#### Farms Officials Claim Administration Record Deserves Consideration

Taxpayers in Grosse Pointe Farms have certainly received their money's worth under the President and Trustees who are now seeking re-election. One hundred twenty-three thousand dollars of improvements in the form of new sewers, water mains and park and pier facilities have been installed without increase in the tax rate. Bonded debt has been reduced \$234,-000.00 during the last two and one-half years of this administration.

Interest savings resulting from this reduction in bonded debt have enabled payment of the first annual installment of \$10,000.00 into the police and firemen's pension fund recently created by the voters through an amendment to the Village Charter. The same savings should permit the continuance of these annual payments without tax rate increase.

Advantageous financial management and comprehensive public improvements have not reduced efficiency. The Fire Department has attended fires involving property valued at \$4,188,900 with a loss of only \$6,903.

All residents of the Farms have also had a chance to enjoy the dock and park at the foot of Moross Road which the Village spends approximately \$10,000 a year to maintain. An additional \$7,000 for special improvements expended in the past two years is well reflected in added beauty and increased bathing, boating, and picnic facilities. On this record the supporters of the incumbents feel they ought to be reelected.





there will be submitted to the electorate of the City of Grosse Pointe the following: THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE SHALL BE AMENDED SO THAT SECTIONS 1, 4, 5, 11, 14, 34, 35, 36, 41, 47 and 51 SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The following territory shall continue to be a body politic and corporate under the name "City of Grosse Pointe": Beginning at a point on the U. S. Harbor Line of Lake St. Clair distant 33.00 ft. Southwesterly and measured perpendicularly from the Easterly line of P. C. 300, thence Northwesterly on a line which is distant 33.00 ft. at right angles Southwesterly and parallel to the same Easterly line of P. C. 300, to the centerline of Jefferson Avenue 100 ft. wide: thence Northeasterly along the said centerline of Jefferson Avenue 8.00 ft. more or less, to a point on the Westerly line of Fisher Rd. extended, said line being distant 25.00 ft. Southwesterly measured perpendicularly from the Easterly line of said P. C. 300; thence Northwesterly along the Westerly line of said Fisher Road which line is distant Southwesterly 25.00 ft. measured at right angles and parallel to the centerline of Fisher Road, said centerline being also the Easterly line of P. C. 300, to the centerline of Mack Avenue; thence Southwesterly along the centerline of Mack Avenue to the centerline of Cadieux Road; thence Southeasterly along the centerline of said Cadieux Road and the extension thereof to the U.S. Harbor Line of Lake St. Clair; thence Northeasterly along said U. S. Harbor Line of Lake St. Clair to the point of beginning.

Section 4. The city clerk and two members of the council appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the council shall be the election commission which shall have charge of all activities and duties relating to the conduct of elections in the

Section 5. The election commission shall appoint an election board and designate a chairman thereof. Such fulltime officials and clerical employees of the city as may not be employed at their regular work on election day may be appointed on election boards and shall serve without extra compensation. The compensation for other election personnel shall be a fixed amount determined in advance of each election by the election commission, provided, that if the expenditures for such services exceed the amount appropriated for elections in the budget, they must be approved by the council as are other increases in appropriations for any department or function.

Section 11. The government of the city, and all the powers thereof, except as otherwise provided by this charter or state law, shall be vested in a council consisting of a mayor and six councilmen. The mayor shall be elected at each regular city election for a term of two years from the Monday next following the election. The term of office of the councilmen to be elected at each regular city election shall be four years, provided, however, that the three councilmen elected at the first election hereafter, and receiving the least number of votes, shall be elected for terms of two years only. so that after the terms of such three councilmen shall have expired, three councilmen shall be elected, with the result that three councilmen shall be elected each two years thereafter. The councilmen shall take office from the Monday next following their elections. The mayor and councilmen shall have been registered voters in the city for at least one year prior to the date of taking office and shall receive no compensation.

Section 14. The council, at the meeting following the biannual election, shall appoint a city clerk, a city treasurer. and a city assessor, whose terms of office shall be for an indefinite period and whose salaries shall be fixed from time to time by the council. The clerk, treasurer and assessor shall have been registered voters in the city for at least one year prior to the date of taking office.

Section 34. On or before the third Monday in February of each year the assessor shall make and complete an assessment roll of taxable property in the city, and shall submit the roll, over his certificate, to the council. The subjects of taxation for municipal purposes shall be the same as for county and school purposes under the general law. The assessment roll shall be open to public inspection beginning on the third Tuesday in February and shall remain open for the remainder of that week, during regular office hours unless otherwise & advertised by the Board of Review.

Section 35. The Board of Review shall meet on the fourth Monday in February to review the roll and consider

complaints which may have been filed and to hear any complaint which property owners may make in person or by authorized agent. The Board shall continue its meetings on such successive days as may be necessary to hear all complaints. Notice of the opening of the assessment rolls for inspection and of the meeting of the Board of Review shall be published at least four days prior to the third Tuesday in February. Before the second Monday in March, the Board shall have completed its review of the roll which shall during the next fiscal year be the basis of levy and collection of

Section 36. Before the third Monday in January, each department head shall submit to a person designated by the council an itemized estimate of the expenditures for the next fiscal year of the department or departments under his control. The person so designated shall prepare a complete itemized budget for the next fiscal year and shall submit it to the council on or before the third Monday in February.

Section 41. Not later than the third Monday in March, the council shall, by resolution, adopt the budget for all municipal expenditures for the next fiscal year and such resolution shall provide for a levy of the amount necessary to be raised by taxation, which shall not exceed two per cent of the assessed valuation of all real and personal property in the city. Upon adoption of the annual tax levy, the assessor shall prepare a tax roll which shall be completed on or before the twenty-eighth day of March. The taxes thus assessed shall become at once a debt to the city from the persons to whom they are assessed, and the amount assessed, together with all charges thereon, shall, on the first day of April, become a lien on the property assessed, of the same character and effect as the lien created by state law for state and county taxes, until paid.

Section 47. The city council may borrow money on the credit of the city for any purposes within the scope of its powers, and may issue the city's bonds or other evidences of indebtedness therefor; provided, that the authority herein granted shall be subject to all limitations, conditions, restrictions and requirements now or hereafter provided by this charter and the constitution and the laws of this state, and provided, further, that irrespective of any other provision of this charter the council shall have the right to borrow, without submission to the electorate, an amount in any one year up to one per cent of the assessed value of all the real and personal property in the city and to issue the necessary bond therefor; provided, however, that the amount so borrowed in any year, together with the taxes levied for the same year, shall not exceed the limit of taxation authorized by this charter, provided, that the net bonded indebtedness incurred for all public purposes shall not at any time exceed ten per cent of the assessed value of all the real and personal property in the city. Bonds which may be issued shall include general obligation bonds; mortgage bonds and revenue bonds for the purpose of acquiring or construction public utilities, which bonds may be issued beyond the general limitation of bonded indebtedness prescribed by state law when they do not impose any liability upon the city except upon the property and revenues of such public utility; special assessment bonds; bonds for the city's portion of local improvements; bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes actually levied and uncollected; refunding bonds; and emergency bonds. All other types of bonds, notes and other evidences of indebtedness now or hereafter specifically authorized or permitted by state law may be issued as therein provided. Bonds and other evidences of indebtedness of the city shall be signed by the mayor and attested by the clerk under the seal of the city. The coupons evidencing the interest upon the bonds of the city may be executed with the facsimile signatures of the mayor and the clerk.

Section 51. The council shall audit and allow the claims and accounts against the city, or may delegate that function or any part of it to some other officer or officers. After such claims and accounts are approved by the council, or in such manner as the council may direct, vouchers, shall be drawn upon the proper funds. The city treasurer shall then pay the voucher by check, draft, order or warrant which shall be signed by such officer or officers or employees as the council may designate.

### Orchestra to Close

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra's triumphant close in Orchestra Hall vith the three concerts of March 16, 17 and 18. The Saturday night popılar-priced program, March 18, will be <sup>l</sup> the last concert ever to be played by the orchestra in Orchestra Hall for beginning with the 1939-1930 season the symphony will play all of its concerts in its new home, Masonic Temple.

Franco Ghione will direct the Thursday night subscription program as well as the repeat performance of this pro-Season on March 18 gram at 2:30 p. m. Friday. Three compositions that proved particularly effective at earlier subscription concerts silver jubilee season will be brought to will comprise the program. The works will be the First Symphony, in C Minor, Op. 68, by Brahms; Kodaly's Dances of Galanta and the Ravel orchestration of Moussorgsky's colorful Pictures at an Exposition. The two latter works were heard for the first

time in Detroit only this season. Victor Kolar will be in charge of the season's final concert Saturday night which will be devoted solely to the music of Tschaikovsky. The program will be dedicated to the memory of the late beloved Ossip Gabrilowitsch, in recognition of the inspiring and lastng great good he accomplished in this community during his many years as conductor of the orchestra and as model citizen.

Gabrilowitsch loved the music of Tschaikovsky, a fellow countryman. It is fitting, too, that Kolar will conduct this program for it was he who through the years shared the artistic responsibility of the orchestra with Gabrilowitsch. It is further fitting that the last concert the symphony ever will play in Orchestra Hall should be in the nature of a tribute to the man for whom the hall largely was built.

The all-Tschaikovsky program will be made up of the Fourth Symphony, n F Minor, Op. 36, the D Major Conerto for Violin and Orchestra and the hunderous "1812" Overture.

A celebrated soloist, Zlatko Balokovic, Yugloslav violinist, will be presented as guest artist in the D Major Concerto. It will mark Balakovic's Detroit debut and follow fast on the artist's two recent appearances with he Boston Symphony.

Balokovic, whose concerts have aken him to nearly all corners of the earth, graduated with the highest honors on record from the Zagreb Conservatory at the age of 16. Later he studied with Sevcik in Vienna, where he won several major prizes.

Wednesday, March 15, the orchestra will play two concerts in Midland, including a children's program at 4 p. m. Kolar will direct both concerts.
