

> It is the aim of the North Central Association to achieve by the study, a definite standard by which schools may be judged, and a practical way of measuring the effectiveness of a school. They also hope to be able to designate what means may be used to better a good school, and how regional meetings can further the growth of secondary schools.

One step in achieving these aims was the formation of a set of evaluative criteria which enables a faculty to appraise a school on such points as instruction, library, school guidance, extra curricular activities, school staff, school administration, and outcome

The criteria were examined, ana lyzed, and severly criticized by several experts in the field of secondary education. They are now being used as an experiment in two hundred secondnalism students, about two dozen were ary schools throughout the United States as a means of further deter-

mining the validation of the standards. Grosse Pointe is the only high school selected from Michigan for this test. Thus, for the last two months, Mr. Paul A. Rehmus, principal, and the sketches, Hudson's selected the copy faculty, have been appraising the school according to the points mentioned in the criteria.

> The next step in the study is a surmittee. 



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

"We firmly believe that our sincere efforts, backed by business experience and with the co-operation of the public and their officials, will result in curbing unnecessary expenditures and unsound practices in many localities," Means continued, "with the result that costs of government will be held to a minimum and taxes kept within the limits of the public's ability to pay."

"Less governmental 'planned economy' and more 'planned economizing' will keep Small Business out of the red," stated A. F. Mathews, state president, while discussing meeting arrangements. "The state association has adopted a comprehensive program to promote 'planned economy' in every branch of local, state and national government."

"Small business means business," Mathews declared. "We are going to dig out the facts and figures and then make sure that they are not only presented to the public officials but to the public."

"Pleas for economy and free enterprise up to this point have been largely too general to be effective," he continued. "Small business is impressed with the fact that there has been too much elocution and not enough execution-big talk and little action."
