

Tomorrow is the 220th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. Estimates of Washington's contribution to this nation and to mankind are endless. His biographers are legion. Douglas Southall Freeman however, as a distinguished historian and

Those who have read volumes | Ballet Classes-Olga Fricker, Instructor one and two of Freeman's George Washington will be glad to know that the third and fourth are now available at your library.

The first two volumes carried Washington's story through his participation in the French and Indian War. 




