### Full Stomachs

To those who recall the enthusiasm that stirred the Ameri-can people twenty-four years ago this spring it is somewhat mystifying that we have heard so little in the present about the determining role that food plays in survival in war.

Out of crops which were below average that year, by our thrift and energy and volunary particit cooper-stion, we sent across the waters to our embattled allies food the people of this country. It was their instant recogni-tion of a simple truth and their willingness to make a parti-otic response to the appeal of the government which put across this splendid effort. It won the war in that it canabled the British people to carry on until our military resources could be developed and hrought to bear to change the issue from mere survival to final victory. The situation with Britism must be much more critical

from mere survival to final victory. The situation with Britian must be much more critical today than it was in any period of the last war. The struggle to carry on is more intense nore than then. In the axiely for the early delivery of munitions for defense there has been little said that has reached the public ear regarding food, and yet in the very nature of the situation this must be a perilous problem just wailing around the corner. There is a concensus of opinion that all Europe will be faced next winter with the most apaling food shoring that has courred on that con-tinent within the memory of any to find a start. It would be prudent food as provide in this country to make ready now to any polement the food supply of large scale acreage produc-tion by such foods as can be produced by individual work on gardens and small plots.

In our own community a leaf might be taken out of the past of forty odd years ago when under the leadership of Mayor Pingree this region earned a national reputation by growing potatoes on city lots to supplement the food supply during a time of distress.

time of distress. The military implication of an assured food supply is that, it is the greatest contributing factor towards sustaining the morals of the people. It takes a long time to destroy a people by the blasting of mere bricks and mortar, short of their quick overwhelming by lighting war. England's immediate problem is to defeat such an assault on her own soil and there is greater promise of the success of such a defense if their stomachs are filled, with strength-giving, spirit-nourishing food.

Incidental to this subject, the question might well be put whether this country is longer justified in spending out of its public funds. So desperately needed for the production of war materials, money for the subsidizing of agriculture, when that business promises in the near future to become by the proven processes of supply and demand one of the most remnerative in the land.
