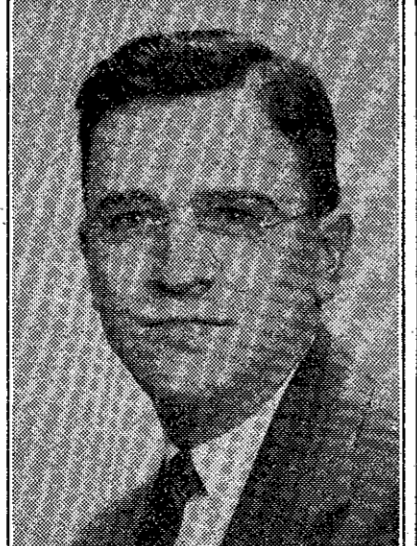

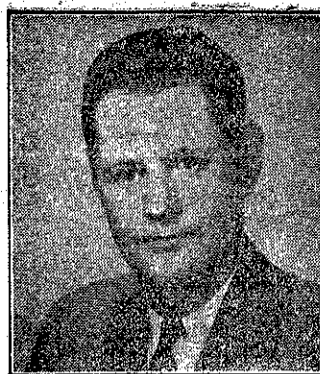

NOTICE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN

Petition to amend the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, so as to provide benefits for incapacitated members of the Grosse Pointe Fire and Police Departments, whose incapacity occurred in the line of duty and to provide a retirement fund for the members of the Grosse Pointe Park Fire and Police Departments, and to provide for contribution by all members of both departments of two (2%) per cent of their yearly salaries to be used toward the payment of pension and retirement benefits payable to such members of either department as may be retired, due to incapacity occurred by discharge of their duties.

CHAPTER XXVI. PENSION AND RETIREMENT

Section 1. A system of pensions and retirements for the benefit of the personnel of the Fire and Police Departments of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan is hereby established to take effect April 15, 1939.

Section 2. A Pension and Retirement Board is hereby created, hereinafter referred to as the "Board" which shall consist of seven members as follows:—

A. The Treasurer of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park.
B. Two members shall be appointed by the Council of the Village, one shall be a member of the Council, the other so appointed shall be a resident freholder of the Village.

C. Two members shall be appointed by the Fire Department, one shall be a member of the Fire Department, the other so appointed shall be a resident freholder of the Village.

D. Two members shall be appointed by the Police Department; one shall be a member of the Police Department, the other so appointed shall be a resident freholder of the Village.

E. This Board shall not constitute a quorum unless six members are present.

F. In the event of illness or the inability of any Board member to serve, a Proxy shall represent the body for which he shall be Proxy by a showing of proper credentials from that body, and said Proxy shall have the full power to act in all respects as if said Board member were present.

G. Each member shall serve for a term of two years, except the Treasurer who shall serve for the duration of his official term of office.

H. In the event any member shall prior to the expiration of his term, cease to have the qualifications required as referred to in this section, then the appointive body shall appoint his successor.

DUTIES OF THE BOARD.

Section 3. Duties of the Board shall be:
A. Make all rules and regulations necessary for the proper conduct of its official business.

B. The Treasurer of the Village shall be the custodian of all funds and shall be required to give a good and sufficient bond to said Board for the faithful performance of his duties and the safe keeping of all moneys collected hereunder, and to issue warrants for the disbursement of such money upon certification of the Board.

C. Whenever any Fireman or Policeman is retired as hereafter provided, the Board shall forthwith report its action to the Village Council, giving the name of the member retired, and the Village Council shall have registered with the Clerk the name of such member on the retired list.

D. The Village Clerk shall keep in his office a book to be known as "The Policemen's and Firemen's Pension List." This book shall give a complete history and record of the action of the Board in granting a pension to any person or persons.

E. The Board shall be a quasi-judicial body, and its actions shall be reviewable by writ of certiorari only.

RETIREMENTS.

Section 4.
A. Any person who has been a member of the Fire Department or Police Department, or both, of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, for a period of Twenty-five (25) years and is Fifty (50) years of age may by order of the Board, upon recommendation of the Village Council, be placed upon the retired list, but such member shall be heard in opposition thereto, and said Board shall, upon application of a member, place the applicant on the list of retired employees.

B. The amount of time spent in the United States Military, Naval or Marine service by any member who left his Department during the late war, or who shall leave his Department to enter the United States service in the event of future war, and who returned or returns to his Department when honorably discharged from said service, shall be counted as part of the aforesaid twenty-five (25) years.

C. Any member having attained the age of sixty-two (62) years shall be placed on the retired list.

D. Whenever any member of the Fire Department or Police Department shall hereafter become incapacitated for the performance of his duties, such member shall receive his full salary for a period of ninety (90) days, after which time if such member's incapacity is determined to be occasioned by the discharge of his duties as a member of such department, he shall be placed upon the list of retired employees.

E. Any member placed upon the retired list under sub-section A. or C. hereof, shall be paid a retirement allowance of one-half (1/2) pay.

F. Any member placed upon the retired list under sub-section D. hereof, shall be paid a retirement allowance of two-thirds (2/3) pay until the time such member would have served twenty-five (25) years had he continued in active duty, and at the rate of one-half (1/2) pay thereafter.

G. All retirement allowances shall be based upon the rate of pay for the rank in which such member was serving at the time of his retirement, and in the event of change at any time thereafter, the rate of pay for said rank as changed shall be the basis for computing such allowance.

CLASSIFICATION OF DISABILITY.

Section 5.
A. The determining body for the classification of retirements as provided under Section 4 hereof shall be the Pension and Retirement Board, whose findings shall be conclusive except in cases requiring medical findings for their determination.

B. In cases requiring medical findings any member may petition for the appointment of a Medical Board composed of one physician or surgeon appointed by the Board, one physician or surgeon appointed by the petitioner for retirement, and a third physician or surgeon selected by the physicians or surgeons so appointed, and said Medical Board shall meet, examine petitioner, and make a report of their findings to the Pension and Retirement Board within twenty (20) days.

C. The Pension and Retirement Board shall grant said petition within ten days of the filing thereof, and the finding of said Medical Board in such cases shall be final.

D. It shall be the duty of the Medical Board to file a written report of their examination and findings with the Pension and Retirement Board.

E. The cost of such medical services shall become a charge upon the Fire and Police Department Pension and Retirement Fund.

CONTINUATION OF DISABILITY.

Section 6.

A. Any Fireman or Policeman retired because of disability, shall at any time within two years from date of retirement, upon the request of himself or the Village Council, be re-examined by the Department Surgeon or some other competent physician authorized by the Board to make such re-examination, and if upon such re-examination any member shall be reported to be capable of performing his duties, the Village Council shall require such member to return to duty in the same rank and grade in which such member was serving at the time of his retirement, and such retirement shall be counted as part of aforesaid twenty-five (25) years.

PENSIONS.

Section 7.

A. In case any person, a confirmed member of the Fire or Police Department, shall be killed while in the discharge of his duties, or shall receive injuries which result in his death, the widow shall be paid a pension.

B. If there be no widow, then the mother or father of such person, if dependent upon him for support, shall, by vote of the Fire and Police Department Pension Board, be paid a pension. But if at any time the Board shall find that a parent or parents are no longer dependent upon such pension for support, then the Board may discontinue such pension.

C. The widow shall receive the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month during the term of her natural life or until she remarries, in which case all payment of monies under this chapter to such widow shall cease.

D. The dependent parent or parents shall receive forty dollars (\$40.00) per month for one or seventy dollars (\$70.00) per month for both.

E. If there be a widow and a child or children, there shall be paid in addition to pension granted said widow, the sum of Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month for each child under the age of 16 years, but the total allowance for widow and child or children shall never exceed One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars per month.

F. If such widow shall die or remarry, or in case such deceased member shall leave no widow, but shall leave one or more children, there shall be paid to the person responsible for the care of such child or children as shall be under the age of sixteen (16) years, the sum of Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars each per month.

APPLICATION FOR PENSION.

Section 8.

A. When the widow, children, dependent mother or dependent father of any deceased employee of the Department shall be entitled to a pension as herein provided, such, widow, children, dependent mother or dependent father shall make application to the Pension Board on the form to be provided by the Board.

B. The application shall be accompanied by such proofs as the Board may require.

C. All applications and proofs shall be retained in the custody of the Board.

PROVISIONS OF PAYMENT.

Section 9.

A. Any pension or retirement allowance herein authorized shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of this section from the Fire and Police Departments Pension and Retirement Fund: Provided, however, that nothing shall be due hereunder except in consideration of a waiver of and in lieu of any provisions of the "Workmen's Compensation Act," so-called.

B. All pensions and retirement allowances shall be payable to the pensioner on the first secular day in each month.

C. In all cases where pensions are payable because of injuries received by any Fireman or Policeman resulting in the death of such person, such pension shall be allowed from the date when salary was discontinued.

Section 10.

A. There shall be deducted by the Village, semi-monthly, two (2) per cent of the salary paid to each Fireman and Policeman, which money so deducted shall be paid into the Fire and Police Department's Retirement and Pension Fund.

B. On or before the first meeting of the Village Council of each fiscal year, the Board shall submit to the Council its estimate of additional monies necessary to pay such pensions for the current fiscal year, and the Council shall appropriate and cause to be collected and levied by taxation such sum of money as shall be required to make the payments herein provided for.

C. The amount of money necessary for the Village Council to appropriate, shall be determined by an actuarial survey for each one-year period.

D. All such money appropriated and not having been used for payment of pension claims, shall remain in the General Pension Fund, and may be invested in Bonds referred to in Section 11 of this Chapter.

ACCUMULATION OF A RESERVE.

Section 11.

A. Beginning April 15th, 1939 the Village Council shall provide the sum of twenty thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) each year for a period of five years. The fund from time to time thus provided shall be invested in the bonds of the Village, or Grosse Pointe Township Bonds or U. S. Government Bonds, which bonds shall be deposited with such bank as may be selected by the Board.

B. The Fund accumulated during this period shall be used as occasion may require, to supplement the sum provided annually in case such sum falls short of actual requirements because of an inadequate estimate of the necessary sum, as referred to in Section 10 of this Chapter.

C. Beginning April 15th, 1944 this reserve fund shall become part of the General Pension Fund.

REFUNDS OF DEDUCTIONS.

Section 12.

A. Should a Fireman or Policeman die in active service, leaving no dependents, three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00), shall be paid toward the expenses of his burial.

B. Should a Fireman or Policeman become separated from the service for any reason before being eligible for pension, seventy-five (75%) per cent of his salary deductions, without interest, shall be returned to him.

C. In the event a member shall die while in the service from causes not entitling his dependents to a pension, then the money so deducted from

his salary, without interest, shall be paid to his dependents.

FIREMEN AND POLICEMEN.

Section 13.

A. The terms "Firemen" and "Policemen" shall be deemed to mean all employees of these Departments at the effective date of this amendment, and any or all future employees the Village Council shall designate as being members of these respective departments.

B. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to Firemen or Policemen appointed at the request and expense of private parties nor to probationary Firemen or Policemen.

SECURITY OF PENSION.

Section 14.

A. No money owed to any disabled or retired Fireman or Policeman or his widow, or to his children or dependents, shall be held, seized, taken or detained, or levied on by virtue of any attachment, execution, injunction, writ, interlocutory or other order or decree of any process or proceeding whatever issued out of any Court of this state, for the payment of satisfaction, in whole or in part, of any debt, damages, claim, demand or judgment, against any such Fireman or Policeman or widow, or guardian of any minor child or children, or dependent parents of any deceased Fireman or Policeman. No pensioner shall have the right to assign his or her pension or any part thereof, but said money shall be sacredly held, kept, secured and distributed for the purpose of pensioning the persons named, and for no other purpose whatever.

EFFECTIVE DATE.

Section 15.

A. This Chapter shall take effect two (2) years from date of adoption in case of service retirement.

B. This Chapter shall take immediate effect in all cases of duty disability or death.

Section 16. All provisions of the Village Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park inconsistent with the provisions hereof, are hereby expressly repealed, and in the event any section, or part of any section, of this Chapter, shall be determined to be invalid for any reason, such determination of invalidity shall in no way affect the remainder of this Chapter.

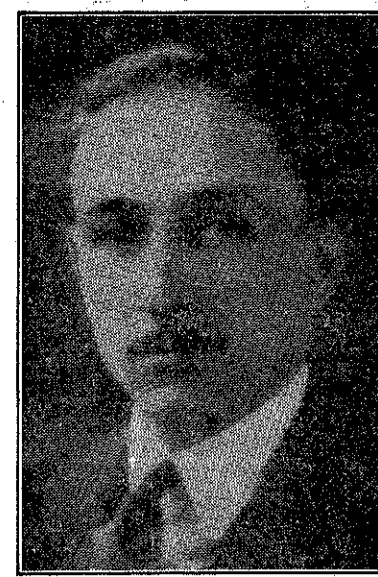

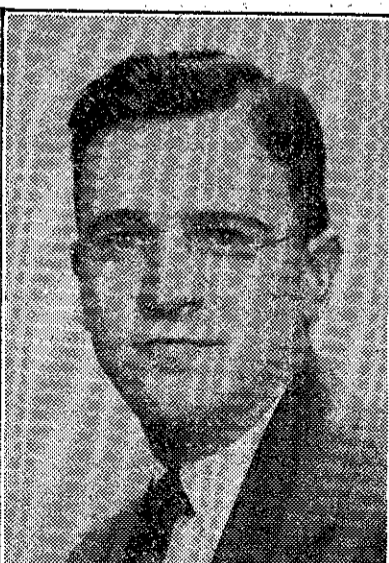
