We rather fancy the idea of this little squib we pilfered recently.



## New Pierce School Finished In 8 Months



Individual letters to the 750 pupils enrolled for the new John D. Pierce Junior High School of Grosse Pointe were mailed to the boys and girls Sunday and Monday by the school officials. Signed by Superintendent E. R. Van Kleeck and Charles E. Leavitt, principal of the new schools, the letters describe arrangements for lunchroom, bicycle parking, book store, bell schedule, traffic control, guide system, and playgrounds. Enclosed were floor plans showing each pupil where his own room is located.

The letter follows in part:

We bring you some good news: your new junior high school will be ready on time and open with the rest of the system.

On arrival at the building the first few days, please enter immediately to make it easier for those who have to arrive later.

On the opening day of school, Boy Scouts, as well as members of the faculty, will be on duty in the corridors of the school to help answer your questions and aid you in any other way possible.

Immediately on arrival at the building on opening day, please report to your home room and get your individual class schedule showing the subjects, periods, and room locations, for each period of the day. Please sit down immediately and study this and if necessary, raise questions with your home room teacher. Please help us by not congregating in the corridors at this time. You should be in your home room the first day by 8:30 or 8:35 if possible, and by 8:40 at the latest.

In addition to your individual home room assignment, which is checked on the enclosed floor plan, there will be posted on bulletin boards an alphabetically arranged list of pupils' names,

showing for each student his home room. You can refer to these if you lose or forget your floor plan. We suggest, however, that you carry the floor plan with you for a few days until you learn your way around the H-shaped building.

Enclosed also is a period or bell schedule. Please note that periods average 55 minutes in length, permitting a definite time for supervised study in each class with the help of the teacher of that subject.

The cafeteria will be open the first day and will maintain a scale of prices similar to that at the high school. In the cafeteria you may purchase a complete lunch or one or two items to supplement the lunch you bring from home, or you may bring your entire lunch from home and eat it in the cafeteria. Your individual class schedule will show for which of the two consecutive lunch periods you are scheduled.

All students riding bicycles will please park them in the areas provided in the rear of the school. All vehicular traffic, including bicycles, should enter from the west drive from Kercheval, namely, the drive nearer Nottingham. If there are any older students who have auto operators' licenses and who drive cars, they are urged not to park on Kercheval in front of Pierce or Defer. A village traffic regulation also prohibits this.

The driveway which goes around the building will be a one-way drive with one entrance from Kercheval on the west side (that is, the side toward Nottingham). The exit therefore will be on to Kercheval at the east side of the building (in other words, toward Balfour). This makes it possible for traffic on the south side of the street to turn when desirable directly into the

driveway on the west side of the building without crossing the main east-and-west stream of traffic. It is therefore suggested that parents who drive down Kercheval discharge passengers on the north or Defer School side of the street, possibly opposite the middle of the Pierce building, where we hope to have traffic police protection concentrated, or east or west thereof. Parents who drive down St. Paul, Jefferson, Vernor Highway, Charlevoix or Mack may wish to discharge pupils in good weather on one those streets or at the corner of Kercheval and Nottingham or the corner of Kercheval and Balfour. Pupils who get off on the north side of the street are then required to cross the street directly opposite the main entrance to pierce in the middle of the block where this special protection will be provided, rather than at the corner. At all other points, please cross at the corner.

The playground in the rear of the school has been seeded rather than sodded in order to save expense, and consequently it will be quite some time before it will be possible to permit its use. Therefore the gates opening from the playground into St. Paul opposite the head of Somerset will, for the present be kept locked to protect the growing grass.

We have written a lengthy letter to all of the neighbors of the Pierce School and have taken it upon ourselves to guarantee that the boys and girls of the Pierce School will be good and pleasant neighbors and will take pains to keep off the lawns of residents in that vicinity. We know we can depend upon the students to do this.

The first few mornings, while the traffic arrangements for pupils going to both the Defer and Pierce schools

are being tried out, we hope and suggest that many parents will discharge children from automobiles a block or more from the school in order to prevent a serious traffic tie-up on Kercheval. Later we shall welcome the visits of parents to the building and, in fact, urge such visits. The Pierce building has been placed very near the street and on rainy days it will be conveniently accessible directly from the street or from the drive encircling the building, but it would be helpful if some of the other traffic problems could be worked out quite thoroughly in practice before this particular one is experimented with.

The police department and village authorities of Grosse Pointe Park are co-operating most helpfully in the solution of these problems.

You can buy textbooks and supplies in the school bookstore to the left (east) of the main entrance the first day of school and thereafter. 9A pupils may sell at the bookstore used 9B books with which they are finished. There is at present a demand for 9B English books.

The front lawns have been seeded. We have put up only a light wire to indicate this. Please not only keep off these lawns yourself but urge others to do so.

If, after reading this letter carefully, questions occur to you, we suggest that you phone the junior high school, Niagara 2000, in the next few days and raise the questions over the telephone. This will avoid delay and confusion on the opening day.

And, finally, a hearty and sincere welcome to your new school. May it be all you hope and expect—and may its pupils be as excellent as the building itself!

## Grosse Pointe Schools Will Remain Closed Until Polio Subsides

The Grosse Pointe Township Board which comprises the Health Board of Grosse Pointe with Dr. Warren, the Health Commissioner, held a special meeting Wednesday morning to determine whether to open the schools and for the betterment of the district it was decided to close them until the emergency lifts in regard to poliomyelitis. When that time comes they will immediately open.

The following letter from the Health Commissioner was acted upon:

August 30, 1939.

Your attention is called to the epidemic of poliomyelitis which is now prevailing in the City of Detroit. From records obtained as late as yesterday from the Department of Health in Detroit, there were fifteen new cases of poliomyelitis reported in the City of Detroit yesterday. At the present time there are seventeen active cases existing in the City of Detroit in territory immediately adjacent to the Township of Grosse Pointe. There are no active cases within the confines of the Township of Grosse Pointe at this time.

The Board of Health of the City of Detroit has ordered all Detroit schools closed until September 18, 1939. This action was taken as a precautionary measure to prevent the spread of the disease.

We have in Grosse Pointe Township Parochial schools which are attended by residents of Detroit, and there are also a few enrolled students in the Grosse Pointe school system who are residents of Detroit. There are also numerous students of our school system who are at camps or at resorts, who will return in time for the opening

of our school system. To prevent this disease from gaining a foothold in Grosse Pointe Township, I believe that the schools of our Township should remain closed for a similar period as that established in the City of Detroit. This will be of material assistance in preventing a spread of disease, and will assist in keeping the disease from gaining epidemic proportions in the Township of Grosse Pointe.

In response to inquiries, Dr. Van Kleeck said that he believed that there were still no new cases in the Pointe, but that the Township Board of Health thought it safest to remain closed completely with the Township Board's instructions, he said.

All teachers' meetings will be held as scheduled, Dr. E. R. Van Kleeck, superintendent of schools said, as is also being done in Detroit.

# OPENING SERVICES LAST SUNDAY

## SIXTH CHURCH OF CHRIST, SCIENTIST, DETROIT

Kercheval Avenue between Manistique and Ashland

Sunday, August 24th, marked the opening of another beautiful Christian Science church in Detroit, located on Kercheval Avenue between Manistique and Ashland. The new edifice is that of Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist, and opening day services were held at 10:30 a. m., 3:00 p. m., and 7:30 p. m.

The new church building incorporates a number of unique and practical innovations that include an artificially illuminated auditorium with no window or skylights, an air-conditioning system using two wells drilled on the premises to obtain cooling water, and a built-in amplification system with approximately fifteen separate outlets that carry the message from the rostrum to every sizeable room in the building where an overflow audience might be placed.

The church is of classic design, constructed of Indiana limestone, and the front, facing Kercheval Avenue, stands out beautifully with black marble and aluminum. Three entrances lead into the spacious foyer, 24 by 72 feet.

The auditorium, arranged in banked semi-circles about a flat floor, seats about 847 persons, and the Sunday School rooms on the floor below which will accommodate about 500 pupils, together with the other rooms in which the RCA public address system is installed, will give a total seating capacity for lectures of about 2,000.

A large Reading Room, open daily to the public, occupies a rounded bay at the left end of the foyer, while a Directors' room occupies a corresponding wing at the right.

The walls of the auditorium are of a white acoustical plaster, and the trim, used sparingly, is black ebony. The pews are likewise white with ebony


trim and the rest room is similarly treated. The soft carpet is a rose-copper color and the cushions on the pews are a harmonizing rose-rust.

Although illuminated by indirect cove lighting and a single large pendant hanging from a position in the ceiling well forward of the center of the auditorium, the effect is almost that of daylight, due to the brilliance of the light source around the entire room.

Air conditioning in the building has been carefully worked out to provide more than ample capacity for maintaining a constant flow of pure air with proper humidity and temperature. A series of fully automatic controls keeps the air conditioning system functioning at all times. An automatic stoker furnace, in which the coal passes to the firebox from a fully enclosed bin without ever being in the open, has every conceivable safety device. Abundant water for air conditioning is supplied by the two wells drilled on the property, which flow on the hottest summer days at a temperature of 55 degrees.

Organ music will be provided by a new Aeolian-Skinner organ. The instrument is of the three manual type, with chimes and has four pipe sections, Swell, Great, Choir, and Pedal. There are about 1,600 pipes.

The furnishing of the Directors' Room, Reading Room, and other quarters are entirely different in color and motif from the auditorium plan. The

Reading Room furniture is of walnut and the draperies of English chintz are tan, green and brown, on a natural background. The literature sales room is between the foyer and the Reading Room.

The Directors' Room is furnished with a beautiful table of Honduras mahogany. It is of the Adam design, a classic style produced by the Adams brothers in England, in the late 1700's. The chairs are of harmonizing design with top-grain Spanish leather of a deep maroon shade. Draperies in this room are of linen, with a predominating green figure on a chartreuse background. A large picture of Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, and a picture of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, complete its simple furnishings.

The carpeting in the Reading Room, Directors' Room, and other smaller rooms is of a soft green color. Carpeting used in the auditorium was woven at the mills especially for this edifice.

Minor details include a rubber tile floor in the foyer, non-skid treads on the stairs, and an electric clock in every room in the building.

Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist, was organized eleven years ago and for the past ten years the services have been held in Pillar Lodge on Kercheval Avenue.

The approximate cost of the structure, equipment and building site total \$250,000. The architectural design was furnished by George D. Mason and Company and the general contractors were Walbridge-Aldinger Company.




Photo of the compact, efficient boiler room where no dust or dirt accumulates, because of the fully enclosed LINK-BELT Automatic Stoker.
