### Married Men Again Immune to Immediate Call Into Country's Draft Army

Local and County Officials Agree None is Likely to be Called for Induction Before November

Married men, especially those with children, do not face the immediate prospect of being drafted for military service.

This fact was determined Wednesday from the combined statements of Major Paul V. Engstrom, of the Wayne County Selective Service system, and members of local Draft Board 57.

In interviews with both Major Engstrom and Board members, it was disclosed that married men at present are not being sent into military rotation, that none of the present classified IA's are liable for immediate call.

### Problems Vary

"While cases and problems differ in different localities," Major Engstrom stated, "it is a general practice now not to send married men or those in IA's for services with the armed forces. Men who married after Pearl Harbor and those who married before are classified differently. ### Grosse Pointe Stores Push Stamp Sales

Ray Schmeizer of Cunningham Drug Heads Local Merchants' Committee

If the plans of the Retail Merchants Committee for Grosse Pointe are successful, carried on, every store in Grosse Pointe will have war savings stamps for sale.

As part of the campaign, Ray J. Schmeizer, manager of the Grosse Pointe branch of Cunningham's and chairman of the Retail Merchants Committee, issued that small white and blue cards labeled "THIS QUARTER WILL BUY 10 BULLETS FOR THE ARMY" and distributed to the stores of Grosse Pointe by Cunningham's girls, and the merchants would hand back their change which is in the form of a quarter, right on the counter.

This campaign is, in reality, called the United States Treasury Retailers' Bond and Stamp Drive, and according to Mrs. Jerome S. Freud, who is in charge of the drive, only 50% (approximately) of the retail merchants now sell war savings stamps and bonds in their stores.

The first week's results of the sale of the stamps and bonds in the stores were: \$1872 in stamps and \$490 in bonds, making a total of \$2362.

The arbitrator will jointly name the final number of the strikers' proposals. Municipal workers' representatives demanded a pay increase of approximately 15 per cent.

### Raid Wardens Issue New Rule Affecting Use of Night Lights

They Will Be Allowed if Outside Switch is Installed Where It Can Be Easily Extinguished During Raids

The nightly blackout of many of the Pointe's business houses, required under a new raid precaution laws, is expected to be eliminated by a new rule which was discussed during a meeting of wardens of the Pointe-draft districts in the Neighborhood club Monday night.

Charles Blessed, chief warden of the area, informed his organization that he may be permitted to add attachments to existing buildings which would enable the wardens to control the use of night lights during a raid, making it unnecessary for the owner of the property to return and do it himself.

Several reasons have been given for the new rule. One reason is an invitation to thieves and provide additional work for the police departments. The occupancy of many of the buildings are taxpayers and as such are entitled to the best use of their money.

## Hit Them and Hit Them Hard!

Justice of the Peace Joseph P. Uvick has been criticized as being too lenient in handing out fines and sentences to violators of traffic laws within the Pointe.

The News, since its inception, has attacked reckless driving and speeding. With the entrance of the United States into the war, the crusade took on an added significance. In addition to the menace to life and limb of motorist and pedestrian alike, there has been the urgent need to conserve most of the materials which go into the manufacture of a motor vehicle. It is now considered highly unpatriotic to drive a car too fast or too recklessly. The pronouncement that cars, both private and commercial, may be needed to solve the transportation problem so vital to the war effort, is more than an idle jest.

Yet here in the seemingly sequestered Pointe the mad motorist goes his usual merry way. That's not quite true, for the number of cars on the streets has been slightly reduced . . . ever so slightly.

There seem to be just as many speeding deliveries trucks (something we could never understand because late), and to us sitting up here in the News office, it appears that just as many tires scream around the corner of Fisher road turning into Kewadin. "That would be another student in another convertible roadster," we say to ourselves as we mentally picture the advertisement of the downed aviator kept aloft by his "Mae West" under the caption . . . "Thanks for the rubber you saved."

The Pointe police have long had to cope with this problem. They have battled against the odds of parental indulgence and lack of discipline, of political influence and favoritism, of non-uniform traffic laws.

This isn't a job for the police or the courts alone. It is a problem which must be solved by every adolescent or adult resident of the area. We are fighting a war and we are fighting a private battle that concerns every driver, every pedestrian, every child that plays in the Pointe. Let's get together and win them both.

The News recommends the stiffest fine possible and the revocation of licenses for every flagrant violator of any traffic law.

Those drivers who threaten the lives of others by speeding through red signs and red lights, by racing recklessly up and down our streets, when caught, plead for leniency because they were in a hurry or because they weren't thinking, remind us of the lad who killed his mother and father, then asked for the mercy of the court because he was an orphan.

## The Quality of Mercy

A case which hit the blotter of the Grosse Pointe Farms police department this week discloses what appears to be a startling condition of affairs on the part of the Prosecutor's Office in Wayne County.

Four youths in their late teens were surprised by a private watchman while swimming without permission during the small hours of the morning in a private pool in the Farms. The watchman and the owners of the pool have been previously annoyed by such performances. On several occasions trespassers had thrown the lawn furniture and other items into the pool.

The watchman was insulted by the belligerent youths but succeeded in getting them into police headquarters by taking their clothes and telling them that where they could pick them up if they cared to appear and be booked. Rather than go home sans most of their clothing, the trespassers put in an appearance and had to reveal their names.

The owner of the pool was informed by the police that they were powerless to do anything about the case unless a warrant was obtained from the prosecutor's office. The owner, sick and tired of such nonsense, was determined to prosecute and the Farms police expressed delight that at long last a resident was really going to do something to help.

Such cases are a headache to the police and they like to discourage such offenders, but are pretty helpless without cooperation from the property owners. The latter generally find some excuse to drop charges when they find there is any inconvenience involved.

Then it was learned that the prosecutor's office has been making a practice of refusing to issue warrants against young men in their late teens, on the grounds that these youths are soon to enter the service of their country, and if they care to enlist, the fact that they had a police record would count heavily against them.

It was suggested that the owner sign a complaint and the boys be made to appear before a local Justice of the Peace, who would give them a sound talking to and scare them.

There have been a great many complaints on the police records throughout the Pointe, against young hoodlums who have despoiled private property, destroyed Victory Gardens and done a number of other things just for the mere hellishness of it and in open violation of the law.

It would appear that the police should receive a little more cooperation in scotching this sort of activity. Just one suggestion for the prosecutor's office would be that might offer a choice to the youths who have so little regard for the rights of others: "Enlist by 9 o'clock this afternoon or we're going to prosecute."

## Why The Delay?

All the publicity which has attended the salvaging of steel rails long embedded in the streets of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms has led many to wonder why the same program hasn't long since been inaugurated in the City of Grosse Pointe and the Village of Grosse Pointe Park.

There are literally miles of rails buried underneath Jefferson avenue in both of these municipalities and daily residents disclose how urgently the war effort needs all the steel scrap it can beg, borrow or steal.

The resale value of the scrap has been sufficient to pay for repairing the streets and the residents have been more than happy to undergo the slight inconvenience of temporarily disrupted traffic and noise. Knowing their village was making a considerable contribution toward helping win the war. Much credit is due Murray Smith, village engineer, who worked out the details of the program, and to other members of the municipal government.

The question arose some time ago as to ownership of those rails embedded in the City and the Park, but it would seem that more than sufficient time has now elapsed to have solved that problem.

If the need for scrap is as acute as we are led to believe, these communities should expend a little effort and send these buried rails on their way to the furnaces where they will be converted into products that will help bury the Axis.

## The Home Front in Michigan

In June, almost a million Americans joined the already huge army of production in factories, shops, offices and on farms.

June our output of ships and tanks and planes and guns, of ammunition and other equipment, was nearly three times that of last November.

### Men Working Together

We have seen for such good news—particularly at this time when Nazi tanks lumber through the ripe wheat fields of the Ukraine—a drive which threatens the great city of Stalingrad.

In Egypt, the Nazis and their Italian accomplices are only 60 miles from the British naval base at Alexandria. In the Far East, Japanese troops are based at New Guinea, an outpost in the defense of Australia. In the Atlantic, Axis submarines continue to sink our merchant ships at an alarming rate.

None of us would be foolish enough to such a time to underestimate the strength of our enemies. Yet, though our foes may gain victory after victory, we are buying the instruments of their destruction. In the end, we shall prevail them by sheer weight of weapons and of manpower.

### Unity, Sacrifice, Action

In announcing June production achievements, Donald Nelson, WPB chairman, warned that "boasting" about our progress would be "premature" and that there are no excuses for "under-optimism."

It is true that the biggest part of the job still lies ahead of us but it is heartening to know that we made more war planes in the first six months of 1942 than were made in all of 1941 and 3 1/2 times as many anti-aircraft guns. We built more tanks in six months than in the whole previous year: 80 per cent more machine tools; and 135 per cent more ships.

### Work, Sacrifice, Victory

The flow of scrap metal back to the steel furnaces has not increased as it should, despite the intensive nationwide campaign of the WPB which is going on.

Rumors that there would be a hike in the maximum price for iron and steel scrap—which caused dealers to wait for the rumored increase—were emphatically denied both by the WPB and C.P.A.

### Get in the Scrap

None of the United Nations which have been overrun by the Axis hordes really has been conquered. New testimony of the uncomparable heroism of a national butterfat champion Holstein cow, Margarete Pride de Kol.

"Pride" became the nation's leader over all breeds for senior four-year-olds on three milkings daily with the production of 1,152.2 pounds of butterfat from 39,637.7 pounds of milk for the 355-day period.

# New Beacon School Gives Greater Outlook to Gratiot

## Full Day Sessions For All Pupils Now

Ability to Meet Town's Fabulous Growth Is Credit to Progressive School Board and Loyal Citizenship

Officials of School District No. 2, which comprise more than two-thirds of Gratiot Township, will receive keys late this week for the new Beacon School, Beaconsfield avenue at Woodside drive.

Lloyd Lyle, secretary of the school board, has announced that the board expects to accept the two-story brick and steel structure from the contractors at official dedication ceremonies sometime prior to or shortly after the opening of school next month.

Gratiot's need of a new school was one of the most baffling situations the community had to contend with during the year since its mushroom-like growth began in the late thirties. The district's first school, the Eastwood, a single room affair, which still stands on Eastwood drive, was erected in 1928 and had an enrollment that year of only 15 pupils. Mrs. Beth Sheridan, now principal of the new Beacon School, was the teacher.

Growth was rapid. One of the notable factors in the great influx of new residents to the community in the years of 1940, 1941 and 1942, when the vast area of the township contained farm homes for the most part, was the number of children the newcomers brought with them. They were young families, generally speaking, and it was not until the rural-titled Eastwood school could no longer meet the demands made upon it. A portable school was provided and another teacher added but the shortage of space continued to grow. Last semester saw not only the old Eastwood School and the portable, but three other rented structures, with a total of five teachers, fall to meet the situation. There were only half-day sessions for all classes.

Get National Funds A little more than a year ago the present members of the school board took office. They immediately procured an option to purchase the site of the new Beacon School now stands and made plans for obtaining federal funds under the National Defense Act with which to build an adequate school.

The Federal Government allowed an outright grant of \$58,000 and to this the board added a \$25,000.00 bond issue and work was begun with an absolute minimum of delay.

The new school has eight classrooms, a library, a social room and principal's office. While not lavish in finish, the rooms with their modern styled asphalt tiled floors and great wide windows present an exceptionally attractive appearance. Its huge heating plant assures that it will be comfortable too.

Has Spacious Grounds The school property extends the entire block between Woodside and Woodcrest drives and has a depth of 450 feet, which, in addition to providing ample grounds for an athletic field for most of the recognized scholastic sports, allows for further ex-

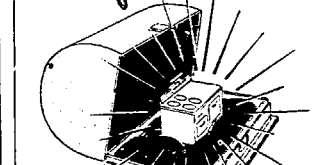

## HELPFUL Hints



## on taking care of your ELECTRIC RANGE

"Take good care of the things you have," reads the U. S. Government's Consumers Pledge—and this applies with special force to many things that are indispensable. Your electric range must last for the duration, and to help you use it carefully and wisely, these few suggestions are offered:

(1) Never use a stiff brush or sharp instrument to remove spilled food from heating elements. Food spilled on open surface units should be burned off. (Avoid washing spilled food dry or harden on the range.)

(2) Roasting or broiling meat in the oven deposits grease on the oven walls. When cool, wipe the inside of the oven with a damp cloth. This should be done each time after use.

(3) Wash outside of range with warm soapy water. On range racks with closed-type surface units, these may be placed in a pan of water. The pan underneath can be removed for cleaning. Check manufacturer's directions.

(4) Ventilate your oven after each baking operation by leaving the door ajar.

### Looking at the Movies

"Without a single reservation," Mrs. Mivver," which opened this morning at the United Artists theater is the finest motion picture that Detroit and Pontiac audiences have had the privilege of seeing this year.

Crowds this morning at the first showing were spellbound by its story, by its actors, and by its general underlying theme that this is a Christian people's war against oppression.

The original story was by Jan Struthers and Hollywood assigned its best authors, including James Hilton, to write the film version. The result is that "Mrs. Mivver" is a decidedly better film than it possibly could have been had the producers stuck to the original story.

To begin, the film is impressive because it does not actually picture any of the real horrors of war, but rather concerns itself with the telling of the activities of the people at home. There are only a few scenes of night bombing over the houses in the English countryside that are terrifying, but throughout is a streak of dread that makes you just as aware that there is a war going on as if every scene had been filmed in the front line trenches.

To Greer Garson went the task of acting the part of Mrs. Mivver, who twice in her lifetime had to face the prospect of loved ones going off to war. In 1918 it was her husband, played splendidly by Walter Pidgeon, and in 1939 it is her son, played by the youthful Broadway actor, Richard Ney, who came to Hollywood direct from success in "Life With Father." To Greer Garson should go the Academy's award for this year.

The film's finest moment is its ending when the locale is a bomb torn little English church, its roof and steeple blasted into dust by German planes.

The congregation is told that this war is not only fought in

the front lines but is also fought in every home and hamlet. This is the People's war. The congregation roars and sings "Onward, Christian Soldiers" while overhead, through the gaunt and charred roof, can be seen United States flags, flying off to war.

On the much, much lighter side, and very well worth seeing at the Michigan theater is "Are Husbands Necessary?" taken from the comedy novel, "Mr. and Mrs. Cugat."

Ray Milland and Betty Field are the stars, and according to advance reports do a swell job. The picture opens tomorrow downtown with Horace Heidt and his band in person on the stage. Quite a double feature!

Van Wagoner is expected to make personal presentation where it is possible for him to appear, and many qualified gardeners will receive their emblems by mail.

Surveys reveal that weather conditions have benefited rather than hurt home gardeners throughout the state and that a majority of them are flourishing.

### Half Year Plates Expire August 31

Car owners who are operating with first half year auto license plates, and there are 494,000 in Michigan, 178,000 in Wayne county, must renew their licenses before August 31.

Harry F. Kelly, Secretary of State, announces that all his offices are now issuing new half year permits, which this year as a steel conservation measure, are in form of a ten-inch metal strip, one and a half inches wide, which clamps on the bottom of the first half year plate and converts it into a full year tag. By substituting this strip for the usual full sized plate the state department has accomplished substantial savings in steel and in manufacturing costs.

This plan also eliminates the necessity of re-registering cars now bearing half year plates. In past years owners were given full sized plates and a new number. Under the new system the owner gets the same tag and license number throughout the year. The 1942 plates were built to last through the war and if necessary can be converted into 1943 or 1944 plates by use of steel strips.

The same half year fee as in former years is charged. Those who now do not have any plates but who wish to renew their licenses on commission may buy full year plates at half price and these will be good until March 1 next year.

### GET YOUR PLATES EARLY

Harry F. Kelly, Secretary of State, has announced that a serious shortage of help in his offices will make it difficult to give adequate service to car owners who wait until the last minute to renew their licenses for the last half of the year. The deadline on first half year plates is August 31st and some 153,000 motorists in Wayne County more than two thirds of them in Detroit, are affected.

Law Produces Sharp Drop In Accidents

New Pedestrian Protection Ordinance Working Well, Survey Reveals

Indications that Detroit's new Pedestrian Protection Ordinance, which directly affects practically every Grosse Pointe resident, may bring about a sharp decrease in the annual toll of death and injury on Detroit streets have been revealed in a preliminary report by the Accident Prevention Bureau.

During the first 30 days following the effective date of the ordinance, there were 234 pedestrian accidents recorded by the APB. In the same period last year, 429 pedestrian mishaps were listed. This represents a reduction of 45 per cent.

Inspector Christian Nelson of the APB said Saturday that the reduction in pedestrian accidents far exceeded an ordinary fluctuation that might occur due to weather, traffic volume or other conditions. He added:

There can be no question that the widespread observance of the new pedestrian law is responsible for the substantial reduction in the number of pedestrian accidents over the same period last year.
