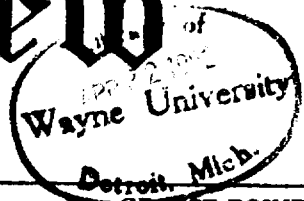

'Welcome Home Marines' Dance Saturday, May 10th

A "Welcome Home Detroit Marines" reunion dance is being sponsored by local civic leaders in conjunction with the Organized Marine Reserve Units in this area. This reception and dance will be held at the Marine Reserve Armory on May 10th in order to honor and welcome home all Marine Reservists who were mobilized for active duty following the outbreak of hostilities in Korea in 1950.

The dance will be held at the Marine Reserve Armory, 7600 East Jefferson Avenue, Detroit, Saturday, May 10, between 9:00 p.m. and 1:00 a.m. Jerry Wald and his famed band, currently appearing at the Paramount in New York, has been engaged for the dance.

Over 700 officers and enlisted men from the 17th Infantry Battalion of Detroit and Dearborn, and Marine Reserve Aviation Units at Grosse Ile, answered the active duty call. A number of these participated in some of the heaviest Korean action during 1950-51; while others served at various Marine posts and stations throughout the United States. Of the total number mobilized, more than 400 have completed their service and returned to homes and jobs in this area. Quite a few of the officers and enlisted men called to active duty are voluntarily remaining in service, either as regulars or as reservists on extended active duty. Kick-Off Meeting of Pointe's Garden Clubs Launches Yearly Drive

A surface drainage system for St. Clair Shores was the principal topic on the agenda at this month's meeting of the East Side Group, a territorial division of the Builders Association of Metropolitan Detroit, and composed of builders operating on the East Side of Detroit's metropolitan area.

According to Earl C. Doyle, executive vice president of the Builders Association, definite plans on meeting St. Clair Shores' drainage requirements were made.

Several representatives from St. Clair Shores were on hand at the meeting, including Milton Siclesteel and William Wardfield, members of the City Council; Lloyd Lomlaugh, building inspector; Erben Williams, plumbing inspector and John Koepsell, electrical inspector. As outlined by Doyle, good progress was made on the drainage system and evidence of close cooperation existed between the municipal representatives and the East Side members.

Lessen Fear of Cancer

Cancer was second highest among the leading causes of death in Detroit in 1951 and took 2,710 lives here, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, commissioner of health, remarked in discussing Cancer Control Month today. There were a greater number of cancer deaths—858—in the age group between 60 and 70 years than in any other ten year age group. The youngest person to die of cancer last year was a three day old baby boy and the oldest a man 94 years old.

In the last 25 years deaths from cancer of the lung have increased from 27 in 1925 to 305 last year. More than three out of four of these were men. Chest X-ray examinations for tuberculosis usually reveal cancer of the chest if it is present. This discovery is one of favorable and important by-products of a periodic chest examination for tuberculosis because when cancer of the lung is found in the earliest stages, it is completely curable.

Dr. Molner says to guard against cancer a thorough physical examination by a physician each year is good health insurance. In addition, it is important to see a doctor if any of the signs of cancer appear. To know what these danger signals are should lessen your fear of cancer. Signs which should lead anyone to have an immediate examination by his physician include:

1. Any sore that does not heal.
2. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
3. Any change in wart or mole.
4. Persistent hoarseness or cough.
5. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
6. Any deformity or alteration in the usual shape of the breast.
7. Any change in normal bowel habits.

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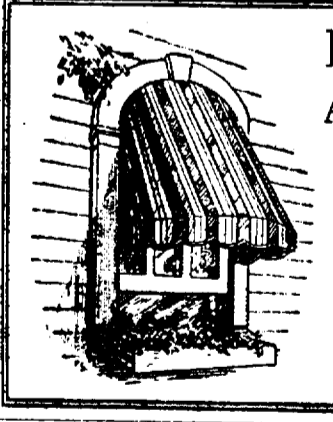

Biological Warfare Film Available to Community

Michigan people are showing an increased interest in biological warfare, the Michigan Office of Civil Defense said today.

Recent false accusations by the Communists of germ warfare in Korea, and the recent epidemics of hoof and mouth disease in Canadian animals and of anthrax in animals in this country are bringing about demand for information on the subject.

Biological or bacteriological warfare is the deliberate infection of humans or animals with virus or germs and the deliberate infestation of food and forage crops with plant diseases or crop pests, Civil Defense officials state.

In the present world situation, it is entirely possible that an enemy might introduce human or animal disease or plant pests which could become epidemic before the sabotage was suspected, they point out, but that state and national health and agricultural are alert to the danger.

To provide Michigan people with reliable information on biological warfare methods and preventive measures, the Michigan Office of Civil Defense has acquired seven copies of the official Civil Defense film "What You Should Know About Biological Warfare" which can be borrowed without charge for showing to farm and community groups. It has also acquired several hundreds copies of an official Civil Defense Pamphlet on the same subject which can be used for discussion groups.

To reserve the film "What You Should Know About Biological Warfare" contact your local Civil Defense Director or write direct to the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, Lansing 16, Michigan, giving the date you wish to show the film and the name of the group to which you wish to show it. Include your request for copies of the pamphlet.

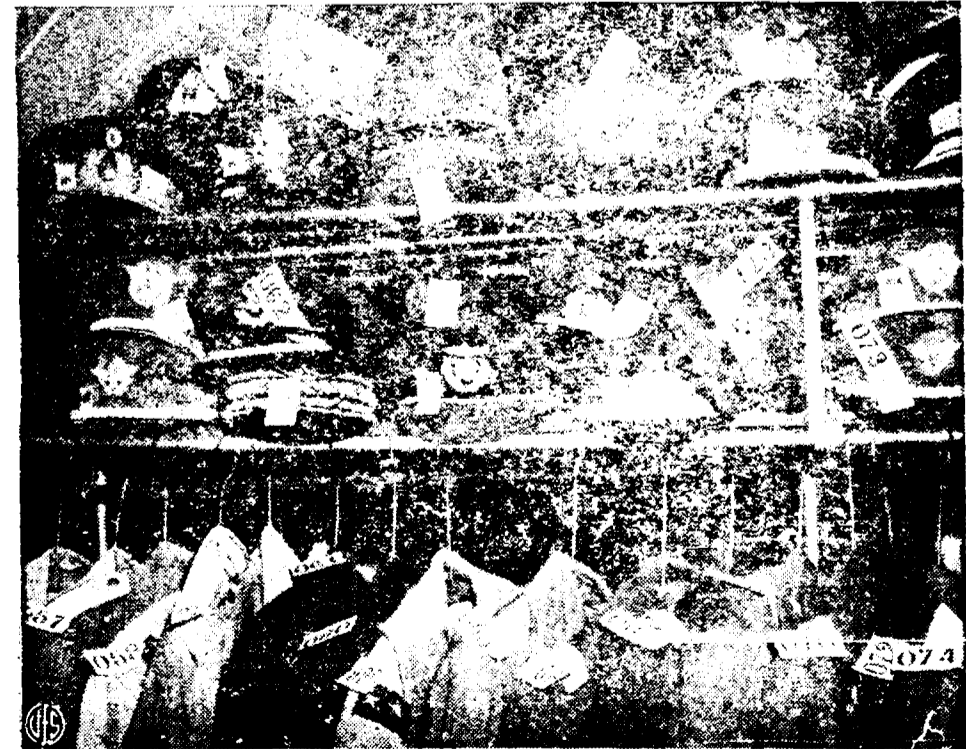

HEADS TOGETHER—"Brass Hats" of 14 nations are stacked together at the Hotel Iena in Paris as 69 officers of general rank or the equivalent participate in the first staff exercises of SHAPE, called the "Paper Maneuvers." The top staff officers of air, sea and ground commands started the five-day maneuvers under the command of Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's deputy.
