> The idea was enthusiastically accepted by the seniors as well as the rest of the student body. Efficient Miss Trott immediately organized a staff for the new magazine, to be named View Pointe, and by January 1939 had assembled the magazine ready to issue to anxious students.

> The results-Grosse Pointe heaped View Pointe with praise and in a short time the magazine attained national recognition. Requests flowed in asking for information concerning this new View Pointe, and many congratulatory and commendatory letters came from those who had received a copy.

Three hundred copies were mailed to people in 28 different states, some by request, and others as a complimentary sample of Grosse Pointe work. New York State widely acclaimed View

Five copies were sent to California, and five to Washington, D. C. Two went to Oklahoma and four to Massachusetts. Connecticutt, Nebraska, New Jersey, Oregon, Virginia, Vermont, and numerous other states received and commended View Pointe.

New York City of Today. The Trylon and Perisphere, theme of the New York Fair, are seen dominating the 12161/2-acre tract. At the lower right is the international area with its magnificent foreign pavilions grouped around the Court of Peace below the Lagoon

of Nations. At the lower left is the Court of States. The picture shows the Fair's close proximity to Broadway and the skyscrapers of upper Manhattan.

Actually the Fair is only 10 minutes from Broadway by Long Island Railroad. and about 25 minutes by subway. By motor the trip requires about 30 minutes, with 5 parking fields furnishing ample space. New roads and bridges have prevented congestion of traffic.

Thus View Pointe was an overwhelming success. It was a new experience that, by efficient planning and co-operation, worked. Its main reason for success was the large circulation. Twenty-three hundred copies were sold in a school of 2,100 pupils, and many more were sold to outsiders. However, the large circulation did not affeet the quality of View Pointe. The magazine was not sensationalized.

It was a genuine picture of Grosse Pointe life, and all the pictures in the magazine were taken by amateur student and faculty photographers.

View Pointe was printed on good paper and was well planned typograph, ically. The pictures showed not only seniors but student acitivities from the seventh grade through the twelfth grade, thus giving a large popularity.

The magazine was publicized but not forced upon the pupils. The advertising was clever and stimulated interest. "Of the total placements made by the Employment Service during this period," McDonald said, "2,282 were in weekly period in 1938."

The total number of jobs found by the Michigan State Employment Service during the first six months of 1939 is now 58,178 with 41,117 of these in private industry and 17,061 in public jobs, which include PWA.

The active file listing those persons actually seeking work through the Service dropped to 252,051 at the end of the week. New applications for work declined 13.8 per cent in the same week, totaling 3,780.

McDonald reported that the Commissinn had issued a total of \$59,052,057 benefit checks through the week ending July 22 to 4,387,958 unemployed workers. Persons totally unemployed received \$57,334,069 in 4,307,745 benefit checks, while those partially unemployed received \$1,717,988 in 80,213

In Wayne County, McDonald stated, the Commission has thus far issued 2,366,909 checks to 244,813 recipients, average benefit check for total unemployment in Wayne County amounted to \$13.60, while the average partial benefit check amounted to \$21.82.



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
