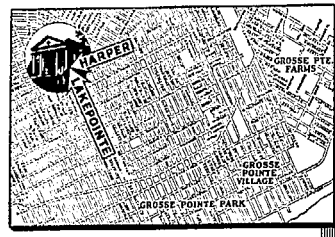

VERNIER SCHOOL. Pupils in Mr. Jameson's room have built a museum in their room and have brought donations from their homes. On Tuesday, the mothers came to see it. The oldest exhibit is 809 years old.

RICHARD SCHOOL. The modern elementary school makes numerous contacts with the children of the school district. The appearance of the mothers or fathers at the school in 19-30 days was a rare sign that Johnny had done something serious which had to be attended to right away. The school program was very simple in nature. The three R's made up the bulk of the work.

There were no activities in particular. Parties at school to which the parents were invited were very infrequent events. The school life of the child being very simple, there was no need of calling in the parents to explain the program to them. The report card gave them sufficient evidence of the growth and progress of their children. This education has moved a long way in the last generation.

Research tells us much more concerning the growth and development of children. The skill subject still are very important, but the modern school concerns itself much with personality and character development. It assures the obligation of keeping the parents informed of the important task it has to do. This is the home school and various neighborhood agencies work together cooperatively for the best interest of all.

To illustrate some of the ways in which the Richard school intervenes in the lives of the children of the facts for the period September to February might be arrived at follows. During this period there were nine teas. There were eight observation lessons. By an observation lesson is meant an occasion when the teacher carried on regular school work and invited the parents to see how the modern school program is carried on.

There was one luncheon, a very interesting and valuable experience to children. They prepared the lunch, remained at noon and and their mothers came and eat with them. The 19 teachers of the school made a total of 245 home calls during this five month period. They had 345 conferences with parents. They put on four special programs at which parents were invited.

Besides these events 400 turned out to the Parent-Teacher Association meetings. 175 came to the teacher reception and 400 came to the Christmas program. In all there were more than 2000 contacts made between the school and its public.

A number of the staff members of the school are taking course work and carrying on profitable activities besides their school work. The campus is taking a course in the history of the English language. Blanche Clark is studying Greek and the Rev. Aulis Howarth and Olive Selke are both studying recreational leadership at Wayne.

Victory Gardening

Selection Of Vegetables

When the snow is deep and winter begins to seem long and dreary seed catalogues begin to fascinate the amateur gardener. Just a few words of advice in the selection of seeds for your vegetable garden.

If the garden is small do not consider peas or corn at all as the yield is small unless you can plant a large space.

Beets and carrots are satisfactory if the garden is a good size but remember how very cheap they are in the stores and that their flavor does not change much with longer picking. If the soil is heavy these root vegetables are very stubby.

Cabbage is cheap in the stores and the worms will get more cabbage than the usual amateur will be able to pick.

Brussels green and wax are easy to grow and if picked young are delicious and taste very different, if you keep planting beans ten days apart you will have plenty to eat.

Peas Chard is a good green, easy to grow and quite decorative in appearance.

New Zealand Spinach is prolific in a small area and excellent if picked young.

Radishes and a little leaf lettuce planted several times will be plentiful for salads. A parsley row, a plant of chives, and a row of mint and you will welcome the results in your kitchen nearly every day.

Tomatoes are one of the easiest things to grow and the most prolific. Plan to buy a few good sturdy plants about Memorial Day and set them out. Four plants will give an average family all the tomatoes they can use from the middle of July until frost. These could be trained on a fence if you have no garden at all. A dozen plants would give an average family plenty of tomatoes for the table and for canning also. A canned tomato shortage is anticipated so set out tomato plants somewhere.

Two or four green pepper plants will give you an ample pepper supply.

Do not be carried away by seed catalogues. Think over your space and plan on the really productive seeds. The amateur had better not try to raise plants himself but plan to buy them about the end of May. Forget the plants until Memorial Day but plan now for your food.
