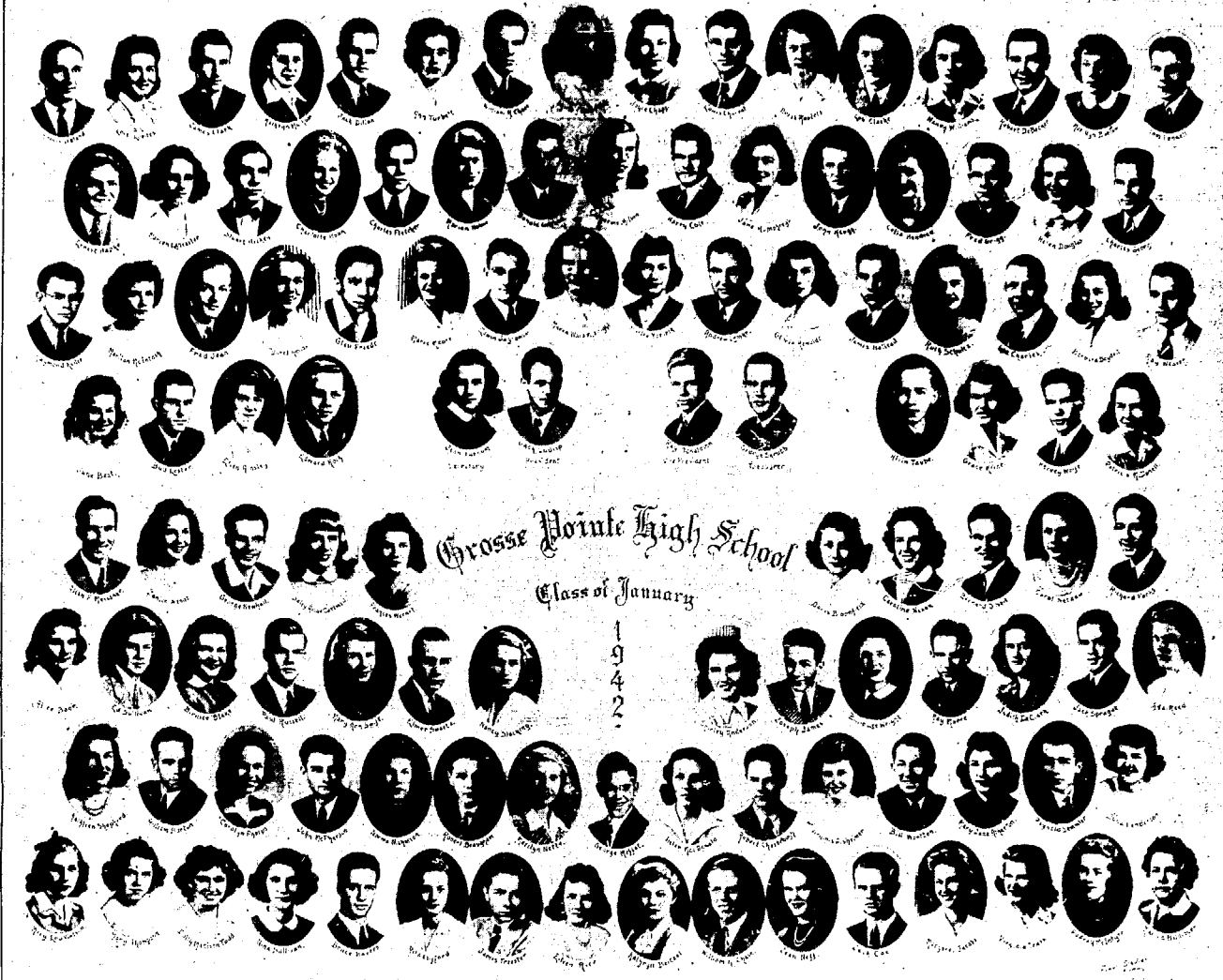


Grosse Pointe High Hands Out Diplomas To Graduates

The Queen of the Great Lakes bid farewell to her Queen home Friday and entered the service of her country.

The 32,000 Anna Dodge Dillman yacht, the Delta II, left her moorings at the Dillman estate, 17840 Jefferson, sailed into Lake St. Clair and headed for a drydock where she will be reconditioned and converted into an auxiliary for war service.

The yacht was built in 1921. Just two years later she caught fire and was burned to the water level. She has had a long and colorful career since.

State Office Lauds Pointe Branch Head

Cudia Handles \$2,072,702 Worth of Business, According to Report

Since Harry F. Kelly became Secretary of State in 1939, the Grosse Pointe Branch Office of the Department of State has handled business totaling \$2,072,702.85 according to a report just released by Manager John Cudia, of Macombfield avenue.

During 1941 a total of 47,752 license plates were issued by the office, representing the bulk of fees received.

Manager Cudia was highly praised by Mr. Kelly in a statement accompanying the report.

"He has conducted the office efficiently and has given excellent service to the motoring public," Mr. Kelly said.

Big Jump in Licenses

The 21 branch offices in Wayne County handled a business of \$24,310,551.81, of which \$9,200,000 was from gasoline tax.

Harold L. Harvey, Chief of the Investigation Bureau in this district, reports collections of \$10,380,500 which the state would have received had not investigators issued 250 tickets for violations of the Motor Vehicle Law.

For the whole state, department collections in 1941 totaled approximately \$75,000,000, \$6,000,000 more than in 1940, and were realized from the following major collections:

Gasoline Tax, \$35,922,827.75, an increase of \$1,655,167.73 over 1940.

Sales Tax on Automobiles, \$11,171,454.24, an increase of \$2,731,443.50.

Titles, \$1,092,205.73, an increase of \$171,726.40.

Operators and Chauffeurs' Licenses, \$1,431,740.90, an increase of \$25,422.20.

Use Own Postoffice Because of the huge volume of business handled, the Department of State is the only state division having its own postoffice.

During 1941 over four million, two hundred thousand pieces of mail were handled.

The Title Department and the Operators and Chauffeurs' Division issued over 400,000 more titles and licenses than in 1940.
