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## Brazil

The entry of Brazil into the war against Germany and Italy signifies more even than the alignment of the largest and most populous of the Latin American countries with the United Nations.

Ever since the days when Germany first evinced a purpose to challenge the Monroe Doctrine at her favorable opportunity the presence of a large and influential group of Germans in the State of Rio Grande do Sul in the southernmost part of Brazil has been a source of anxiety to the Government at Washington. Germans in large numbers penetrated these parts. Latin American generations ago where their native intelligence and aggressiveness soon made them an influential and, in a sense, threatening element in the population.

It is a reasonable presumption that the racial arrogance of these Central Europeans, which is never suppressed with entire success in any surroundings, had much to do in determining the fateful decision of the Brazilian Government. This is a phase of the present time war psychology which will be more accurately appraised at some later date.

One result of Brazil's entry on our side which is fairly obvious however is that the German and Italian influence in the Argentine, where it has been stronger than in any other place in South America, will be made more cautious in its acts and expressions than it has been heretofore with the most powerful state in the southern continent directly athwart its lines of communication with Europe. The example of Brazil's action will unquestionably have a very great effect in determining the course of the other and smaller nations of South America in their immediate attitude toward the war.

It is significant also that Brazil which was the last of the South American states to formally sever its association with Europe, has been the first in both the last war and the present to reaffirm that separation. When the Brazilians in November, 1895, bundled their Emperor, Dom Pedro II, a kindly and well liked old man, aboard a vessel and sent him back home to his Braganza family circle in Portugal, it definitely marked the end of European hereditary association with the Southern continent. Three quarters of a century earlier Simon Bolivar by his successful revolution had eradicated the Spanish power which existed thereafter in the New World only in Cuba and the Spanish West Indies whence it was finally banished by the Cubans themselves in their revolution begun in 1895 and confirmed by our war with Spain in 1898.

From Brazil's recent history and her own sovereign acts in 1917 and 1942 it is not difficult to read a determination on her part to oppose the reestablishment of any political, economic or even cultural domination from a European source.

This is the very meat of the present thrust of Germany for world dominion and it is noteworthy that the principal South American state has been the first in that group of nations to see the picture in its true colors and act accordingly.

## Emotional Year

The War is seen as the key to the 1942 primary and election. If the war continues to go as badly as it is today, watch for many upsets, the experts say. If the tide turns everyone will be more cheerful and less inclined to kick someone in the pants.

Generally speaking 1942 has already been tagged an emotional year. All of which means that emotions rather than reason are very likely to dictate the outcome at the polls.

Well, you'll see the same crowd at Mayo's as soon as they get sick, or think they are sick.

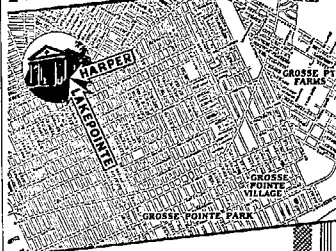

### Teachers and Officials Will Gather in Annual Conference to Lay Plans for Coming Year; Six Day Session Planned

Beginning next Monday, August 31, and continuing through Saturday, September 5, all teachers and officials associated with the public school system of Grosse Pointe will hold their customary annual conference prior to the opening of the school year. This is a nationwide procedure which in many states is termed a "Teacher's Institute."

The Grosse Pointe school authorities captain the annual program under the title "Conservation of Educational Resources."

schools this year to fit with the war work. The general meetings of the week's conference will be held in the Grosse Pointe High School. There will be special consultants in attendance from the Michigan Child Guidance Institute, from the Michigan State Board of Education and from Wayne University.

Guest speakers for the week will be Dr. J. B. Edmonson, Dean of the School of Education, University of Michigan; and Paul Sullivan, Assistant Professor of Education, Wayne University.

Many Special Meetings There will be many special interest group meetings during the week covering the whole range of teacher-pupil contact and the relationship of teacher to the general aspects and responsibilities of the profession.

Education per se, health and hygiene, character and morale building and many other divisions of public education as modernized contemplated will be embraced in the week's agenda, but all will be treated, as frankly announced by the local school authorities, to conduct more directly to the successful solution of the problems growing out of the war conditions which will face the growing youth of the community in the present and immediate future.
