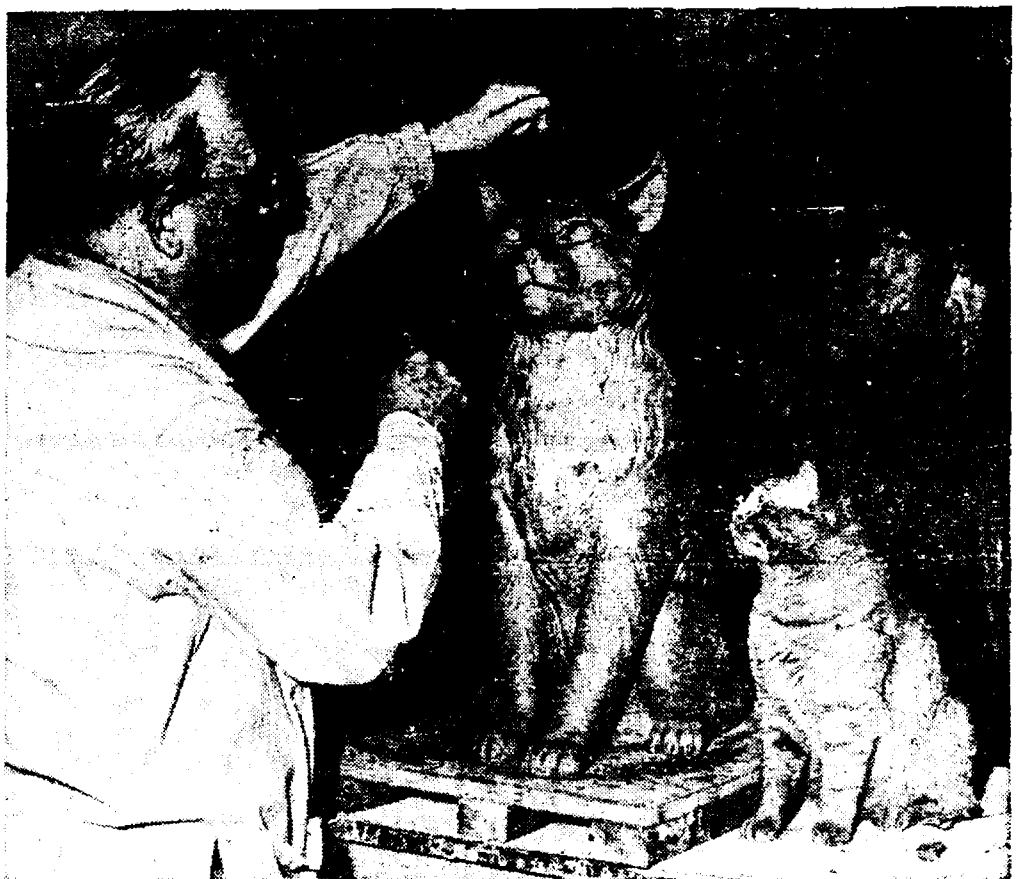


Ore mined in the Bomi hills of Liberia is high grade, assaying nearly 70 per cent iron.

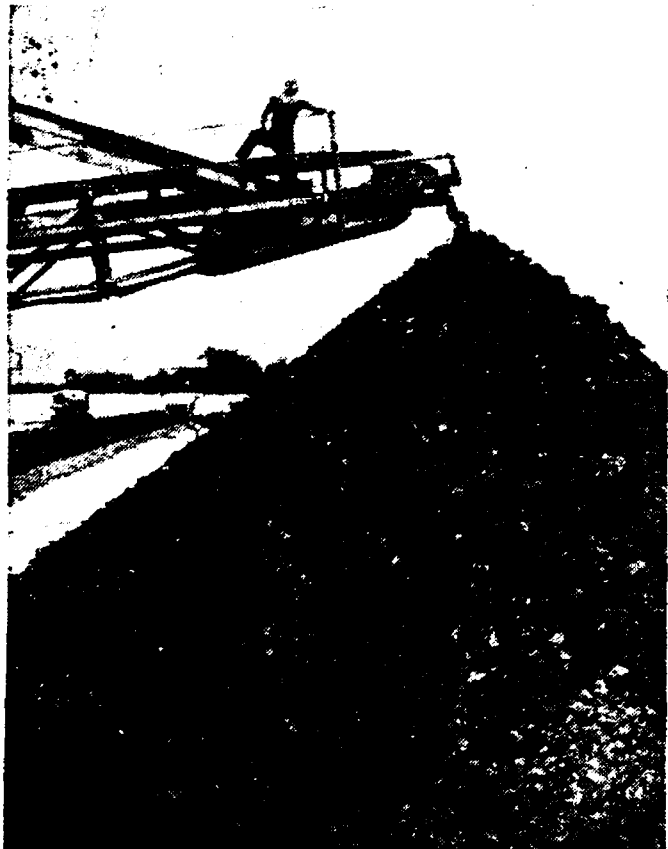
LIBERIA, founded with the aid of American colonization societies by ex-slaves from the southern states in 1822, now aids this nation's defense effort by producing vital iron ore for America's hungry steel mills. Most of the ore comes from the Bomi hills area, about 45 miles northeast of the seaport of Monrovia, capital of the West African country. The valuable ore deposits were discovered during World War II, when Liberia was a valuable Allied base. After the war, production of ore was promoted by Republic Steel corporation.



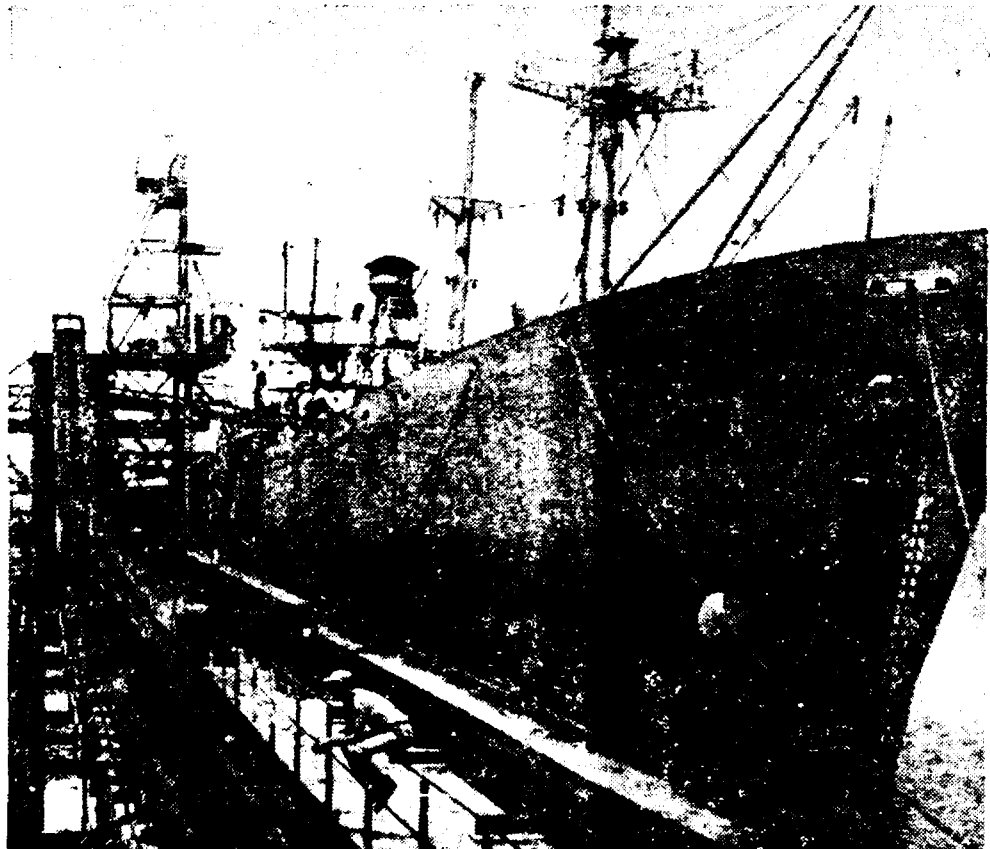
Found in huge masses, ore is blasted to this size for furnaces.
