Pointe Championship Skeet Shoot to Be Held September 23-24

Next Saturday and Sunday, September 23 and 24, the Grosse Pointe Skeet Club will have its first annual Grosse Pointe skeet championships. More than 500 skeet shooters are expected to participate. Entries have been mailed in from Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan.

The shoot is scheduled to start at 8 a. m. Saturday, with a 50-target, sub-small gauge event, followed by a 100-target small gauge and 100-target 20-gauge program.

Henry B. Joy, Jr., his partner, Dick Hecker, well known Grosse Pointe attorney, J. T. McMillan, and Frank Kracht will be among the prominent shooters of the Middle West taking part in this tournament. World's Champion Don Sperry, from Flint, will also be present. More than \$1,500 worth of trophies and titles will be awarded to the winners.

Among the trophies will be the J. T. McMillan Trophy for the Class D skeet shooter. In awarding his trophy to this division, McMillan, widely known skeet stylist, believes that the Class D shooter, the beginner in registered skeet shooting ranks, should be given as much consideration as the top-notch.

Entry records are expected to be shattered Sunday when the 100-target all-gauge, five-man, two-man and classified team competitions are decided. The women's and junior events also are scheduled Sunday.

Tod Rockwell, sports editor of the Detroit Free Press, will be master of ceremonies at the shooters' banquet to be held after Saturday's shoot. The banquet will take place at 8 p. m. at the Vogue Grill, Harper and Bishop road. Ve don't like der dirty old Marne River anyvay, and, oh, papa, dem Americans use such offel language. Dey know nodding of Kultur and say such offel dings right before us and dey talk blasphemy, too. Teachers' Oaths of Allegiance Forms Available Here

L. M. Bartlett, Director of Child Accounting and Adjustment of the Grosse Pointe Schools, has today received a supply of Teachers' Oath forms from the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Lansing. According to Act 54 of the Public Acts of 1939, all persons holding a Michigan teacher's certificate are required to file an oath of allegiance properly notarized, in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction between the dates of September 29 and December 27, 1939, in order to protect the validity of the certificate. The act applies to teachers in public and parochial schools and also to persons who hold certificates but are not now in the teaching profession. After the path is filed, Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, Superintendent of Public Instruction, will send the certificate holder a card certifying the fact that the oath has been filed. Proper forms for filing the oath, which needs be filed only once, may also be secured from County Commissioner Fred Fischer whose office is in the Barlum Tower, Detroit, and from the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Lansing.

Mr. Bartlett state that his office will be glad to supply these forms to teachers and certificate holders residing in the Grosse Pointe area.

First Day for Pupils Is 'Smoothest Ever,' Parcells Tells All 786

Filled to 87 per cent of capacity, the new John D. Pierce Junior High School of Grosse Pointe opened Monday in what was described by Board of Education members as "the smoothest, best organized opening in the history of the school system." While the 786 pupils of the 900-pupil building rose in unison in their classrooms throughout the huge structure, Miss Helen Keane, teacher of vocal music, led them over the school's public address system in singing the first verse of "America." Classroom doors were opened so that class could hear one another, and the effect was impressive. As one Board of Education member said, "In times like these, what better way could be devised for opening the newest unit in what after all is the chief bulwark of American democracy—our great school system."

Prior to the singing, officers of the Board of Education who were present at the opening spoke briefly to the children over the public address system, which has outlets in every room. Charles E. Leavitt, principal of the new school, and Dr. E. R. Van Kleeck, superintendent of schools, also spoke briefly.

"In all the years that I have been observing the opening of new and old schools in Grosse Pointe, I have never seen a more orderly first day," said Charles A. Parcells, president of the Board of Education, in his remarks to the pupils. "Every boy and girl seemed to know where he should go, and what is more important, he went there. The halls are so quiet that one would think

Malayan Snakes Prove Expensive Zoo Guests

The keepers of the reptile house of the London zoo might well be intoning a new version of the nursery rhyme about the "ten little Injuns," for this is exactly what happened there: Seventy-four Cerberus water snakes arrived at the zoo. The Hamadryads ate 12 of them—now see 62.

The Hamadryad snakes are three in number. Their habitat is Malaya. From the first day of their arrival they proved rather expensive to feed. Until the water snakes came they had lived comfortably on a black and gold tree snake piece a week, but as these reptiles are rare and cost about \$20 to \$25 each, the Hamadryads' meals proved a strain on even the zoo's resources.

"You see," says a zoo keeper, "we have only three black and gold snakes left now, and they must be kept for show. So we imported these Cerberus water snakes from southeastern Asia as a substitute. They only cost about 10 shillings each if you buy a lot of them, so it is an economy in a way, as three Cerberus snakes go to one black and gold one."

He pointed to the cage in which the new arrivals were crawling happily about oblivious of the fate before them.

"Three of them will be lucky," he said, "as we will keep them for display. The rest will be fed to the Hamadryads at the rate of about six a week, although we will vary the diet occasionally."

Absolutely no pain is involved for the water snakes, however, as the great Hamadryads render each victim unconscious before consuming it.

"It is one of those problems we are always being confronted with," the keeper said. "The Hamadryads would starve to death if we didn't give them live food; the Cerberus water snakes, in their natural surroundings, would almost certainly meet a far more unpleasant end. It is happier for all concerned this way."

New Process Produces Coal From Sugar Cane

NEW YORK.—In an emergency, American farmers may grow the country's soft coal in their fields.

The fact that fairly good soft coal is now being made from sugarcane, the carbohydrates of farm crops, was reported to the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers by E. Berl, of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

The sugar coal is too expensive to be practical, but was made to settle an old controversy about the origin of coal and oil.

In the Carnegie laboratories, whose experts include some of the leading scientists of the coal fields, the artificial coal is made in two ways. Sugar heated in water at high temperature produces a sandy form of coal.

When weak alkali is added to the water, Berl said, "excellent coking coals" are the result. Adding pressure to the hot sugar water increases the amount of carbon in the man-made coal.

These farm-product coals, Berl said, can be treated with hydrogen to make the same products which the Germans and English obtain from "hydrogenated" coal. These products include gasoline and oil for motor cars.

The old idea, said Berl, that coal came from the woody, or lignin, part of plants is as dead as the idea that petroleum is from dead fish. He said that the Carnegie experiments show that coal, oil and bitumen all come from carbohydrates in plants.

Loneliest Lighthouse

Although many seek the job of tending the loneliest lighthouse in the world, that in the Sahara desert, the present tender is the fifth in the beacon's short existence. None has been able to stand the strain of seeing nothing but sand, having no one to talk to and enduring a temperature often more than 140 degrees in the daytime and under 35 degrees at night. According to Cairo reports, one of the first four died of fever, one of thirst and another of gasoline explosion. The fourth went insane. The light guides trans-Sahara air and road traffic. The only regular visitor operates a supply truck which arrives once a week.

England Keeping Fit

England has a keep-fit movement that is growing daily and may become a challenge to the health and youth parades in other countries of Europe. In the county of London alone are more than 100 health centers, where 500 evening health classes are held weekly. In these classes 23,000 young men exercise after business hours. As many more youths are having athletic and physical training in other places each evening. In some exclusive clubs electrical "horses" and "camels" are ridden. The American game of basketball has caught on and promises to become a body-building rage.

Hidden Taxes on Workers

Out of an annual salary of \$1,000 a wage earner pays \$123, or 12.2 per cent to the government in hidden taxes, recent authoritative surveys show. In some cases the amount was found to be as much as 18 per cent, or \$180.

Measuring, for example, is used every time a housewife mixes ingredients, or makes over a dress. Measuring is important to both men and women in judging distances when driving a car.

A ninth-grade course is offered in Grosse Pointe High School to aid in solving these problems which repeatedly confront one in everyday life.

The important object of the course is to stress the "why" and "how" of solutions, as well as to give practice in fundamental arithmetic. Learning why buying insurance is a good policy, how to recognize good investments, and the pros and cons of installment buying are examples of practical material brought out in the six units of the course.

Unit one reviews the fundamental processes of arithmetic, including addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers, fractions, and decimals. Most pupils electing this course have a definite need for this training, which is essential before trying to improve ability to solve any problems.

The second unit is concerned with practical measurement of distances, surfaces, and lumber—recognized to be one of the important mathematics activities in life today.

Unit three is devoted to analyzing problem solutions. Students are taught how to approach solutions to story problems. This is accomplished through several means which include analyzing elements, estimating the result, stating an equation clearly, drawing a sketch, and checking the final answer mathematically.

The fourth unit concerns percentage, and means, in practical and theoretical problems. The family budget, taxes, insurance, banking, and discounts, all of which are a momentous part of everybody's life, are included in this section, and are taken up from a practical standpoint.

Unit five covers information about the interpretation and construction of graphs. Students enjoy making scrap books containing illustrations of the wide use of mathematics in life when the pupil recognizes situations of interest. Many girls list and illustrate problems contacted by the housewife during the course of everyday work.

The last unit allows the student to take a special field in which he is interested. Those intending to take up algebra are given practice with algebraic equations, substitution, and a vocabulary of algebraic terms. Pupils who expect to enter the office practice course, study particular problems in this field.

Classes for beginners will be held on Monday and Friday evenings, 7:30 to 9 o'clock, and on Wednesdays from 1:30 to 3 p. m. A special class in voice training and speech correction will be held on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 8 o'clock.

The office of the society is open daily from 1 to 10 p. m. Information will be gladly given and registrations for the classes taken.

Anyone with impaired hearing is urged to come and see what the society has to offer to the ear-handicapped.

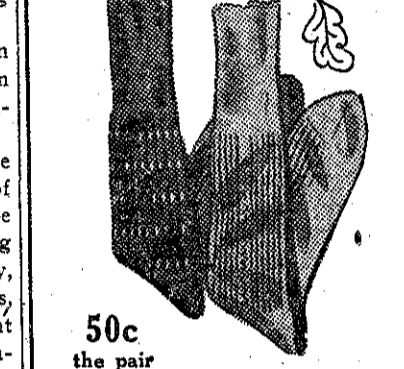

"Well done! Splice the main brace, or do whatever is the educational equivalent thereof," Superintendent Van Kleck said in a note later in the day to the Pierce faculty.

Also present at the opening were Directors E. E. Allen, John R. Barnes and William J. Watkins, who are in charge of the school system's instruction, administrative services, and music department.

Full length sessions were held during the day in the school, as well as in all of the other schools in the system. Each Pierce pupil had been provided by mail with a floor plan of the building showing his own home room and each child had been given an individual schedule of classes and other information. Registration headquarters for late-comers had been set up in the girls' gymnasium but only 30 unanticipated pupils registered. Earlier registration estimates some months ago had totaled 700 pupils and through Sunday night 756 had registered. Monday's registrations took the total to 786 or nearly eight-ninths of the building's capacity of 900 pupils. School officials said that the building was opening filled more nearly to capacity than any other new public school ever opened in the Grosse Pointe communities. Assisting with registrations were Miss Bernice Moore, dean of girls and teacher of English, and Paul June, dean of boys and teacher of mathematics. Despite the opening of the Pierce School, enrollment in the Grosse Pointe High School will be about five-sixths of the building's capacity, with every prospect that the building will be completely filled in another year or two, Dr. Van Kleck announced.

Cost of London Fog
A London "pea soup" fog costs about \$5,000,000 a day, it is estimated. If the invention of a London scientist proves successful, it will be possible to penetrate the fogs to a distance of 10 miles by means of a camera device which throws a vision of the landscape upon a small screen.

Horses Said to Have Excellent Imaginations
The actual intelligence of a horse is limited, says Arthur J. Sari, noted British racing expert, in "Horses, Jockeys and Crooks: Reminiscences of Thirty Years' Racing." Thoroughbreds are endowed with more brains than cart or farm horses, light or heavy drafts, but most big horses seem to have more "savvy" than the little fellows.

All horses have good memories, Mr. Sari says.

"Perhaps you have wondered why some horses prefer certain courses. Nine times out of ten you can take it that these horses gained some pleasurable experience at that particular venue," he explains. "Maybe they won their race and were patted and fussed over by their trainer or jockey; given an apple, a lump of sugar . . . They can tell good treatment from bad, which accounts for their like and dislike of certain people."

"Horses have great imagination. They magnify everything and become bewildered. They are susceptible to fear. That is why they readily accept the idea of man's superiority. They have a wonderful sense of smell."

Mr. Sari has seen an animal fall on two occasions at the same fence, with several months between falls.

"The horse remembers the incident, and fear enters into his heart as he approaches the obstacle at the next time of asking," he believes. "His memory of persons, objects and places causes him to have misgivings."

"And doesn't it apply to us humans as well?" Mr. Sari asks. "What about the boxer who again meets an opponent who has already given him a hiding? It is always odds on the fellow who has done the trick."

London Museum Obtains Old Romanesque Window
Recent acquisitions of the Victoria and Albert museum in London include several notable pieces of sculpture and stained glass. Most important single item is the French Romanesque triple window of stone, which was purchased with the help of a generous contribution from the National Art-Collections fund and erected in the east hall of the museum near the main entrance, says the Times, of London. This window was discovered not long ago during the demolition of an old house close to the Cathedral of Trie Chateau, near Gisors, about 30 kilometers from Beauvais. It consists of three rounded arches, supported on columns with capitals of a late Romanesque character.

Inside each arch is a tympanum with two small pointed arches containing carvings of strange beasts (such as birds with human heads), sirens, and a centaur drawing his bow against a basilisk. The great delicacy of its decoration, especially on the capitals, suggests that the work dates from the end of the Romanesque period, probably from the last part of the Twelfth century.

Among other pieces of sculpture are a Sixteenth century Florentine terra-cotta figure of a reclining woman, thought to be an allegorical representation of history, and ascribed to Giovanni Bologna and the terra-cotta sketch model by J. M. Rysbrack (1693-1770), for the reclining figure of Sir Isaac Newton on his monument in Westminster abbey. The monument itself, erected in 1731, was designed by William Kent, but the figures on it were the work of Rysbrack.

Extensive Study Reveals New Atmospheric 'Pulse'

There are pulse beats in the atmosphere with time periods ranging from six hours to fifty-six years. This is revealed by a detailed mathematical analysis of the barometric pressure readings which have been made for more than 60 years on the island of Mauritius, a British colony in the Indian ocean near Madagascar. The pulse beats are completely intermingled, and it was necessary to submit the curve showing the mixed pulsating record to harmonic analysis which separated the pulses of particular frequencies.

The readings were handled in two groups, one giving the continuous daily record, and the other giving the average pressure by years. The latter showed a 56 year cycle that seemed to be associated with a rainfall cycle of the same period. Pressure cycles of 17 years and of nine years were found. Study over a longer period may reveal that the latter are multiples or submultiples of each other. An annual cycle was found with a minimum in mid-February, the time of highest temperature.

The continuous daily records showed that the strongest component was not the 24 hour cycle, but the 12 hour, the latter having twice the amplitude of the former. The third largest daily factor was the eight-hour cycle, with about half the amplitude of the 24 hour cycle. The smallest factor was the six hour cycle. These various cycles appear to be independent of each other insofar as each exhibits independent phase changes.

U. of D. Team Strong Contenders

With the largest squad of recent years and one that shows unusual promise, Coach Charles E. "Gus" Dorais, of the University of Detroit, will open his training program Monday. Many of the men already are in town and it will be possible to get right down to business on the first day of the practice season. There will be two practice sessions daily except Sunday until college opens, when it will be necessary to confine the football program to the late afternoon.

Because the opening game comes on September 22 this year, a week earlier than usual, Coach Dorais and his assistants will have their hands full whipping the squad into shape. The introductory opponent is Central State Teachers College, a team that, while not generally in the Titans' class, this season is said to be unusually strong. Dorais has had a wholesome respect for all early-season opponents since 1931 when he scheduled a game during the American Legion Convention in mid-September. The foe was considered a push-over before the game but sprang a surprise by whipping the Titans handily, thus wrecking the season.

In view of the imminence of the first game, Detroit is fortunate in that it has a liberal supply of lettermen. There are 17 of them on the squad and, if necessary, "Gus" could use one in every position. It is unlikely that this will happen, however, for the incoming sophomore class is supplying an unusually large amount of fine material. In fact, there are only a few regulars of 1938 who can consider their jobs secure.

The principal task that confronts the coaches at the moment is the development of one end and a left-halfback. Only one flanker of proved worth remains on the squad. There are a dozen or more candidates, but all save Bill Schauer lack experience. Ed Palumbo, the passing and kicking star of the last three seasons has left the left-halfback job wide open. The best looking prospect as of the present time seems to be Al Ghesquiere, who alternated with Palumbo in the position last fall. He is not, however, an ideal type of triple-

threatener and he will have to hustle to beat out some of the sophomores who aspire to hold down this key position.

Line Coach "Bud" Boeringer will have to dig up a couple of second-string tackles before the team can feel secure. He has two exceptionally good ones in Bill Nienstedt, a senior, and Ted Pavelic, a junior, both of whom weigh over 200 pounds and know their business. But behind these two stars there is nobody who has shown himself capable of playing tackle in the varsity manner.

Otherwise the line is in fine shape. The guard material is abundant, with Ed Froelich, Jack McManigal and Cas Brovarney ranking far above average and all wearers of the varsity "D." The center team is perhaps better fortified than any other in the country. Captain Emerson Addison and Jim Temple are lettermen in this position, but they may be ousted by Vincent Banonis and Don Parro, sophomores. Banonis, the former Detroit Catholic Central star, shows promise of developing into the best center that the Titans ever had.

There may be a lively struggle for the starting assignment at quarterback, with Jim Murphy and Jack Charbeneau, lettermen, and John Biringner, sophomore, as the leading candidates. Biringner looked like a star with the freshman team last fall and he has the advantage over the others in that he is considerably bigger and more rugged. He is a former Denby High player, who was out of school a year before entering the Detroit freshman class last fall.

Right halfback is secure, with Nick Pegan and Jack Halpin, lettermen, available, to say nothing of some good ones who will be eligible for the first time. At fullback, Dorais has Jack McDermott, a senior, and a couple of very promising youngsters in Clyde Johnson and Al Goodrich of the class of 1942.

The team is sure to be strong defensively and to have a good running game. It must, however, uncover a capable passer and punter to qualify as thoroughly formidable in all departments. The new sophomores are expected to help out with these specialists, with "Mickey" McLaughlin and Harry Groth, the most promising passers. Ghesquiere may develop into an adequate kicker, though he never has shown what could be called top form in this phase of the game.

The team is fortunate this year in that its first two games are against opponents who ought to be taken in stride. Last fall it opened with Purdue, one of the toughest opponents on the schedule. Catholic University, which will be met in Washington on October 14, is the first of a series of very formidable foes. By that time the Titans should be in shape to give anybody a battle.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event a taxpayer shall have paid to the County Treasurer penalties, fees and interest charges on any Village Tax which interest, fees and penalty charges are cancellable under the above provided Act, that a refund shall be made to such taxpayer, when the returns of such tax have been received from the County Treasurer, and when such returns shall include penalties, fees and interest, which are cancellable as herein provided, such refund to be made in kind.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that tax credit memoranda or certificates of indebtedness may be used in the payment of any tax in the manner heretofore provided by resolution of this Commission, and to no greater extent.

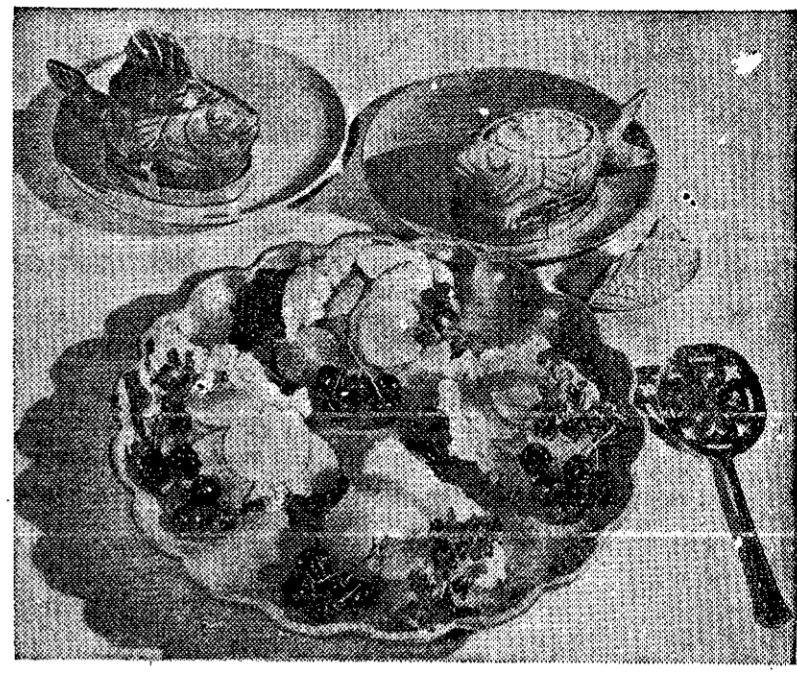

TASTY SUNDAY NIGHT SUPPERS (See Recipes Below)

Sunday Night Suppers

Even though you expect everyone to have had a moon meal with staying power on Sundays, people do like to eat when Sunday evening rolls 'round! To be sure, they like food that's somewhat lighter, and food that's out of the ordinary. So it's a grand time to leave the beaten path and serve something a little different.

If you serve left-overs, be sure to serve them in a new way or with an unusual accompaniment like the jellied chili sauce I've suggested in menu No. 117. If you plan a meal especially for Sunday night, plan one which can be served "help-yourself" style

and arrange foods, dishes and silver on the table so that guests may serve themselves. Appetites will be quickened by the eye-appealing arrangement of the table, and the air of informality makes Sunday night supper a sociable affair.

These menus are suited, too, to serving larger numbers—lodge groups, church organizations or clubs. Recipes for the main dish and salad in every menu are easily increased. Unless you have special recipes and equipment, cakes and pastries are likely to be better if the single recipe is used.

Lettuce and Tomatoes with Roquefort Cheese Dressing.
(Serves 6)

1 head lettuce
2 tomatoes
1/4 pound Roquefort cheese (crumbled)
French dressing
Remove coarse outer leaves from head of lettuce. Cut into wedges. Peel tomatoes, remove stem end, and cut in to eighths. Place in salad bowl with the lettuce. Add crumbled Roquefort cheese and French dressing. Toss lightly until well mixed.

Cocoa Marshmallow Cake.
2 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup sweet milk
2 cups brown sugar
3 eggs (separated)
1/2 cup butter
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 cups cake flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sour milk

Place cocoa, sweet milk, 1 cup brown sugar, and 1 egg yolk (beaten) in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water, until mixture is well blended. Cool. Cream butter, and add remaining cup of brown sugar while beating constantly. Add the two remaining egg yolks, together with the vanilla extract and mix thoroughly. Then mix and sift all dry ingredients and add alternately with the sour milk. Beat egg whites stiff but not dry, and fold into the cake mixture.
Place in 2 well greased layer cake pans and bake in a moderately hot

oven (375 degrees) approximately 30 minutes. Ice with boiled icing to which 8 marshmallows (cut in quarters) have been added.

Jellied Chili Sauce.
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1 cup chili sauce (or catsup)
Soak gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Add to chili sauce, which has been heated to the boiling point, and stir until dissolved. Pour into tiny paper cups, individual molds, or small pan from which the chili sauce may be sliced or cut in attractive shapes when firm. Chill thoroughly before serving.

Tuna Casserole.
1 7-ounce can tuna
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup cooked peas
1 can button mushrooms
2 cups cooked noodles (medium width)
Salt, pepper and butter
1 cup milk

Butter individual baking dishes. Sprinkle tuna with lemon juice. (This brings out the tuna flavor). Arrange alternate layers of tuna, peas, mushrooms and noodles, putting noodles on top. Season each layer with salt and pepper. Dot top generously with butter. Pour milk into dish and top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes. (Serves 4-6.)

Toasted Loaf.
Trim top and side crusts from a loaf of unsliced white bread. Cut through the center of the loaf, lengthwise, cutting just to the lower crust, but not through it. Then cut crosswise, spacing the cuts about 2 inches apart. Brush top and sides generously with melted butter. Toast in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) until the loaf is golden brown. Serve hot.

There are so many points to be considered in planning meals. One which is all too likely to be overlooked is this—that the dessert is more than something to satisfy the family's "sweet tooth"; it really plays an important part in the menu.

Clam Chowder.
(Serves 6.)
1/2 cup carrot (chopped)
2 tablespoons onion (chopped)
1 1/4 cups potato (chopped)
1/4 cup celery (chopped fine)
1 pint clams
2 cups water and clam liquor
Salt and pepper to taste
1 pint milk
3 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons butter
1 1/2 tablespoons parsley
1/2 teaspoon paprika

Chop the vegetables in small pieces and place in large kettle. Chop the clams and add together with the clam liquor, water, salt, and pepper. Cover and cook about 1/2 hour, or until vegetables are tender. Scald milk. Make a smooth paste of the flour and water. Add half of this flour paste to the clam mixture and half to the scalded milk. Cook each, stirring constantly, until the mixture thickens. Combine and add butter, parsley and paprika. Serve very hot.

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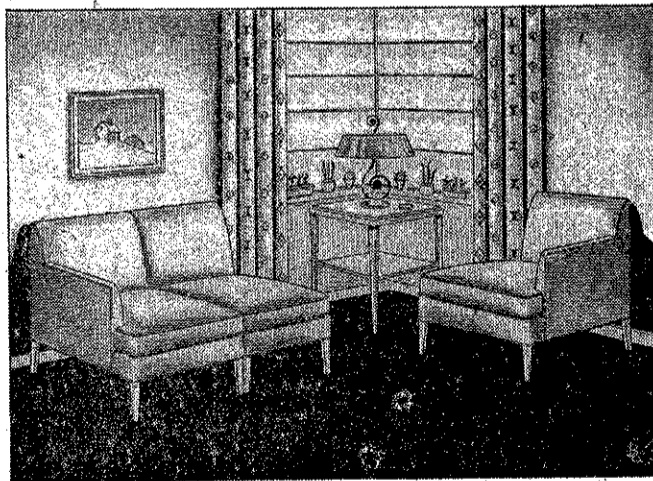

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Value of Wheat Revealed

In Early Biblical Times

Wheat has been the most important cereal in international commerce since Biblical times, says the National Geographic society.

"Wheat's supremacy has endured throughout history," the society reported, "since Biblical days when Hiram, king of Tyre, sent timber of cedar and fir for King Solomon's temple at Jerusalem in barter for 20,000 measures of wheat.

"Stock tickers on modern exchanges record the same transaction for which Jacob's 10 sons journeyed from Israel's famine to Egypt's ever-normal granary established by their brother, Prime Minister Joseph.

"Wheat, called King of Cereals, is simply grass gone handsomely to seed. Each flower packs all available earth's foods and sun's energy into its fruitage of golden nuggets. The ripe grains are in fact seeds, cunningly stored with food for the coming winter."

The society, in the first of a series of reports on "Commodities: Common and Uncommon," said development of American wheat resources—and the machinery to harvest vast tracts—gave the world its first inexpensive wheat. Before American mass production dropped the price of wheat, only the rich could afford wheat bread. The masses ate black bread of barley or rye.

"As American inventiveness gave large-scale planting a sudden impetus," the report said, "the winning of the western plains gave it a place. Minnesota earned the official nickname of the Wheat state."

Norway Used Dragons

China is not the only country in which dragons are used as a decorative motif. The old "stavkirker" or wooden churches, built centuries ago when Christianity was young, are forming one of few links between modern Norway and the Viking past, still show dragon heads on gable ends. For centuries the dragon was one of the favorite emblems of pagan Norway, especially as a figurehead for the prows of her Viking ships. The men who built the ships and decorated them with dragon heads also built the nation's first churches. The church structure allowing them more exercise of imagination, Viking carpenters not only put dragons on the gables but also carved those emblems into the columns, the capitals and even the door frames of the buildings.

Washington's Home

George Washington wrote of Mount Vernon: "No estate in the United States is more pleasantly situated than this. It lies in a high, dry and healthy country, 800 miles by water from the sea, and on one of the finest rivers in the world. I can truly say that I had rather be at Mount Vernon with a friend or two about me than to be attended at the seat of government by the officers of state and the representatives of every power in Europe."

Harnessing the Sun

More than 12,000 residents of Miami, Fla., are harnessing sunlight to get hot water. So powerful is Miami's sun that a glass tank containing coils of copper tubing on the roof of a house will heat water to 208 degrees, and in six hours enough hot water can be run off into a thermos-like reservoir to last the average family three days. The complete equipment sells for about \$175.

Thursday Weddings in Amsterdam If you wish to see a Dutch wedding during your holiday in Holland, plan to be at the Old Church in Amsterdam any Thursday, for on Thursdays the fees are lowest. One couple is hardly united before there is another couple at the door, and the brides and grooms continue to come all day.

Last Two States The forty-seventh and forty-eighth states to join the Union were New Mexico, January 6, 1912, and Arizona, February 14, 1912.

Heirs Ousted Rockville, Md., dedicated its new \$77,000 post office—but only after police had routed two elderly and bellicose sisters who used a hatchet to hammer "no trespassing" signs into the smooth green lawn and ordered all and sundry, "Take to your heels! This is our property." The sisters asserted they were among eight heirs of the former owner of the site and had received nothing from the government under condemnation proceedings.

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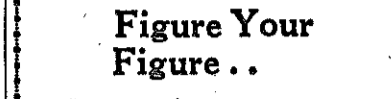
