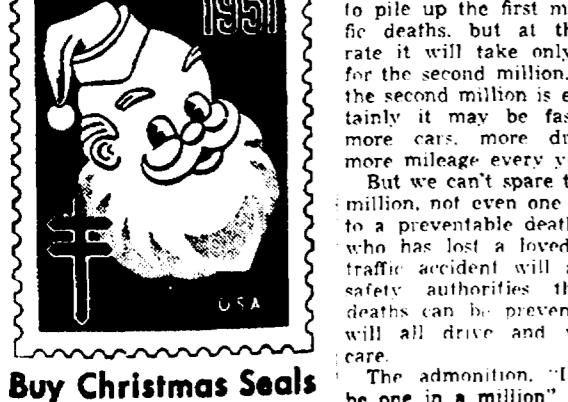

#### Quarterly Report From Board Indicates Rate Will Increase in '52

# DUS Cops Championship in Suburban Conference

Ending up the 1951 football season on a field of half snow, half mud, the D.U.S. footballers were guests at Bloomfield Hills. The game meant a great deal to D.U.S. for if they won it, they would become Conference Champions, and they would also be undefeated in league play.

D.U.S. won the toss, and elected to receive. The first two plays from scrimmage ended in penalties for D.U.S., before Dave Rentschler and Don Ohmart hit the left side for eleven yards each. Dave Wark then fumbled, but only lost a down, as he recovered it at scrimmage line. Rentschler and Ohmart produced gains of 2 to 6 yards respectively, before Becherer punted to the Bloomfield 23. Two penalties followed, each for 5 yards, one against D.U.S. for holding, and the other against Bloomfield for offsides.

Bloomfield then punted themselves out of trouble, Garbutt receiving the ball on his own 40, and returning it 20 yards to the Bloomfield 40. Once again D.U.S. was penalized, this time twice, 15 yards for holding, and 5 more for offsides, before Rentschler hit left tackle for 4. Another D.U.S. penalty, and an incomplete pass followed, before Rentschler hit Becherer with a pass good for 26 yards. Dave was stopped cold at scrimmage, but Ohmart made steady gains of 3 and 5 yards over center.

Becherer then punted to the Bloomfield 10, from where it was returned to the 18. Bloomfield then suffered a 15 yard penalty for illegal use of hands, moving the ball back to the 3. Dick Bingham, playing defensive left end, crashed through and recovered a Bloomfield fumble in the end zone for a touchdown, his first of the year. Birgbauer's extra point kick fell short, so D.U.S. was six points closer to the championship.

Becherer then kicked off to Bloomfield, and after some nice line play by tackle Tom Mackey, and the end of the first quarter, Bloomfield punted to Garbutt standing on his own 18, and he returned the ball to the 26. D.U.S. really looked strong, for Rentschler ran right end for 12. Brown hit center for 1, Ohmart smashed left tackle for gains of 2, 4, and 8 yards, Wark hurdled left guard for 8, Becherer scooted over right guard for gains of 12 and 2 yards, and Rentschler then outran his opponents around right end for 6 more. However, on the next play, the familiar red flag appeared on the field, and D.U.S. was penalized 15 yards for holding.

Rentschler picked up a second left end, and on the next play fumbled, but an ever-alert Krajenke, D.U.S. center, picked up the fumble, and two yards. Bloomfield took over, and strong line play by D.U.S., featured by Stalker, Krajenke, and Mackey forced a hurried Bloomfield pass which Becherer intercepted on the Bloomfield 40, and returned it to the 25, before he was dropped by four eager Bloomfield tacklers.

Penalties once more plagued the D.U.S. eleven, and then a pass by Rentschler was intercepted. Dave, reciprocating, intercepted a Bloomfield pass on the Bloomfield 42, and returned it to the 19. Dave then swept right end for 5, with a D.U.S. penalty following on the next play, nullifying a touchdown. However, a pass from Rentschler to Brown was good for 15, moving the ball to the 4, from where Ohmart fought his way over for the second D.U.S. touchdown, Birgbauer's extra point kick was good, and D.U.S. had quite a substantial lead—13 points. Becherer had just enough time to get his second kickoff away before the half-time gun sounded.

The third quarter started off quite slowly, but picked up momentum at the halfway point. Stalker, Jaglowicz, and Kornfefer were showing some exceptional line play, and Bingham, playing his usual bang-up game at defensive left end, is not to be overlooked. However, Bingham had some rough luck at about the time D.U.S. started to roll again. He got his nose in the way of an unexpected toe, and was forced to leave the game for good.

D.U.S. took over on its own 49 yard line, and their offensive strength fared well. Two passes by Rentschler fell incomplete before Dave hit Garbutt for an 8 yard gain, and then followed with another one to Bruce, this

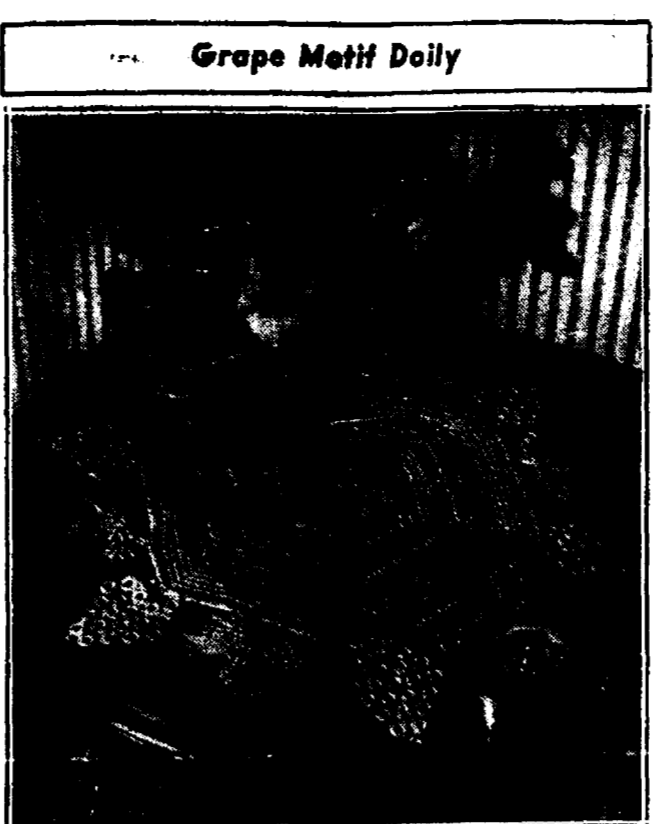

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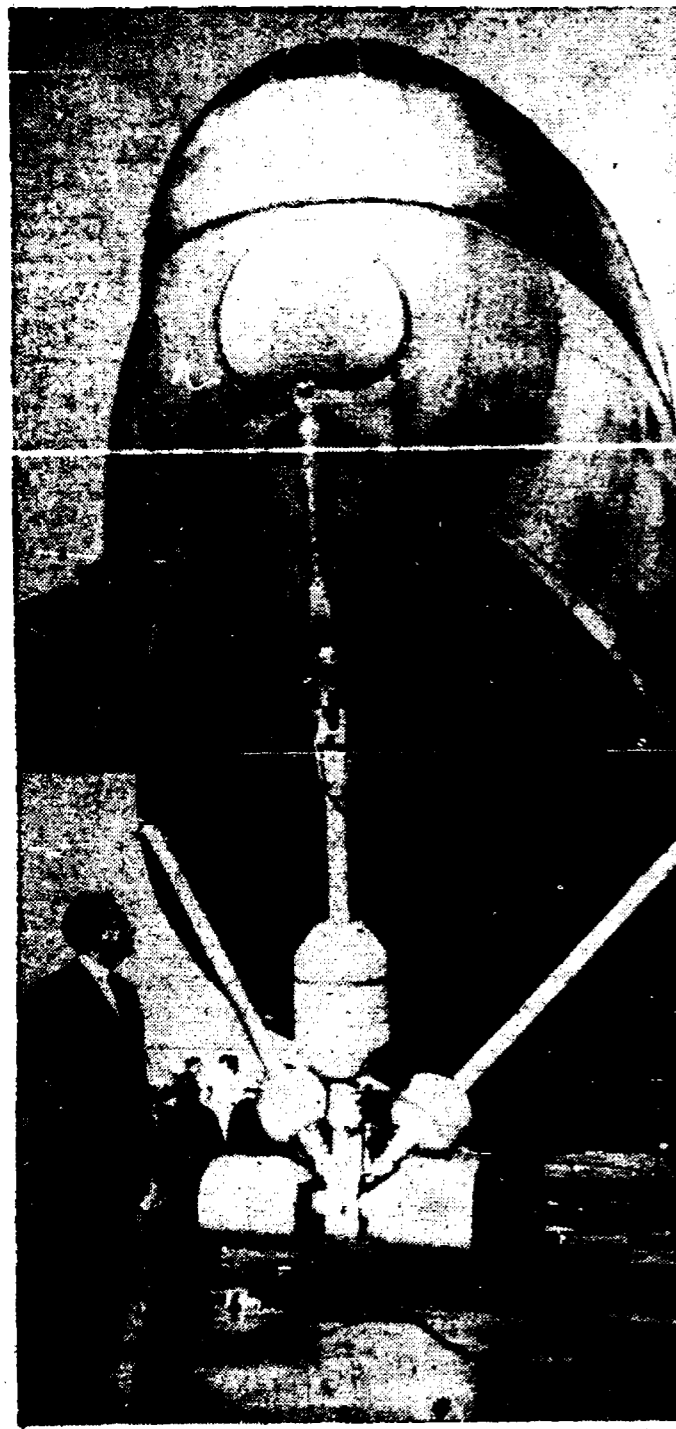

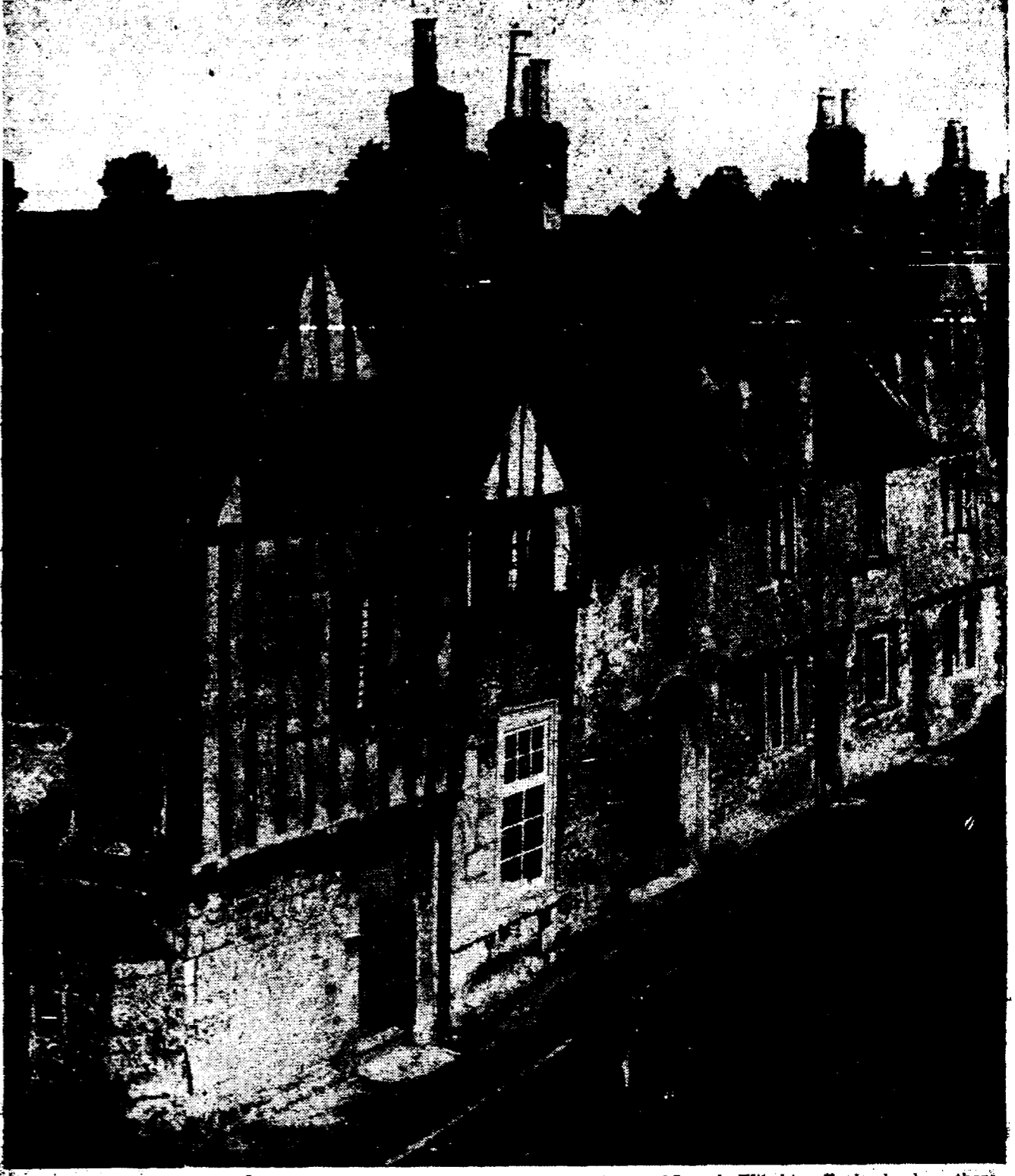

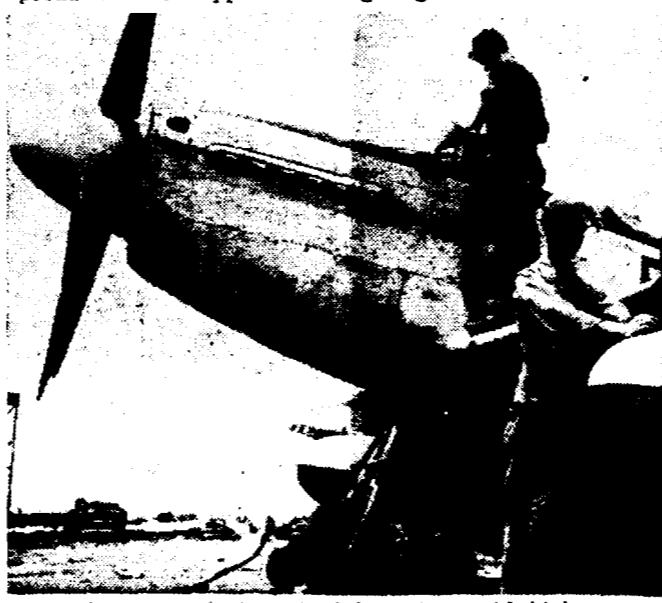

## 'OIL, BEANS AND BULLETS'

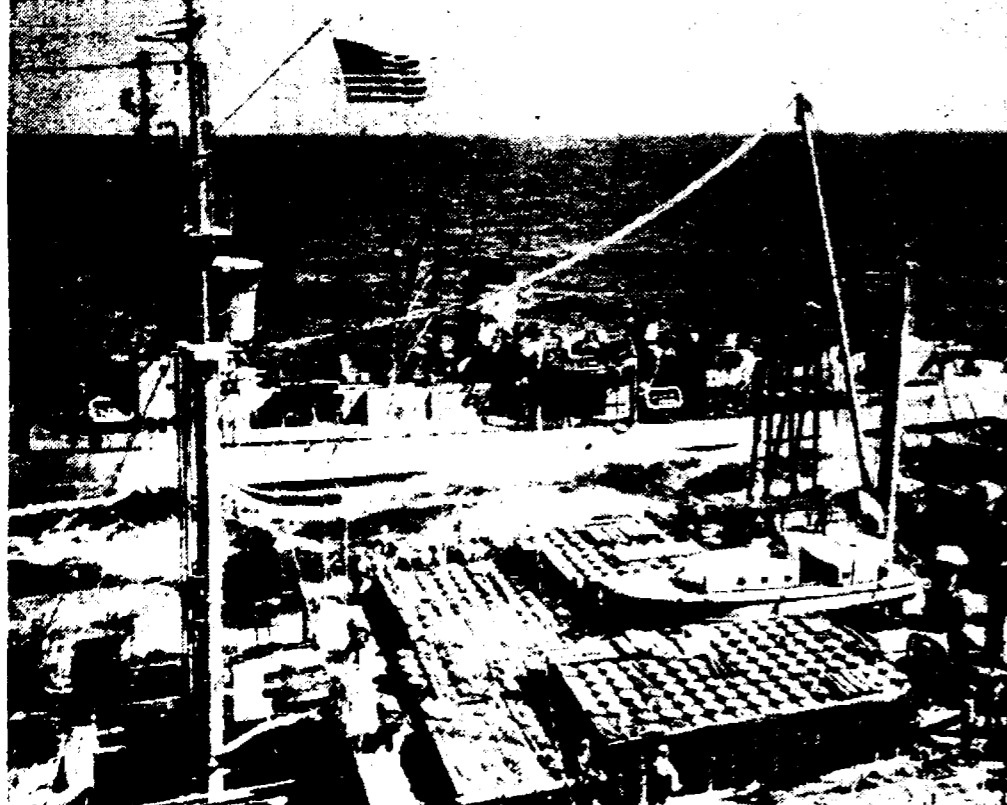
**"THE WAR WAS WON** on oil, beans and bullets," said Adm. Chester W. Nimitz at the end of World War II. These three commodities again are playing a major role in a fight for freedom. They have united to aid United Nations land, air and sea forces in the struggle against Communist aggressors in Korea. The accompanying photos show how oil products are helping to win that struggle. Without oil, today's military force would be stripped of all its striking power. Tanks, ships, planes and other mechanized weapons and equipment are immobilized if a sufficient amount of oil is not available. A military plane burns almost 1,000 gallons of high octane gasoline in an hour. In the first year of the Korean war, it is estimated, some 50 million barrels of oil products were shipped to the fighting front from America.
