It is hoped by the committee that as many prints as possible will be turned in at that meeting.

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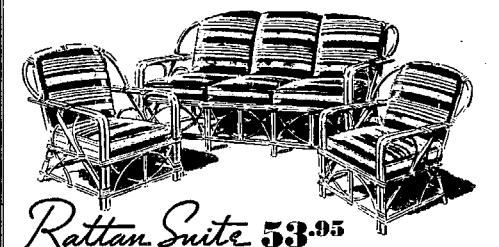
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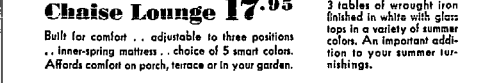
