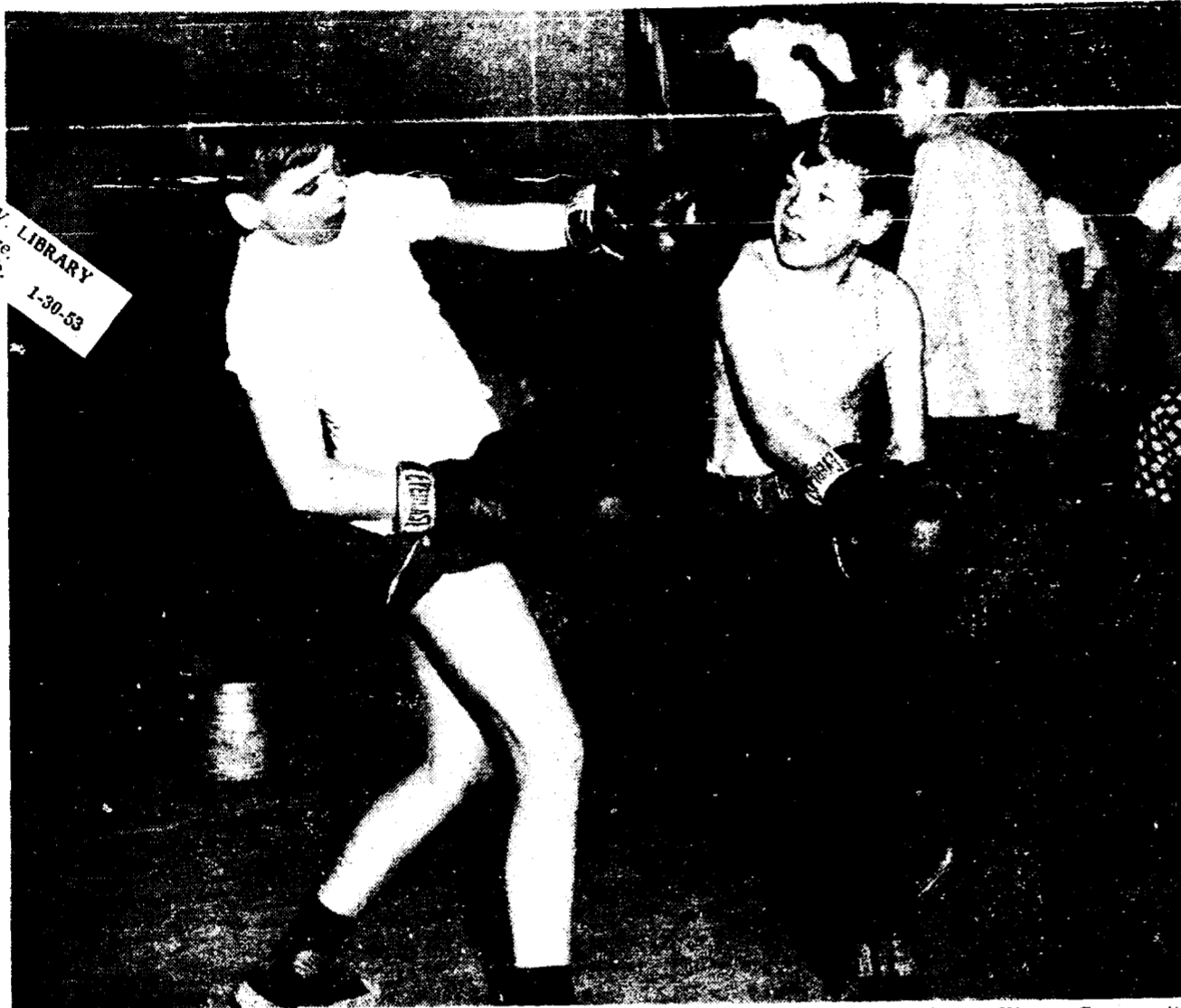
Ens. Dahling is a graduate of Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Government.

## Localite Compiling Vast Library on Space Flight

If you were to search Grosse Pointe for a young man with big ideas, it is hardly likely that you would run across such a fellow with bigger ideas than Harold M. Sadowski of 1453 Balfour.

You see, Harold is compiling a vast batch of statistics which he hopes will bring the day of interplanetary travel closer to realization.

**THE ASTRONAUTICAL LIBRARY**  
He and a friend, Norman Samet, are setting up a permanent library of rocket and space flight material for the use of rocket group researchers throughout the world. Harold's library is called the Astronautical Library.

**UNIQUE LIBRARY**  
The collection, as it stands, has taken over a year to assemble and is probably the most unique library of its kind in the world. Much of the material was collected from the organized rocket and space flight societies. Some of the organizations Harold tapped for information are: The Detroit Rocket Society, The Chicago Rocket Society, The Canadian Rocket Society, The British Rocket Society, The Reaction and Research Society of California, and the prominent German group, Nordwestdeutsche Gesellschaft Fur Weltraumforschung.

"My hope," Harold said, "is to someday have the most complete file of rocket materials in the world, one capable of supplying facts to any researcher who needs them."

"That's the reason I started working on this project. I was greatly distressed at the fact that material on rocketry and allied science is very scattered and difficult to use."

## Church Has Anniversary Appointment

Messiah Lutheran Church observed its fortieth anniversary on Sunday, January 27.

In August, 1911, it was called into being as an unorganized mission station, being known in its early days as the Fairview Lutheran Mission. On January 28, 1912, it was organized as Messiah Lutheran Church under the leadership of its first minister, Rev. C. H. Boye. The first pastor served the congregation for only about eight months, leaving immediately after Easter in 1912. He was followed in August, 1912, by the present pastor, A. H. A. Loeber, who since 1946 has been assisted by Pastor M. L. Martin.

Messiah Church is now at its third location. Its original little chapel stood at the corner of Kercheval and Hillier avenues. Early in 1915 it moved to Hart Avenue, between Jefferson and Kercheval. In October, 1924, it dedicated its present church building at the southeast corner of Kercheval and Lakewood. Four years ago it erected its Parish House at a cost of about \$115,000. The congregation observed its anniversary with two services of worship in the morning. Pastor Loeber delivered the Anniversary sermon. Under the direction of Theodore Albrecht, Messiah's Choir gave a sacred concert in the afternoon at 4 o'clock. At 5:30 p.m. the Ladies' Aid served a luncheon in the spacious Assembly Room of the Parish House. In the evening the religious film "All That I Have" was shown.

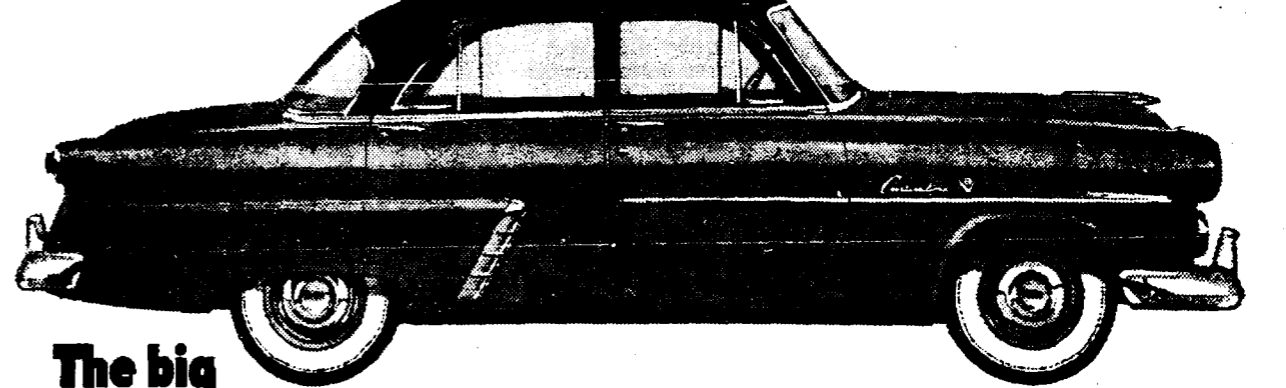

## Urge Program For Dutch Elm Disease

(This letter was written to the city council of Grosse Pointe and is herewith reprinted as written by Mrs. Harley G. Higbie.)

Grosse Pointe has an estimated value of over two million dollars worth of trees—75 to 90 per cent are Elm trees. They are in danger of devastation by Dutch Elm Disease—76 in this area have already been affected. While there is no cure, there are preventative measures that can be taken before it is too late.

Cleveland did not act in time—they had 186 trees affected in 1946; in 1950, 626 and in 1951, still more, making a total of over one thousand five hundred trees lost.

**Preventive Treatment**  
To neglect a program combating Dutch Elm Disease would involve the community in a greater expense at a later date and we would be minus the beautiful trees shading our streets. The preventative treatment is minor in cost compared to removal, burning and substitute planting; this disease can get out of hand if not treated properly.

**Urged by Owners**  
The Garden Council and Garden Center of Grosse Pointe have been urged by the thousand property owners whom they represent to arouse the interest of municipal leaders to see that some action is taken before March. Therefore, they have arranged a meeting with State, County and City experts to advise us on a suitable protection program.

Please give this careful consideration and attend the February 4th meeting at 8 o'clock at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.
