

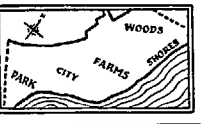

Victory Gardening

Getting the Most Out of the Victory Garden

To make the garden plot produce to its full capacity during the growing season should be the aim of every Victory Gardener. And why not? If we can make two blades grow instead of one, we are increasing the yield of every square foot of garden space.

The method of successive cropping will make it possible to do this. First of all the gardener must become acquainted with his crops, so that he may understand the methods. Successive sowing and planting will insure a continuous yield of fresh vegetables throughout the summer.

In the columns on May 21, a list of the most popular and at the same time more easily grown, vegetables was given. Following each variety the average time to maturity was also given. If the Victory Gardener will refer to this list, he should be able to formulate a plan for successive cropping in the garden.

The careful planning of the garden plot may be mentioned in the first method just mentioned is that of successive cropping. The first method may be called the companion cropping since it consists of growing more than one crop in the same area at the same time.

In successive cropping, successive plantings of the same crop should be made at intervals of two days. Allowance should be made for the last sowing or planting of the particular crop in order that it may mature before heavy frosts. Such vegetables as radishes, beets, beans, peas, early cabbage, kohlrabi, lettuce, etc., are adaptable to successive sowing. Plantings which they have a comparatively short growing season or are resistant to early frosts and mild weather.

The other type of successive cropping consists of following one crop with an entirely different one which would be matured before the growing season ends. For example, early planted crops such as carrots, lettuce, radish, etc., may be followed by beans, cabbage, onion, kohlrabi, etc. It is obvious that some sort of successive cropping should be followed in order that none of the Victory Gardeners remain idle during the growing season.

When this is done, the empty space would either continue to be cultivated even though it remained unplanted or become planted with obnoxious weeds. Weeds should never be permitted to remain in the Victory Garden. The second method of utilizing the garden plot to the utmost, consists of growing two or more crops on the same area at the same time. This is referred to as companion cropping, and is intended to increase the height of the yield by shading in small areas without harming in any way the main vegetable crop.

For example, in planting tomatoes, pepper, eggplant and other vegetables which are comparatively slow growing, and which will occupy the land through most of the growing season, other quick crops may be combined in between rows. The early crops will have had time to mature before the permanent crops will be large enough to require the entire space.

These quick growing crops included radish, lettuce, carrots, etc. They can be grown between rows, and will be very little space taken from the vegetable plot that the latter are properly spaced. The systems of successive and companion cropping are followed by all successful gardeners who obtain a crop.

Violators To Be Enforced

Time-worn admonitions to Detroit motorists to use care in crossing city streets will be fielded more vigorously by the police department when the Police Department begins enforcement of the City's new Pedestrian Protection Ordinance which, becomes effective on that day.

The new law, which applies to drivers as well as to pedestrians, takes effect after one of the most intensive educational campaigns ever conducted on behalf of a City ordinance. Donald Slutz, manager of the Traffic Safety Association, one of the sponsors of the ordinance, said that by Monday more than 20 violators will be arrested. Slutz said that the ordinance will be reached at least once by advertising in the newspapers, and that he will familiarize readers with terms of the law. Ignorance, Slutz warned, will be a difficult plea for violators to make.

Although Mayor Jeffries and police officials have insisted that violators be arrested without wholesale arrests will be the goal of those responsible for the enforcement of the ordinance, the police were just as insistent that persons who willfully violate the ordinance's terms be brought to task.

All members of the Police Department have been shown lantern slides depicting violations which warrant issuance of a citation and instructional bulletins have been issued to all men in an effort to secure a uniformity of enforcement throughout the city.

Newly appointed Police Commissioner ... said this week that a firm and persistent policy would be followed in enforcing the ordinance, and that no whittling enforcement attacks would be made.

"We realize," Witherspoon added, "that the walking habits of years ago may be a thing of the past. It is the duty of every citizen to reduce the wanton slaughter that occurs on Detroit streets."

High Schools Expected to Train Pilots

Principal Clemons Issues Special Bulletin on New Course Being Offered

A special bulletin relating to the aeronautics course which will be offered in Grosse Pointe High school, was issued by Walter R. Clemons, principal. It was read in all home rooms of the school during the last week.

"The United States Army and Navy need thousands of young men trained in various divisions of aviation to help win the war and to help win and keep the peace," the bulletin stated. "Workers in aviation including pilots, navigators, gunners, bombardiers, observers, photographers, and ground crew men are in demand."

"Prepared by Specialists" representatives of the Army and Navy Air Forces and the United States Department of Education, specialists in aviation education, have been working for several months in preparing a special course in aviation to be offered in the high schools throughout the United States to assist in leading the youth to the fundamentals of aviation.

The purpose of this course in aeronautics is two-fold: First, an introduction to the science and principles of flight, navigation, meteorology, and airplane engine operation. Second, to provide a background of students who plan on enlisting in the air corps. It is the first step in the preparation for our planes because necessary, the course may shorten the period of ground training. The Home Front in Michigan

Michigan motorists have no occasion for a snug fitter up the sleeve" as nearly 10,000,000 autos of the Atlantic Seaboard are placed on short rations.

Gasoline rationing isn't just an Eastern headache. Actually, it is only one aspect of a national transportation problem, which is growing more acute every day. It is the shortage of gasoline in the East, officials do not believe it is practical to transport 10,000 persons twice daily at any great distance.

Ypsilanti and Washtenaw county officials fear that Willow Run will become a great "ghost town" when the war is over. But you stop for philosophy when there is a war to be won. And so it's all-out for bomber planes. The cost cannot be measured in our freedom.

The rate of production at Willow Run is a highly guarded military secret.

But this much can be said: The objective is fantastic, but it will be reached. The mechanical wizardry of Henry Ford is legend to every school child.

President Roosevelt himself has put the nation's goal at 185,000 a year by 1944. That is in terms of annual production.

Little wonder that Detroit war officials, while quarreling among themselves over jurisdiction, agree on this: Willow Run is an invitation to an Axis air raid, just as theault Site, Marie Lock at the "Soo" constitutes a challenge.

Wives of editors—and some of Michigan newspaper editors are women—were greatly irked by a government regulation forbidding admittance of women visitors into the plant.

After all, were not women sacrificing for the war? And were not women being invited to work in the plant?

The explanation, however, is far from being a criticism of oil fair sex.

Michigan newspaper women are blessed with beauty, a fact that no one can possibly deny.

As a public relations diplomat explains the situation to us, war workers would be distracted from concentration at the assembly line, thousands of hours of needed war work would be lost, and perhaps bombers would be not finished which would mean the difference between defeat and victory on some far-off front.

All because of the ladies!
