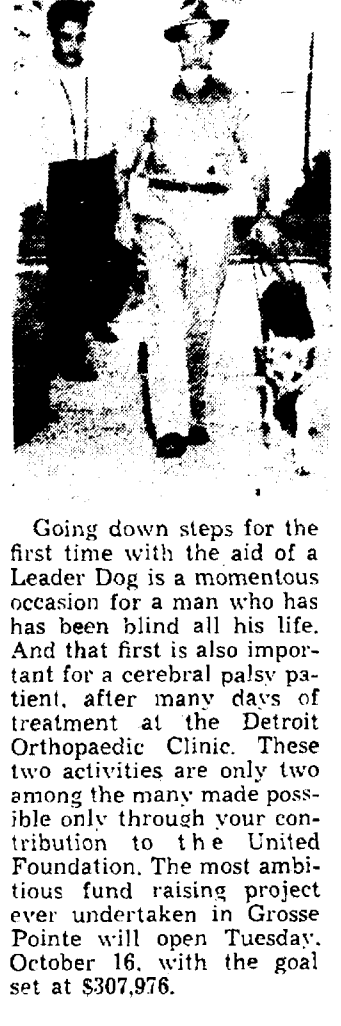
Arraigned On Complaint

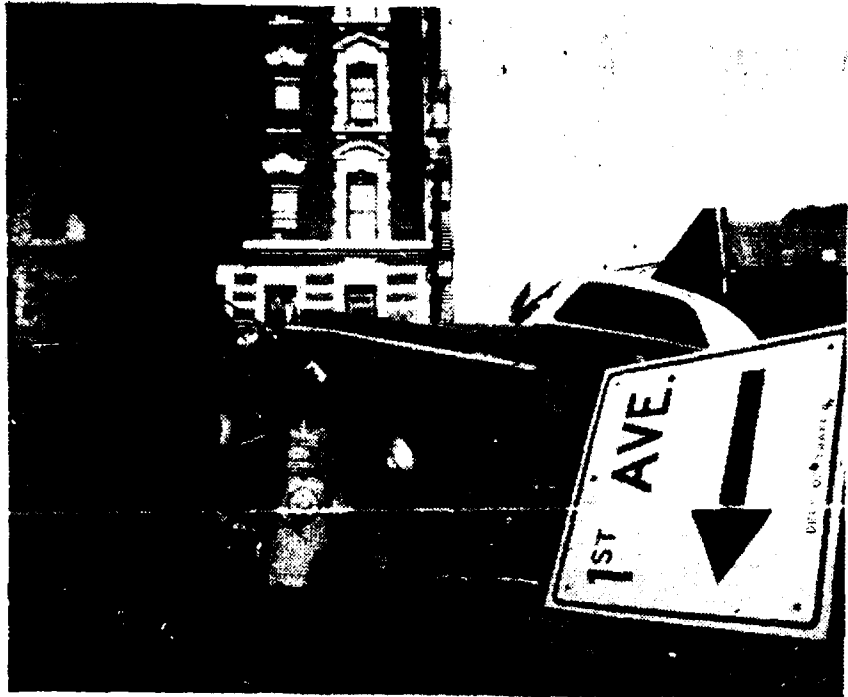
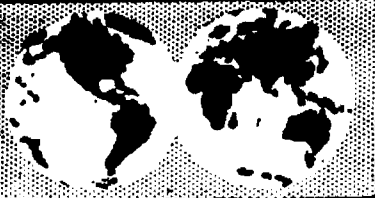
