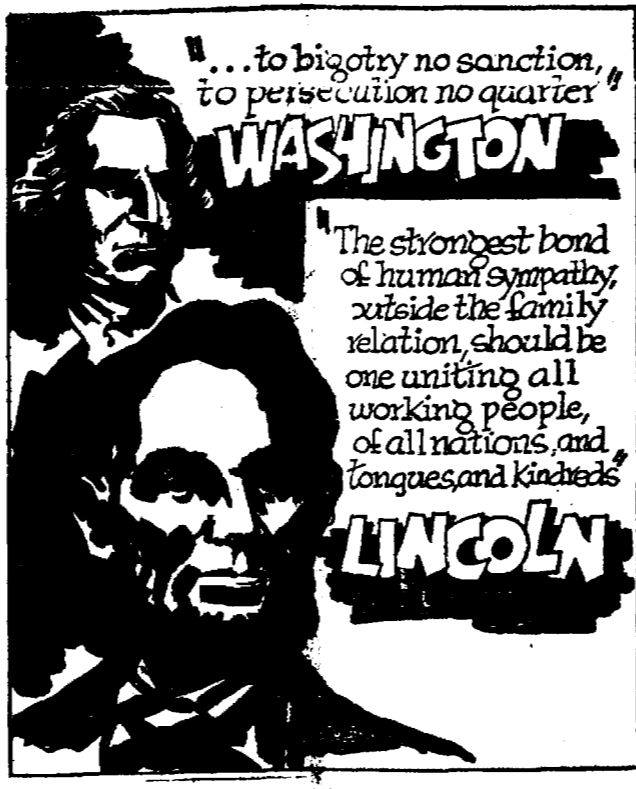

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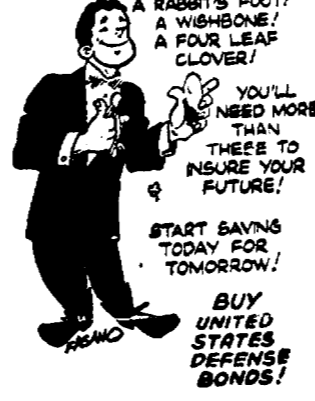

Tomorrow is the 220th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. Estimates of Washington's contribution to this nation and to mankind are endless. His biographers are legion. Douglas Southall Freeman however, as a distinguished historian and scholar, stands well above the crowd.

Those who have read volumes one and two of Freeman's *George Washington* will be glad to know that the third and fourth are now available at your library.

The first two volumes carried Washington's story through his participation in the French and Indian War. Those, recently published, cover a score of years. They begin with "his marriage to the rich young widow, Martha Dandridge Custis and his assumption of the life of a great planter. They end in the Spring of 1778, with the receipt by him, as Commander in Chief, of the news of the French Alliance which ushered the revolution into a fresh phase."

These mark the half-way point in this monumental project. Four more volumes are promised.

For the more casual reader, there is a recent one volume biography, *THE PRIVATE LIFE OF GEORGE WASHINGTON* by Francis Rufus Bellamy. From the title it might appear to be a debunking job but critics agree that the author neither glosses over the facts nor debunks.

That discussion, criticism and debate can be stifled by fear as well as by force was graphically brought home to the Friends of the Library group fortunate enough to hear Mr. Oswald Robbins review *THE FEAR OF FREEDOM* by Francis Biddle, Tuesday evening of last week.

When fear replaces confidence in a free society, the sources of its strength are greatly impaired. Mr. Biddle feels that many people, often with the best intentions, are blindly spreading just such fear. *THE FEAR OF FREEDOM* is a book to make you think. Call your library if you wish it reserved for you.

Are you interested in knowing more about the mysterious world of ticker tape? If so, be sure to attend the next group meeting of the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Library, Tuesday evening, February 26 at 8:30 p.m. in the Main Library.

Mr. Charles Parcells will discuss the why, what and how of investment. Mr. Parcells needs no introduction in Grosse Pointe. He follows in his father's footsteps both in his choice of profession and in his active interest in and loyalty to his community.

In his book *HOW TO LAY A NEST EGG*, Edgar Scott reminds us that in the United States 70 per cent of the nation's private wealth is controlled by women. Of all the stock holders in the United States 43 per cent are women. "So," says this author, and we quote "look up from your canasta, sister, and admit that you didn't know your own strength. In the workshops and market places of America, you are a big girl now. What are you going to do about it?"

We have the answer to that. If you would mingle confidently with the bulls and bears, bring your questions to Mr. Parcells next Tuesday evening. This talk is not primarily for the distaff side of the household, however. If the gentlemen are wise, they will be right there in the front row. Never underestimate the power of woman!

Sisters Plan For Broader Education

The Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, or the "I.H.M. Sisters," as they are generally referred to, have had, for some time, a broad educational program, the ultimate aim of which is to have each nun complete her college education before being sent out on her teaching career.

This move is in accordance with what was advocated by Pope Pius XII, in a recent address on the subject of education, in which he stated, in effect, teaching sisters and other educators should be so well prepared, and so equal to their task, and should be so well versed in problems with which youth comes in contact, or by which it is influenced, that it will be natural for the pupils to go to their teacher for the solution of their various difficulties.

Due to the shortage of teaching Sisters, and to lack of funds, many Orders have often had to send Sisters into the field before they could attain this desired status, and then have them complete their college courses over a period of years by means of summer school. This sort of program was too strenuous, and often detrimental to the health of the teachers.

The alternative, which has been the practice in recent years with this community, is to withdraw a certain number of the younger Sisters from the teaching field, and send them through college until they receive their degrees. This latter course is an expensive one, as it means that the community is not only deprived of the earning power of those in college, it has also to maintain the staff and buildings for this academic training.

A joint meeting was called between members of the auxiliary and a number of fathers and friends of the nuns with the result that it was agreed to do something to subsidize such a worthy cause.

It was decided that a sum of at least \$50,000 would be required to fill the present needs. An appeal is, therefore, being made to all of the friends of this great teaching order who have been conducting schools in this community for more than 100 years.

A committee has been appointed, and activities are well under way. Donation tickets have been issued and will be passed around to all known friends of the Order, or they may be obtained by calling TUXEDO 1-7500. The committee has arranged for a Friendship Party in the way of

a dance and other entertainment to be held at the Masonic Temple, April 19. A crowd of almost 5,000 is expected, and reservations should be made as soon as possible. "DRY" CLOTHES ARE STILL WET

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The Flood Control Valve is not a Backwater Valve nor Float Valve that fits in floor drain. Small particles of debris will not interfere with its operation.

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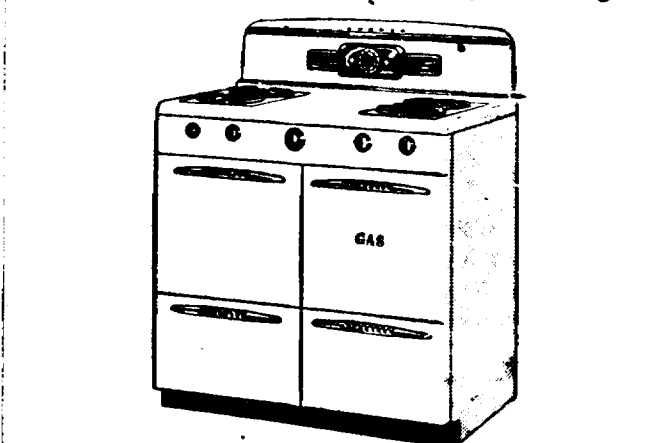
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Top Fashion Co-ordinators, Designers Will Be Judges for Review Design Contest

Army Honors General It Once Fought

WEST POINT, N. Y.—A moving footnote was written to American history Saturday. A general who once led the enemy was honored by the Army that he fought.
 A portrait of Robert E. Lee was unveiled in a place of honor at the United States Military Academy, showing for the first time at West Point a general wearing the Confederate uniform.
 JUST 57 YEARS ago this gray uniform and this general were the enemy of the United States Army in the nation's bitterest war.
 Now the scars of the Civil War have so faded that the Army could salute Lee as one of the nation's brilliant generals, a distinguished graduate and superintendent 100 years ago, of this military academy.
 Fittingly, Ulysses S. Grant, the general who respected Lee and beat him, was honored simultaneously. His portrait was moved from Culver Memorial Hall and hung across a great window from Lee's in the rotunda of the academy's ancient library.
 Three other portraits of Lee previously were hung here, but all showed him in the United States Army uniform of blue which he wore in the war with Mexico and against the Comanche Indians.

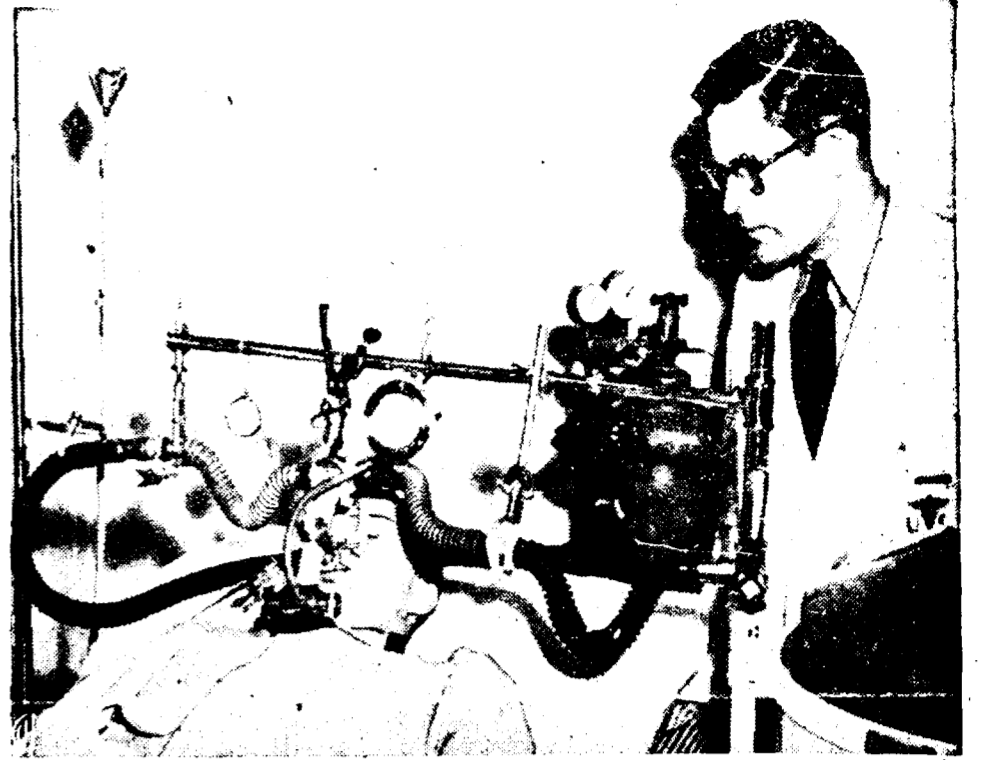

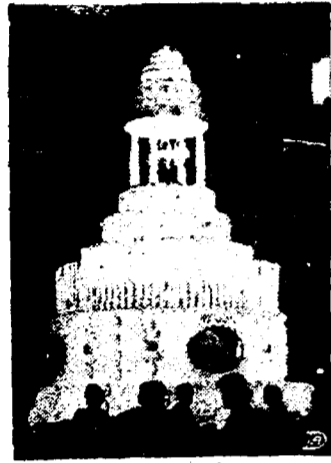

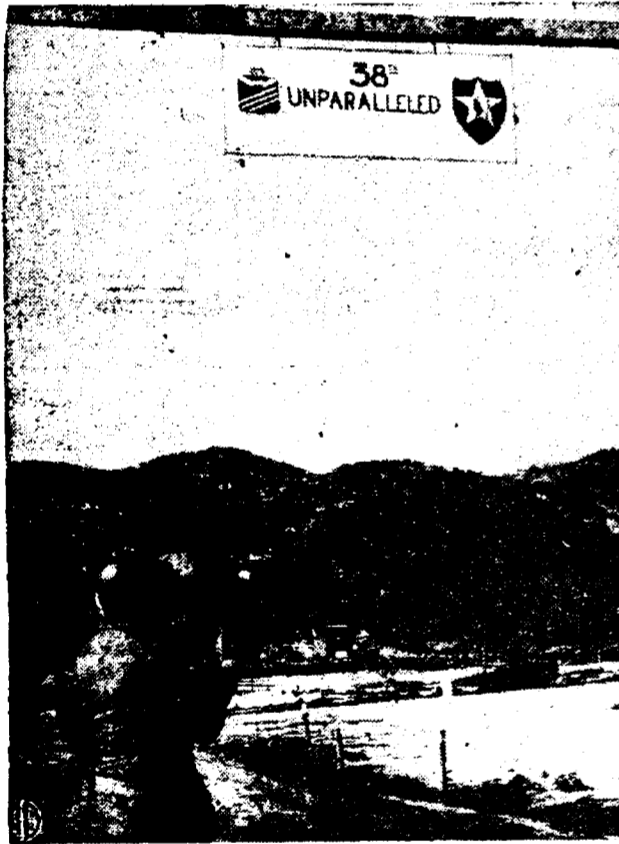
