### Novel Traveling Air Show To Be At Pierce Junior High

From the magic carpet to rocket ships, the new Traveling Air Show of the Franklin Institute Philadelphia, will trace the development of "Man's conquest over the air" at Pierce Junior High on Saturday, Dec. 2.

The show will be given under the auspices of the Parent-Teachers Association. In thirtynine thrilling demonstrations, including actual flying models and ultra high speed motion pictures, the story of human flight will be presented from the drawings of Leonardo da Vinci to Clipper Ships. How and why airplanes fly will be demonstrated through the use of flying models of various types of aircraft. What aeronautical engineers have learned from birds will be shown through slides and slow-motion studies of bird flights, from the tiny humming bird to the great Pterodactyl.

This novel scientific attraction was made possible by the funds of the Carnegie Corporation of New York, and is a presentation of the Franklin Institute, in Philadelphia whose unique dramatized exhibits of scientific achievements attract thousands of visitors weekly. Founded in 1824, in Institute has promoted the advancement of science and the mechanic arts for more than a century.

### Grosse Pointe U. of M. Club Growing Fast

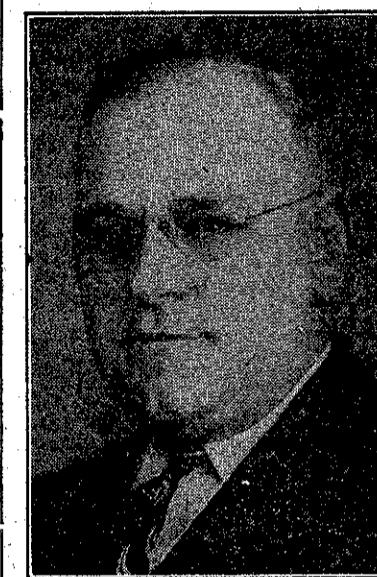

### Trend of Events

While the great armies in Europe are idling their time away European chancelleries are seething with diplomatic activities.

Hitler, who by now should know what kind of help he may expect from Stalin is attempting a supreme effort to try and persuade the Russians to abandon their unfriendly and carry policy by granting the Third Reich the extensive credits it so badly needs in order to counteract the effects of the British blockade. The Russians who are playing the game to their own benefit have so far turned down all German offers which may have steered them away from their profitable policy.

Soviet Russia wants to play safe. This tends to prove that at the present stage, osep Stalin is the only European statesman to follow a definite line of action; the others are merely improvising. Their moves depend not on their will nor on preconceived plans, but on whatever the opponent may do next. This probably explains why the game so far, has been so mysterious and dull.

Failure to secure effective support from Moscow is said to have greatly dismayed and embittered the Nazi government lately. To make things worse, Rumania for a reason known only too well in Berlin reduced its exports of badly needed oil and cereals to Germany to microscopic proportions. And, as misfortunes always come by batches, a state of extreme unease was reported in Poland; riots broke out at Prague where the plucky Czechs could not forget their lost freedom. All this was more than needed for the jittery Berlin moguls to lose their temper.

But in spite of drastic actions, the heedless Romanians are still making faces at the Nazi war lords; the Czechs and the Poles still refuse to submit and the German monarchists claim their bombs will be timed more accurately the next time they are given a chance to take a whack at the Fuehrer. No wonder Hitler is losing weight!

The big push on the Western Front planned by Nazi strategists has been spiked by the German High Command. It is said that responsible German military leaders fail to see how a successful drive could be attempted against the reputedly impregnable defenses of the Maginot line. The rush which had been at one time contemplated to take place through Holland and Belgium also is reported to have been abandoned as impracticable. The Dutch have the sea and the dikes on their side; the Belgians have their own replica of the Maginot line. With the Allies backing them both. And since the German High Command has repeatedly warned the Reichsfuehrer Adolph Hitler that reverses out in the field would most certainly be followed by internal trouble or worse, the Nazi have meekly sided with the views of the Army which favors a wait-and-see policy.

Nazi Germany is not alone in this predicament. The Allies themselves are not entirely immune to this internal weakness. For nobody can, as yet tell how those who have fought in the last war will behave under heavy gunfire. So far, the governments involved have seen to it that only younger generations which know nothing of war's horrors face one another in the field. The paralysis effect of this uncertainty alone—to say nothing of the hovering Red menace, is enough to keep Germany and the Allies in tactical expectancy.

That Austria may retrieve her independence is being hinted more and more insistently in Allied diplomatic circles following talks last week in Paris between members of the French Cabinet and handsome Prince Ernst von Starhemberg, former Vice-Chancellor of Austria ex-chief of the Heimwehr and erstwhile protegee of Premier Benito Mussolini.

Kentucky Colonel A Kentucky colonel is appointed by the governor of the state and one does not have to make application. There are no general qualifications for the office. It is purely honorary.

An Ordinance

To Amend the Zoning Ordinance by Adding Section VIII A. The City of Grosse Pointe ordains: Section 1. The Zoning Ordinance shall be amended by adding Section VIII A as follows: SECTION VIII A (1) Whenever the rear of business property in Local Business Districts or Commercial Districts does not face upon a public street there may be an open space in the rear thereof to be used as hereinafter designated. The further boundary line of such open space shall not extend more than 250 feet from the front line of the business zone.

(2) Such space shall be used by the abutting business only for access to the rear of such business and by the customers of the abutting business for free parking. The parking shall be so arranged that there shall be at all times an open space between the rear of the business building and the space used for parking of at least twenty feet to be used for access to the rear of such building.

(3) No structure of any kind, including any gas pump, etc., shall be erected upon such open space.

(4) No business of any kind shall be conducted upon such open space nor shall any charge be made for any parking.

(5) No such place shall be used without a written permit being granted for the use of the same by the building commissioner of the City of Grosse Pointe and upon the approval of the council. Such permit shall not be issued unless and until the owner of such property places the same in a safe, sanitary and clean condition with adequate hard surface and drainage, and erects between such parking space and adjoining property, in a residential district, and alongside any public sidewalk within the property line, a wire or metal fence not over six feet in height and so constructed that vehicles will not encroach upon such adjoining property or sidewalk. The applicant for such permit must agree to abide by all the provisions hereof. Failure to keep such space in the condition herein required and to abide by all the provisions hereof shall be cause for cancellation of the permit by the building commissioner after ten days' written notice served upon the one to whom the permit was issued.

(6) Upon its ceasing to be used for such purpose as specified herein, its use shall revert to the use provided for in this ordinance prior to its use as above.

(7) This amendment shall be effective ten days after publication. Adopted November 20, 1939 Published November 30, 1939 In effect December 12, 1939 NORBERT P. NEFF, City Clerk.

An Ordinance

To Amend an Ordinance to Provide for the Collection of Water Charges. The City of Grosse Pointe ordains: Section 1. Section 2 of an ordinance to provide for the collection of water charges, prescribing penalties for failure to pay the same; and making the charges a lien against the real property on which the service was rendered of the same character and effect as the lien created by state and county taxes, until paid is hereby amended.

Section 2. That in accordance with Act No. 178 of the Public Acts of 1939, there shall be a lien on real property in the City of Grosse Pointe for water assessments and the Treasurer of the City of Grosse Pointe is authorized to charge as taxes against real property any water bill involving such property and unpaid for a period of three years, such charge to be made a part of the real property tax the fourth year after the failure of the payment of the water bill.

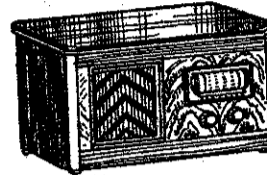

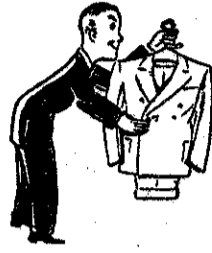


