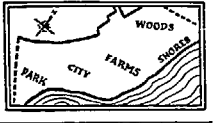

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Death Trap for Victim of Speeders



The year's most tragic automobile death in Grosse Pointe occurred yesterday noon when Mrs. Florence Ortwine, 56, of 329 S. Clair died when her automobile collided with another at Cadieux and St. Paul. After the impact the car exploded and burst into flames. The driver of the car, Kenneth Kelly, of Cedar Grove street, Detroit, was burned severely when he tried to rescue Mrs. Ortwine from the wreck. A small terrier dog was also trapped in the death car.

Call Town Meeting To Probe Home Rule

The Citizens' Association of Grosse Pointe Park sponsors a gathering in Pierce to hear both sides of the question. Taking their cue from the old New England town meetings, members of the Citizens' Association of Grosse Pointe Park have arranged a gathering of civic-minded residents of the Pointe area to discuss the pros and cons of the Home Rule amendment. The meeting will be held in the Pierce Junior High school on Kercheval avenue, Friday night, May 22, at 8 o'clock. Any one interested is urged to be present.

The idea for the meeting was suggested by a request from the Civic League of Detroit, sponsoring the Home Rule amendment. Various local municipal authorities last week voiced their opposition to the amendment as proposed, though in favor of the Home Rule movement, on the grounds that it was unfair to the Pointe.

The Detroit Civic league has asked a chance to explain its side of the question, and the town meeting idea seemed to members of the Park Civic group, to be the proper answer.

Farrel B. Weber to head Kiwanis Club in Pointe. The Grosse Pointe area is to have a Kiwanis Club, it has been revealed. Tentative plans call for a charter night celebration at the Pointe, probably in the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, when the charter will be given to numbers about 35 men.

Boys Needed for Messenger Service in Civilian Defense. Pointe area boys are being asked to take their part in the war effort by serving as messengers for the O.C.D. Non-combat boys 15 years of age are being sought for in this important capacity for civilian defense.

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Leads Towns Of Same Size For Year 1941

Mayor Mason P. Rumney Informed of Good News by AAA President. The City of Grosse Pointe is the safest municipality with a population of 10,000 or less in the United States! This was established this week when the municipality received official notification that it had been awarded first place among cities with a population of less than 10,000 for its record of accomplishments during 1941 in improving pedestrian safety conditions for its citizens.

The award, made in the third National Pedestrian Protection Contest, and sponsored by the American Automobile Association, was revealed by Thomas P. Henry, president of the AAA, in a letter to Mayor Rumney.

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Police Department Credited With Winning Safety Award

Main credit for the City of Grosse Pointe's outstanding safety work in the past year should go to Police Chief Thomas V. Trombly and his department. Mayor Mason P. Rumney said this week in commenting on the announcement that Grosse Pointe was awarded first place in the national contest for cities of less than 10,000 population, for improving pedestrian safety conditions.

"Chief Trombly and his department have done a fine job throughout the year in assuring all of our residents the greatest possible safety protection on our streets and highways," Mayor Rumney declared.

Grosse Pointe has been a leader in adopting the relatively new idea of equipping scout cars with emergency ambulance stretchers. This, according to experts, assures maximum speed in handling traffic accidents.

And in the safety record, despite the recognized increase in automobile traffic in 1941. Grosse Pointe had only 21 more accidents in '41 than in '40, a slack year, according to automotive figures. This decline can be attributed to a continuing campaign all our streets have put on to instruct and warn their driving populations.

Grosse Pointe City has again taken the lead in new traffic safety under War time conditions. Its police department was the first in the nation to equip its police cars with authorized O.C.D. red warning lights. These identify the police cars cruising the streets during blackouts, as emergency cars.

And just this week, the department has put into active service an emergency service truck capable of handling air-raid casualties such as live wires, small fires. The truck is also equipped with stretchers and has red warning lights.

Many Pointers Hear Hershey Answer Puzzling Questions Relating to Draft Program. National Director of Selective Service Outlines Future Plans Which Are Expected to Dramatically Affect All.

Sparking before a near capacity audience in the Detroit Masonic Temple auditorium last Monday night, Major General Lewis B. Hershey, National Director of the Selective Service, outlined America's probable future draft program, and indirectly answered many of the questions which have recently arisen at Local Selective Service Board 57.

In the audience were about 500 Grosse Pointers who attended lectures as representatives from the local Draft Board and various churches and other institutions partly effected by the draft program.

General Hershey, in his quiet homespun Indiana manner, spared no pains in an all out cooperative war effort. He stated that there was no deferment in Selective Service, and that persons who took safety in their own hands by evading the draft, would be sought out.

General Hershey stated that there would be no blanket deferment given defense workers without home dependencies. He stated that plants should ask deferments only as long as it was needed to train a man to replace the possible selective. "We're fighting for our liberty," he said, "and even skilled factory workers who are fighting our war must have to be called. It is the responsibility of owners of plants and factories to find replacements."

Girls Relate True Account Of Accident

Youngsters Who Had Skipped School Admit Being in Car When Crash Occurred. Two teen age Detroit girls are to appear before the Wayne County Prosecutor this morning and tell a tale of horror... about the car in which they were riding, speeding 50 miles per hour through the stop street at St. Paul and Cadieux, and sending a Grosse Pointe woman to her death.

This startling development came late last night as City of Grosse Pointe Police officers were riding in the automobile which was involved in the fatal crash on St. Paul and Cadieux, and sending a Grosse Pointe woman to her death.

They were in the car, driven by Kenneth Kelly, 29, of Cedar Grove avenue, Detroit, which was traveling at a speed of more than 60 feet, rolling over twice before it finally exploded and burst into flames.

Detective Sergeant Edward Trombly interviewed the Detroit girls late last night and they told him Kelly was speeding 50 miles per hour when he drove through the stop street. They also told Sergeant Trombly that Kelly had told them to get out of the car when they saw the accident.

Police Chief Thomas V. Trombly said that he would issue a neglect homicide warrant will be asked against Kelly. If found guilty on this charge, Kelly faces a 15-year prison sentence.

City of Grosse Pointe police acted quickly yesterday after they discovered the wreckage of the car which Kelly drove. (Continued on Page 4)

Many Traffic Violations Bring Youth Heavy Fine. Clinton Jackson, 19, a colored youth from 946 E. Ferry street, Detroit, went through a red light at Jefferson and Beaudreault on March 24.

A little more than two months later, Jackson paid the penalty, a fine of \$22.

The reason for Jackson's high fine were: the youth was on probation at the time in Detroit; he had no operators license; he failed to answer two Grosse Pointe Park court summons.

After Jackson failed to come to court on April 1, he was picked up by police and brought to the station where he was tried. Following payment of his fine, he was turned over to the local Probation Officers for further action.

School Census Being Taken

According to the Michigan State Law, each school district in the state is required to take an annual school census during the last twenty days of May. This enumeration was started in Grosse Pointe on May 12, and every home in the community will be visited in an enumerators' list.

All families, whether there are children of school age, or not, are required by law to give the necessary information. All enumerators have been furnished with an identification card, signed by L. Barrett, Director of Census Enumeration for the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

Census is made necessary for the accurate keeping of the census records, kept on file at the local Board of Education. Officers and the Department of Public Instruction in Lansing, may be made. All children between the ages of birth and twenty years of age, inclusive in the district are included in these records.

The accurate keeping of these records is essential, since they determine the appointment of the Primary Interest and administrative funds to the local district by the state. This year the Grosse Pointe School District has received more than \$100,000, or about \$100 per child between the ages of five and twenty, from this fund.

Basic For Planning. These census data also serve as the basis for planning the organization of schools and for predicting the growth of each school in the district in a rapidly growing community like Grosse Pointe such information is invaluable for planning the present and future educational needs of the district.

Due to the importance of the school census, accurate information from parents is desired. Probably the greatest difficulty encountered by enumerators when called at the time is obtaining the correct date of birth for each child in the family. Parents' cooperation in this respect is asked.

Four dollars, three days, boys about three dollars worth of goods—the war program has been set up in the Pointe, but fewer things to spend it on.

Assignments are to be made as far as possible, in the immediate vicinity of the boys' homes, but some boys will be required for downtown messenger service.

It is planned to use junior messengers, or the younger group, only during daylight hours. Those 15 or older will be assigned when necessary to night duties, and will be considered for service under any conditions prescribed for messengers.

Troop leaders now have application blanks by which scouts, scouts, alerts or other emergencies, and is not a messenger service for any other time. Scouts with bicycles are particularly in demand.

Canape Milano: Place 1 measure of tomato on top of crisp lettuce leaves. Lay a slice of Italian salami and the tomato. Cut raw cabbage in julienne style, mix with a dash of French dressing. Form this raw cabbage into dome-shaped over the tomato. Lay crosswise over each dome 2 fillets of anchovies. Chill and serve cold.

Onion Soup au Gratin: Slice 4 onions real thin and sprinkle same with 2 tablespoons of butter. Add 12 cups of consommé and cook slowly for 15 minutes, pouring in 8 onion soup mixtures cover each with two slices of French or Vienna bread or water rolls; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and bake slowly in oven of 350 degrees F. for about 8 minutes. Squab Chicken Vienna Style: Clean and prepare 6 choice 1 1/2 lb. squabs as for roasting. Lift out in medium hot fat (350 degrees F.) and let fat cook until real hot (400 degrees F., bread test 25 seconds). Dip the onions in this for a minute until cooked, shake them on a clean towel to dry.

Ideal Potatoes: Cut 5 medium-sized potatoes into julienne strips. Place 3 ounces of clarified butter in skillet and lay potatoes over the bottom in orderly fashion. Season with pepper, salt and fat; slowly for about 5 minutes on top of range. Then transfer the skillet into a deep fryer (350 degrees F.) and let bake from 25 to 30 minutes. Serve bottom side up with some chopped parsley over.

Spinach Al Green: Three cups of plain spinach well drained, 2 slices of onion cut in strips, 4 minced slices of cucumber, 4 chopped fillets of anchovies, 4 tablespoons of butter, salt and pepper.

Slightly saute bacon, add minced cucumbers and anchovies, cook for a second time and spin, add butter, salt and pepper. Stir lightly, cook for a few minutes and serve.

Omelette Souffle a la Vanille: Place in a small basin 4 tablespoons of granulated sugar, 1/2 cup of eggs, 1 teaspoonful of vanilla flavoring, 2 tablespoons of flour and 1/2 teaspoonful of salt. Whip the sugar on a very cool range until it shows a white foam. Whip the egg whites until completely cool. Now beat to a stiff froth 1/2 egg whites and fold them neatly into the first preparation. DINNER

Canape Milano: Onion Soup au Gratin Squab Chicken Vienna Style Ideal Potatoes, Spinach AI Green Omelette Souffle Canape Milano: Place 1 slice slice of tomato on top of crisp lettuce leaves. Lay a slice of Italian salami atop the tomato. Cut raw cabbage in julienne. Mix with a dash of French dressing. Form this raw cabbage dome-shaped over the tomato; lay crosswise over each dome 2 filets of anchovies. Chill and serve cold.

Chicken Soup au Gratin: Slice 4 onions real thin and smother same with 2 tablespoons of butter until a light golden color. Add 1/2 cupfuls of consommé and cook slowly for 15 minutes; pour this in 8 ounce soup marmite, cover each with two slices of French or Vienna bread or water rolls; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and bake slowly in oven of 350 degrees F. for about 8 minutes. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese.

Squab Chicken Vienna Style: Clean and prepare 6 choice squab chickens as for roasting. Place one-half head of lettuce and 2 stalks of celery, season with salt and pepper and stuff the chickens with this preparation. Bread the whole chickens by dipping in eggs and fresh bread crumbs. Fry in deep fryer in hot fresh lard (400 degrees F., bread test 25 seconds). When well colored lay the chickens in a roasting pan, pour over each some melted butter and cook for 15 to 40 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Serve with a paprika sauce and garnish with

French fried onions and fried parsley.

Paprika Cream Sauce: One tablespoonful chopped onions. 1 tablespoonful of paprika, 2 tablespoonfuls of butter, 2 tablespoonfuls of flour and 2 cupfuls of hot milk or cream. Smother the onions slowly in lettuce leaves for the period. Add flour and stir well with a small egg beater while cooking same for a few minutes. Then add slowly either the hot milk or cream. Cook slowly for about 10 minutes, strain through fine strainer, season with salt to taste. If milk is used stir in 1 tablespoonful of butter.

French Fried Onions: Cut 4 large Spanish onions very thin and take all rings apart. Dip in milk, then in flour, and fry in hot fat (350 degrees F., bread test 40 seconds) for a few minutes in order to blanch them. Then lift out of basket and let fat cook until real hot (400 degrees F., bread test 25 seconds). Dip the onions in this for a minute until crisp, shake them on to a clean towel to dry.

Fried Parsley: Wash and clean 1 standard bunch of parsley. Dry as much as possible with a cloth. Toss into French fry basket, into a hot fat (400 degrees F., bread test 25 seconds) for just one second. Lift out, season with salt.

Ideal Potatoes: Cut 5 medium-sized potatoes into julienne pieces. Place 3 ounces of clarified butter in a skillet and lay potatoes over the bottom in order to fry them. Season with pepper and salt and fry slowly for about 5 minutes on top range. Then transfer the skillet into a hot fat (350 degrees F.) and let bake from 25 to 30 minutes. Serve bottom side up with some chopped parsley over.

METHODS:

Spinach AI Green: Three cups of plain spinach well drained, 2 slices of bacon cut in strips, 4 minced slices of cucumbers, 4 sliced slices of anchovies, 4 tablespoonfuls of butter, salt and pepper.

Slightly saute bacon, add minced cucumbers and anchovies. Cook for a second then add spinach, butter, salt and pepper. Stir lightly, cook for a few minutes and serve.

Omelette Souffle a la Vanille: Place in a small basin 8 tablespoonfuls of granulated sugar, 8 yolks of eggs, 1 teaspoonful of vanilla flavor, 2 tablespoonfuls of flour. Whip this with a small egg beater in hot water or cream on a very low range until thickened. Then lift basin away from range or hot water and pour the mixture into a shallow pan to a stiff froth 6 egg whites and fold them merely into the first preparation. Mount and de-

World War Veteran Donates Collection to Stamp Auction

A veteran of the first World War, who has been in a veteran's hospital since 1929 and who has collected stamps for the past seven years, has given 5,000 stamps from his collection to the Grosse Pointe Collectors' Club to be sold at the Red Cross Auction sponsored by the GPC on Monday, May 19-23, at the Detroit Leland Hotel in Detroit.
