Victory Won By Home Rule Supporters

More Than 300,000 Signers on Petitions Filed With Secretary of State

The petition campaign for Home Rule for Wayne county has gone over the top by a substantial margin and the first required step taken toward effecting the change in the basic form of government for the county which has been the subject of agitation for a long time.

The Home Rule committee estimates that the final completed petition which is to be filed this afternoon with the Secretary of State at Lansing may contain as many as 300,000 names, or upwards of 80,000 over the required minimum. Henceforth the procedure is largely a matter of routine, up to the point when the voters will give their final verdict on the question at the polls next November.

Petition Carefully Examined At Lansing the petition will be carefully examined by the Secretary of State's office as to its bona fide character and if it is established an order will be issued by the State Elections Board in due time directing the submission of its provisions to the vote of the qualified electors of Wayne county next November. Following the endorsement of the proposed charter change by the voters it then becomes the duty of a charter commission to draft the final form of charter for the county which will be submitted to the voters at an election at some later date.

This charter drafting commission will be named under the usual procedure for the election of public officials, and must be created within a few months of the approval of change by the voters, will be composed of 19 members. It is required that the commission be composed of persons who are not holders of any public office and must be strictly non-partisan in character.

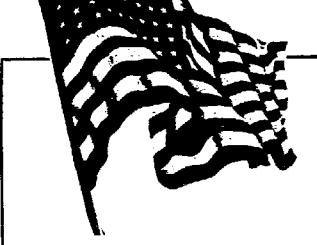

Victory Gardening

By V. R. DePETRIES

Diseases, Insects and Sprays. Plants like animals and humans are practically susceptible to attacks either by insects or diseases of fungi, resulting in spores or impairment.

The names and number of these insects and fungi are legion. We need hardly burden our minds with them now. What will prove both important and

helpful will be the classification of the three major types of plant injury so that they be recognized and effective remedies applied.

The first group of insects which cause most damage to both flowers and vegetable consists of very small plant lice, technically known as aphids, thrips, and minute spiders. Some of these like spiders and thrips can be barely seen by the naked eye.

This group breeds prolifically and if not checked will soon take command and do much damage. Aphids are soft bodied plant lice. They are most commonly green or black in color and occasionally red. Aphids injure plants by sucking the juices of tender leaves and young shoots. Spiders and thrips are known as rasping insects. They live on the tender leaves and stems but will attack old and well matured foliage as well.

Spiders and thrips are best by a hot and dry environment, consequently they are very serious during July and August.

Chewing insects are nearly always large. They can be readily identified as grubs, cut worms or caterpillars. Their presence is revealed by the damaged leaves or shoots. These are eaten leaving holes and perforations in portions of the leaf. The third type of injury is not caused by insects but by various types of fungus. These fungus infestations are strictly speaking diseases spread by the microscopic spores of various fungi and rusts. The effects of fungus disease may be discerned by the wilting of leaves and shoots; drying or spotting of foliage and the covering of some leaves with a white powdery substance commonly called mildew.

These three sprays are of distinct types of plants and diseases. We can proceed to find remedies for each type.

For Group 1: Sprays consisting of 40 per cent nicotine sulphate ("Black Leaf 40") or Pyrethrum, Derris or Rotenone. The last three will be found difficult to obtain today. Use some soap dissolved in water with the sprays for a spreader. Spraying with strong water pressure every day will keep aphids, spiders and thrips under control.

For Group 2: Chewing insects may be killed by stomach poisons such as arsenate of lead, arsenate of lime and Paris green. This is dangerous in a vegetable garden however since the poisons which kill worms and caterpillars will also kill humans. Therefore DO NOT USE POISON SPRAYS ON VEGETABLES. Use instead Derris, rotenone, Rotenone and Pyrethrum sprays or powders.

For Group 3: Fungus diseases are not caused by insects but by various types of fungi. Symptoms are lesions which either are large or multiply rapidly. Bad infestations cause leaves to wither and sometimes white. Dry powdery substance on foliage

known as mildew is caused by fungus spores. Use sprays or dusts composed of sulfur compounds or copper sulfate such as Bordeaux mixture control by burning affected foliage. Spray or dust plants. Keep ground clean of weeds which may carry this fungus. In the Fall burn all vegetation which may have had attacks of this fungus.

And will resist varieties of vegetables. These have been bred to resist disease. They include tomatoes, cabbage, beans and celery. Copper sprays or powders are no longer being manufactured due to the war, and must be obtained from existing stocks. Sulfur however is plentiful and may be obtained at reasonable prices. For sulfur sprays colloidal type of sulfur only can be made to dissolve in water. When spraying do a thorough job. If dusts are applied do it early in the morning when the dew is on the foliage so that the dust will adhere to the leaves.
