

Lessen Fear of Cancer

Cancer was second highest among the leading causes of death in Detroit in 1951 and took 2,710 lives here, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, commissioner of health, remarked in discussing Cancer Control Month today. There were a greater number of cancer deaths-858-in the age group between 60 and 70 years than in any other ten year age group. The youngest person to die of cancer last year was a three day old baby boy and the oldest a man 94 years old.

In the last 25 years deaths from cancer of the lung have increased from 27 in 1925 to 305 last year. More than three out of four of these were men. Chest X-ray examinations for tuberculosis usually reveal cancer of the chest if it is present. This discovery is one of favorable and important by-products of a periodic chest examination for tuberculosis because when cancer of the lung is




