"During the past training week-end, men from the southeast corner of the state gathered at Selfridge Air Force Base for on-the-job training in their specialties. Most are veterans, but we are and will continue to train men without prior service," he added. "Since its adoption in August, the 929th has gradually pulled ahead of the other reserve wings. This is due mainly to the fine response of people interested in the program and some very intense preparation by the parent organization, the 2242nd Air Force Reserve Training Center. We now feel that we have reached the front of the pack and we intend to stay there," concluded Col. Vidal.
Col. Vidal is presently the Labor Relations Director for the Hudson Motor Car Company. A former star footballer at West Point, he returned to inactive status following the last World War.

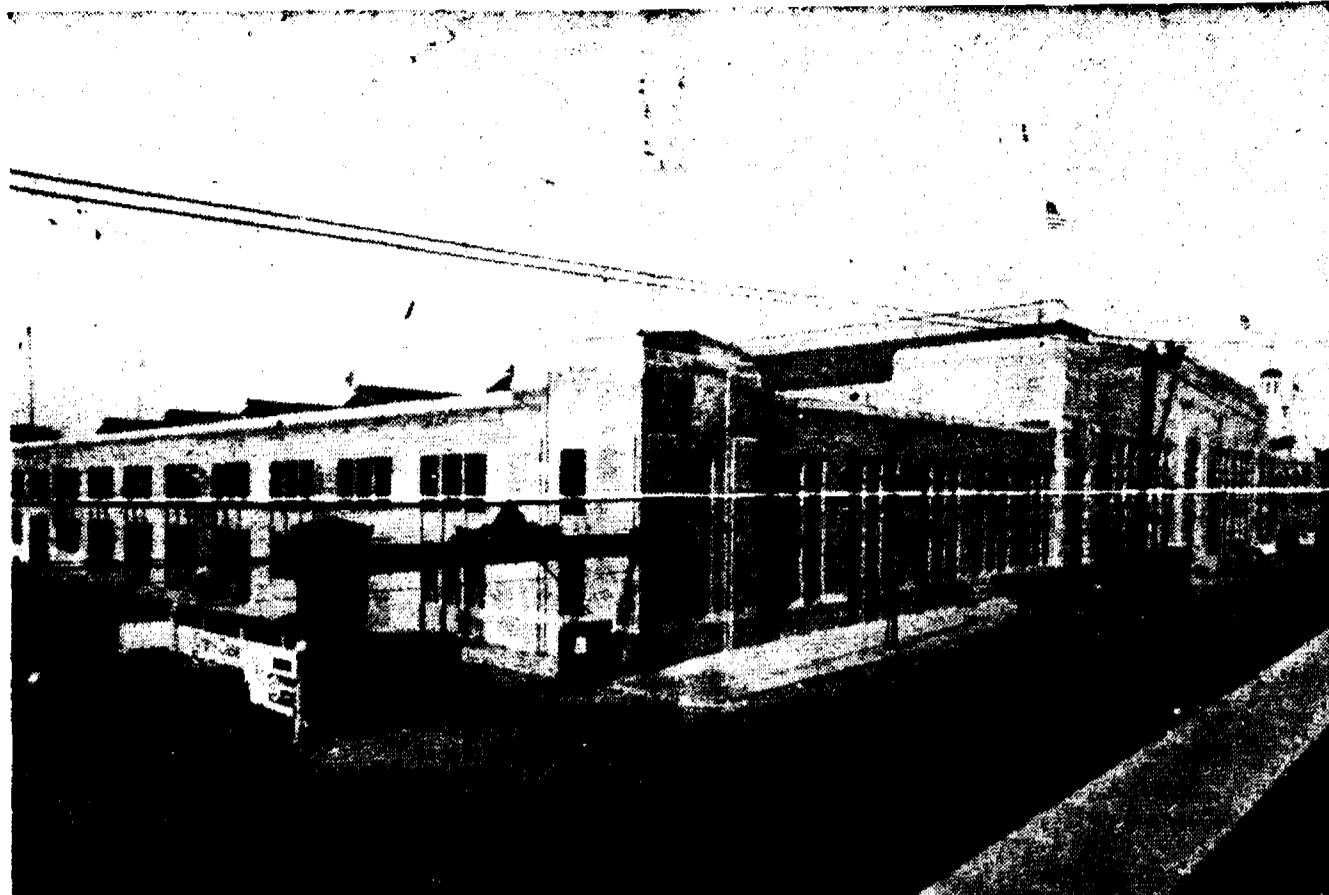

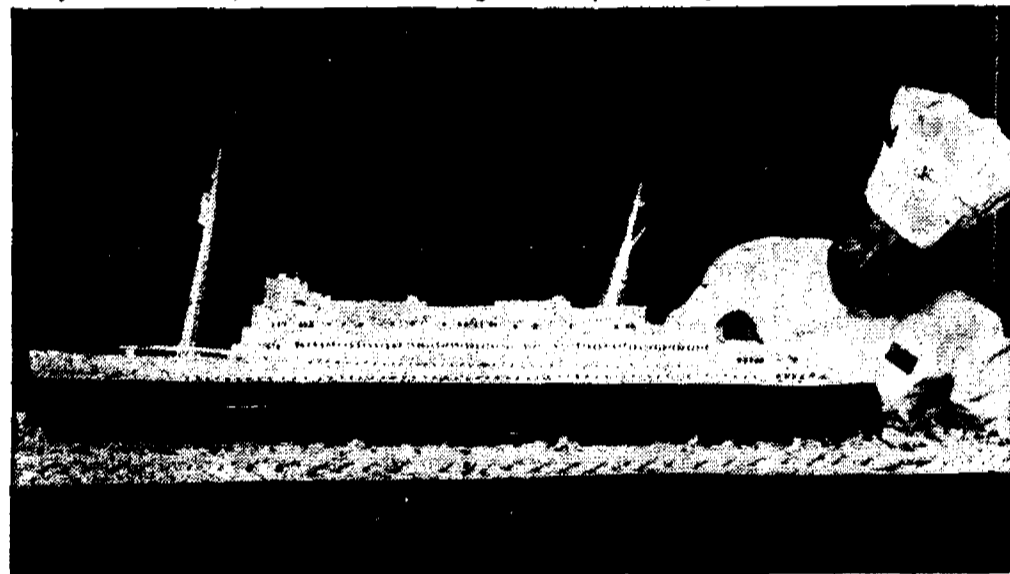

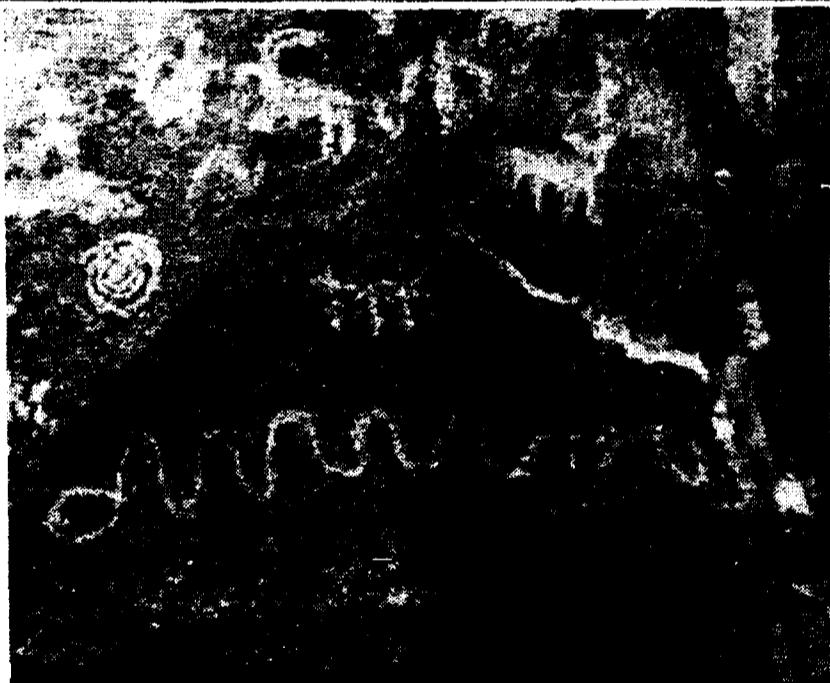

DID THEY UNCOVER A LOST CIVILIZATION?

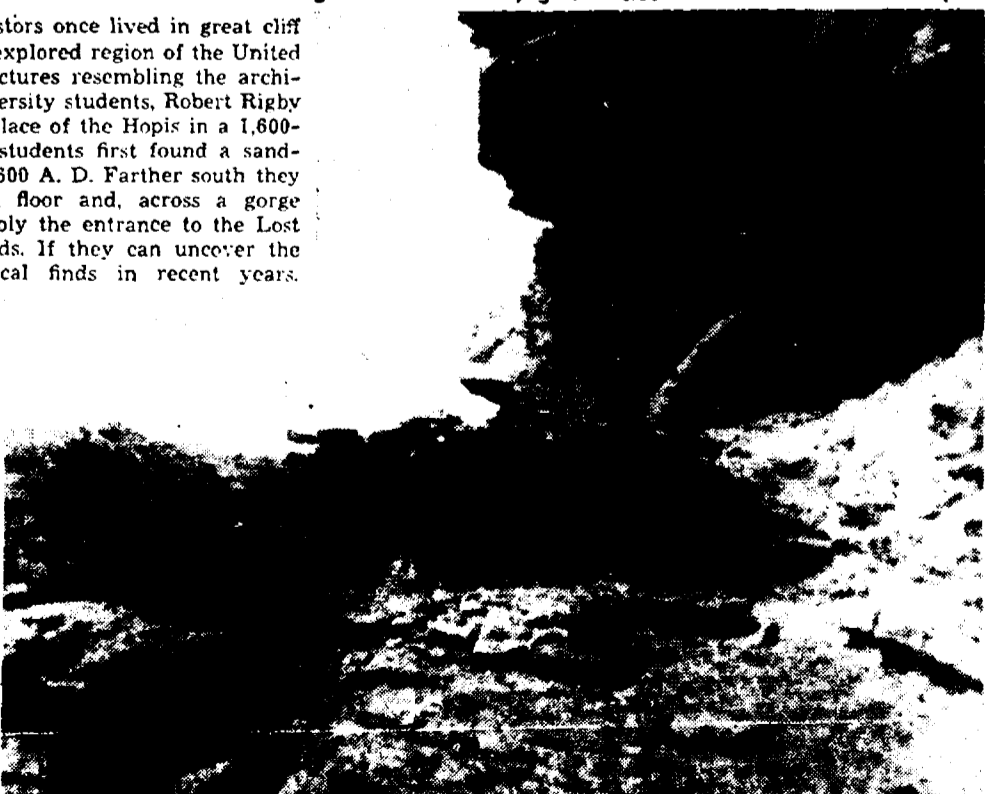


Rigby (right) and Erickson record the depth of some of the uncovered ruins. Picture writing on this rock may give a clue to the culture of the Hopis.

AMONG THE HOPI Indians there is a legend that their ancestors once lived in great cliff dwellings, now buried under tons of sandstone in some unexplored region of the United States. The Hopi believe these dwellings are seven-story structures resembling the architecture of the ancient Mayans. Just recently two Brigham university students, Robert Rigby and Einer Erickson, uncovered what may be the Lost Cliff Palace of the Hopis in a 1,600-square-mile wilderness near Moab in southeastern Utah. The students first found a sandstone cave containing pottery and arrowheads dating back to 600 A. D. Farther south they examined an ancient burial crypt 400 feet above the canyon floor and, across a gorge blocked by tons of fallen sandstone, they saw a cave—probably the entrance to the Lost Cliff Palace, home of the ancient civilization of the Hopi legends. If they can uncover the Lost Cliff Palace, it will be one of the greatest archeological finds in recent years.
