Col. Owen J. Cleary, chief of the State of Michigan, was the guest speaker for the occasion and stressed the fact that Michigan should not forget for one instant that the danger from an air raid is more than a good possibility.

"If you draw a line from the Soo to Chicago, from Chicago to Detroit, and then complete the triangle from Detroit to the Soo, you would have in that area one-third of the total war production plants in the United States," Colonel Cleary said.  
"Axis Watches Shipping and don't forget that the Axis powers know of the great shipping that is going on daily on our Great Lakes and that these craft are furnishing many of the materials which the great planes in the east need to continue war work. An attack on the locks at the Soo and on Detroit is very conceivable."  
Cleary further added that "the danger of an air-raid is only over on the date that war ends."

"The Axis powers have three aims in bombing this great area," first, to destroy the plants engaged in vital war production; second, to cut off means of communication and transportation; and third, to bomb the civilian areas to create panic and confusion."  
Have Important Jobs  
Speaking for each day are five auxiliaries, Colonel Cleary said, "you men are playing an important part in this war. You are almost missionaries, engaged in guarding the home front. Your important job is to win the war as is the job of the soldier at the war front."

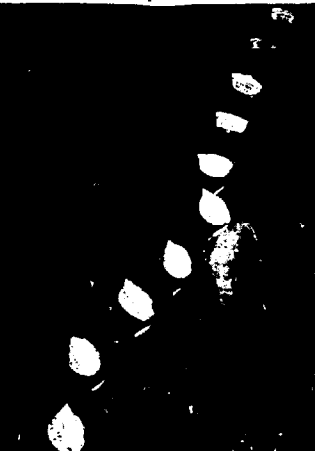

**NOTICE!**

ORDINANCE No. 128

**AN ORDINANCE TO LIMIT THE POSSESSION OF DOGS AND TO PROTECT AGAINST RABIES**

**RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER VAN DRUSEN THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:**

**SECTION 1. Dogs to Be Licensed.**

1. No person shall keep a dog aged four months or more within the Village of Grosse Pointe Park unless a license for such dog has been issued by the Village and is then in force.

2. Applications for a dog license shall be made to the Village and shall state the name, breed, age, sex, color and markings of the dog, the name and address of the present owner. Applications shall be accompanied by satisfactory evidence that the dog is effectively immunized against rabies. Upon approval of the application and the payment of the prescribed license fee, the Village shall provide the applicant with a metal tag bearing the name of the Village and the serial number and expiration date of the license.

3. All dog licenses shall be for not more than twelve months and shall expire on March 31st of each year.

4. The fee for dog licenses shall be \$1.10 for each male or unsexed dog and \$2.10 for each female dog, provided that if the license is for a three months period, or less, the fee shall be \$1.10 for each male or unsexed dog and \$1.10 for each female dog. Upon satisfactory proof of a rabid dog, the license may be obtained from the Village upon payment of \$0.10.

**SECTION 2. Dogs to Wear Tags and Be Controlled.**

No dog aged four months

or more shall be at large unless it is wearing a dog tag and is on a leash or otherwise under complete control of a person capable of restraining the actions of the dog. A dog shall be deemed to be at large unless it is in a private building within a completely fenced-in area.

**SECTION 3. Vicious or Nasty Dogs Prohibited.**

No dog shall be kept within the Village which is known to be fierce or vicious or which yelping or howling causes serious annoyance to the neighborhood or passers-by.

**SECTION 4. Dogs to Be Vaccinated.**

No person shall keep a dog aged three months or more within the Village of Grosse Pointe Park unless such dog has been immunized against rabies in a manner satisfactory to the Village Veterinary.

**SECTION 5. Testing of Dogs for Rabies.**

1. Any dog who has bitten a person or shows any symptoms of rabies or has been bitten by a dog showing any symptoms of rabies shall be immediately delivered by the owner to the Village Veterinary and in default thereof such dog may be seized by or for the Village Veterinary. The owner of the dog, if known, shall be notified.

2. At the expense of the owner the Village Veterinary shall test such dog for the existence of rabies. If, at the conclusion of such test it appears that the dog is afflicted with rabies, it shall be destroyed; otherwise, it shall be returned to the owner. If the owner does not apply for the return of the dog within 48 hours after the conclusion of the test, the dog may be disposed of as a stray dog.

**SECTION 6. The Village Veterinary shall keep possession of such dog for ten days or such other period as is required for the test, provided that if satisfactory assurances are given by**

the owner the Village Veterinary in his discretion, may release the dog to the owner during the pending of the test and on condition that the owner return the dog to the Village Veterinary at any time on his request.

4. The charge for testing dogs for rabies shall be \$6.00 plus the fee for the dog tag. The dog is cared for by the Village Veterinary. The owner of the dog shall be liable to the Village for the payment of such charge whether or not the dog is afflicted with rabies.

**SECTION 6. Dogs May Be Seized for Violations.**

Any dog within the Village which (a) is not licensed as required herein, or (b) is at large contrary to the provisions hereof, or (c) is not wearing a dog tag as required herein, or (d) is otherwise involved in a violation of this Ordinance may be seized by the Village and placed in the Village Pound. The owner of such dog, if known, shall be notified. Such dog shall be released to the owner thereof only upon assurances satisfactory to the Chief of Police that the provisions of this Ordinance shall be complied with and upon payment of a fee of \$2.00 for placing the dog and \$2.00 for each day the dog has been impounded.

**SECTION 7. Disposition of Unclaimed Dogs.**

If a dog remains in the Village Pound for more than 48 hours unclaimed, or without payment of the impounding fee, it shall be deemed a stray dog and may be destroyed or sold.

**SECTION 8. Owner Is Responsible for Dog.**

The owner of any dog within the Village shall be responsible for all actions of such dog including damage to property and shall be liable for all charges in connection with the impounding or testing of such dog. Any person who habitually allows a dog to remain in public places shall be deemed to be keeping such dog and to be the owner thereof within the meaning of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 9. Penalties.**

Any person who shall violate or assist in the violation of this Ordinance or own a dog involved in a violation of this Ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the Village or County Jail for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both in the discretion of the Court. For each day that a violation is permitted to exist the same shall constitute a separate and distinct offense and shall be so punishable.

**SECTION 10. Village Veterinary.**

The Village President shall, from among the members of the approval of the Village Commission, appoint a qualified veterinary in or near the Village of Grosse Pointe Park to act as Village Veterinary. He shall hold office at the will of the Commission and shall receive such compensation as it may determine.

**SECTION 11. Repeals and Effective Date.**

Ordinance No. 8, 31, 63, 71 and 109 are hereby repealed. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty days after its enactment.

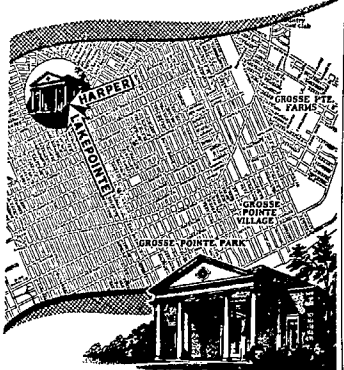

# Industrial Arts Building Will Be Dedicated Friday

## Main of Chrysler Corporation To Make Principal Address At Formal Program In War Training Center

Final plans have been completed for the dedication of the Industrial Arts building of the Grosse Pointe Public School system on Friday at 8:30 p. m. in the High School auditorium, according to Dr. Paul L. Essert, Superintendent of Schools. The new building will be opened to the public from 10 until 8:30, and again immediately following the program.

Members of the Chrysler Corporation will be the guest speakers. A section of the school band will provide the music and the local high school band will play Cadman's "The Present Building."

Dr. Martin, general contractor, will formally present the building to the Chrysler Corporation. He will be accompanied by G. G. Gamber, architect, in turn will give the dedication address. Through its president, C. A. Parelli, Chrysler will be the showing of a newly produced under section of William Marzette, Grosse Pointe High School, showing the development of the building since its completion on June 1, 1941, and the students at work in various shops and laboratories.

## SCF Auction Committee Says Regional Office Broke Faith

Friction Revealed in Report of Mrs. Benjamin Shephard, Chairman, Accusing Lack of Cooperation and Sincerity

Friction between the advisory committee and regional director on one side, and the auction committee which recently raised more than \$5,000 for the Save the Children Federation, has been revealed in a report authorized by the executive committee of the auction group.

The report, signed by Mrs. Benjamin O. Shephard of Ridge road, auction chairman, follows in full: "As your chairman of Women's Activities of the Detroit Save the Children Federation, I regret so much time has passed since the culmination of your excellent work and receipt of a final report.

"The executive committee of the auction was most desirous to clarify certain points which had arisen at the end of our work, before proceeding further with the auction program.

"Three executive meetings were held and one conference, at our request, with the regional advisory committee to the Regional Office and its Director.

"We feel that with lack of cooperation and sincerity being their advisory committee and the Director and we, who have been the originating, financing and promoting group for their local defense nurseries, we could not carry on further in any business-like manner.

"The Regional Director has made it impossible to carry out our original plans, which were to allow these workers, when their campaign was over, to form their own local organization with elected leaders and a board of directors and to have a nucleus as part of the Wayne County Council of Defense program.

"We feel that with lack of cooperation and sincerity being their advisory committee and the Director and we, who have been the originating, financing and promoting group for their local defense nurseries, we could not carry on further in any business-like manner.

"We have asked for an audit of the auction receipts and those donations which were made during the campaign. This is being made by Ernst and Ernst, Public Accountants, and each member of the auction will receive a report. We have been assured that this fund will be disbursed by the Regional Office only for the use of the nurseries.

**"Surge Recorder" helps improve your ELECTRIC SERVICE**

Because lightning is a frequent cause of trouble on electric transmission lines, the more we know about lightning the better we can develop safeguards against it. . . . and the fewer times lightning will damage the lines and equipment that serve you.

Lightning "surges" travel along transmission lines like a wave in water. The wave rolls along until it strikes a sharp cliff, then dashes high and breaks over it.
