



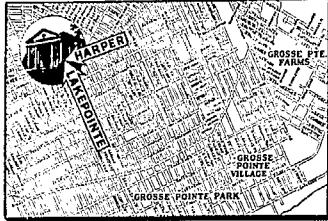

The Detroit Alumnae Club of Pi Beta Phi National College Women's Sorority will celebrate the seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of the National Society at a luncheon meeting to be held in the Colony Town club on Saturday, April 26, at 1 o'clock.

The celebration is of particular importance in the history of college women's societies, as Pi Beta Phi is one of the oldest national college societies in the country and the first to observe its seventy-fifth birthday. Many grey-haired granddaughters of early members are now active in college chapters.

Breakfast Orange Juice, Cream Corn, scrambled Eggs, Toast, Coffee

Luncheon Club Sandwiches, Berry Fluff, Milk or Tea

Dinner Broiled Beef Cutlet, Mashed Potatoes, Glazed Onions, Head Lettuce, Bread Pudding, Coffee

RECIPES Club Sandwiches 12 slices bread, Softened butter, 8 slices tomato, 8 slices crisp bacon, 1 lb. cheddar cheese, 1/2 cup milk.

Method: Toast bread; spread with butter, cover with tomato slices. Place another slice of toast over tomato; cover with crisp bacon. Top with third slice of

toast. Melt cheese in double boiler. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Pour sauce over each sandwich. Garnish with sweet pickles and radishes. Serves 4.

Berry Fluff 1 cup raspberries, 1 egg white, Pinch salt, 1/2 cup sugar.

Method: Clean berries, crush and chill. Beat egg white with salt until stiff. Beat in sugar and add crushed berries. Serve in parfait glasses. Garnish with whole berries. Serves 4.

Mashed Carrots 4 cups cooked carrots, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 3 tablespoons butter melted, 4 tablespoons hot cream.

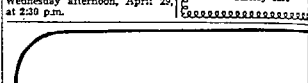
