# Police Chief Warns Public In New Report

### Winter Weather is Big Driving Menace, Chief Piv Says

Wintery blasts with accompanying snow and ice usually start in late December, but the full effect of "Old Man Winter" on traffic and public safety will be felt in January and February, Chief of Police, Henry W. Piel, of Grose Pointe, declared today.

In a warning to drivers and pedestrians Chief Piel cited that the normal winter weather usually is not so severe in northern states, will likely be less this year because of War Emergency activities. In some communities, he pointed out, January, February and March traffic even may increase over previous summer high-traffic times when major hazards, slippery snow and ice along with reduced visibility, are at their worst. "In line with rules recommended earlier this winter by the War Department and the International Association of Chiefs of Police to minimize traffic tie-ups and accidents, public cooperation is requested when dangerous weather conditions prevail," said Chief Piel.

### Street Bad

"When hazardous conditions arise, and they do, it is during and immediately after snow or ice storms, motorists should cooperate in conserving gas by using speed, maintaining adequate contact with windshield wipers, drivers should not attempt to stop on dry traction with tire chains—'NO STOP DRIVE' the Chief advised.

The following logical precautions, based on exhaustive research by the National Safety Council, are recommended for Winter Driving Hazards, now become necessary when conditions warrant:

1. Start snow or ice free on wheels.

# Rector Gives Safety Hints

### Park's Assistant Fire Chief Cites Necessity of Speed in Repeating Fires

"Delayed alarms do the most harm," cautioned Edward Rector, assistant fire chief of Grose Pointe Park, before the Grose Pointe Rotary club at its weekly luncheon meeting Monday, in the Whittier.

As a factor in the prevention talk, warned members that accidents are inevitable in fire fighting operations and the most serious of any place can do the most harm.

"If we can reach the fire in time," he said, "we have a good chance of controlling it before it becomes any damage."

### Know Phone Number

Chief Rector warned that all citizens should be aware of their fire department's phone number, and also the location of the nearest fire box.

"However," he stated, "most homes are not equipped with a telephone operator. When a room is filled with smoke it is impossible to make a call in the dial. In this case, feet for the stop arm on the phone and remember the home phone number is the operator's dial number."

"It is also important," he said, "to report just where your fire is. Give the street, and in which village or city you live. Just giving in Grose Pointe will cause confusion of delay as the operator will check to see which village department to notify."

### Ways to Prevent Fires

Chief Rector listed several ways to prevent fires, which included watches and cigarettes, never clean clothes with flammable cleaning materials, and always keep matches away from children.

The Chief also reported to the job interesting fire figures for the first year in the United States. Last year, he revealed, 15,000 persons lost their lives in fires which killed 4, 830,000,000 damage. There are 100,000,000 homes in the United States which revealed that there are 65 per cent of all fires reported in the United States. "Every two minutes," he stated, "there was a house fire somewhere in the United States and every five seconds fire every day in the country."

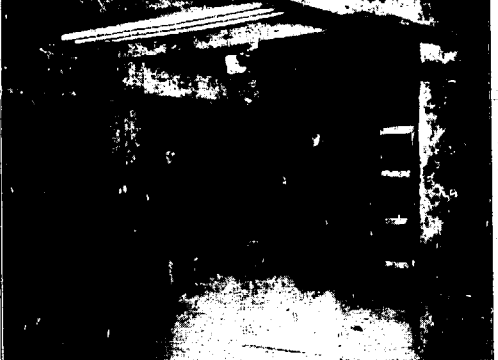

In June Newberry enlisted in the navy at the lowest yeoman rating. Just two days before he was scheduled to be inducted into the Selective Service Army.

Newberry received his selective service classification in December, 1940 and returned it to local Draft Board 53 requesting that he be deferred on occupational grounds. He was granted a two months occupational deferment but returned his request for an extension and later received his occupational deferment on physical grounds. He carried his case to appeal agents, but was turned down and placed in IA.

Newberry applied for a commission as yeoman in the Navy, but this was denied. Then he enlisted as a third class yeoman.

At the time of his enlistment, Newberry told the News: "My request for a commission in the Navy was not yet been accepted. I was down in Washington and the Naval authorities assured me that just as soon as there is a vacancy my application will be considered and I will be transferred."
