Scrap

If the people of this nation have not yet awakened to the vital necessity of collecting and turning over to the government every scrap of metal and rubber they can scrape out of their premises they are just too dumb to be even pitted.

Every highly authoritative agency of the government from the President on down has been hammering this home to the people with a crescendo that any nitwit should realize has in recent days almost reached the scale of panic.

Two steel mills in Chicago already closed down for lack of scrap; the building of 140 ten-thousand-ton freighters that can't be finished if the steel production in the country lapses as much as one percent below its present output.

Listen to a few expressions from responsible voices on the vital materials situation at the moment:

"Unless four million tons of scrap are collected within the next two months (September and October), vitally needed arms for American fighting men and our allies cannot be produced in American plants."

"Only a miracle can prevent reduced steel operations within the next few months."

"The situation at Pittsburgh and Youngstown is terrible."

"Sure! We sold scrap to the Japs when we shouldn't. Sure! Jesses Jesses (or somebody) failed to accumulate reserves of natural rubber; and now the Japs have Malaya and 80 percent of the world's rubber, and Sumatra with a like proportion of its tin."

Forget it! Mr. and Mrs. Civilian. Aren't you, high school kids, doughers, and a yet substantial army of sky hooding drivers that should be in the precious service still merrily grinding away 150 tons of precious rubber every day in utterly unnecessary driving?

The point is Mr. and Mrs. American, you had better begin to look at things NOW as they ARE, not as you still lingeringly wish they were.

Your country needs many kinds of waste metal scraps and rubber desperately and at ONCE!

START NOW to comb your premises from garret to cellar for every scrap of metal or discarded article of metal or rubber, and, even for many usable articles you can manage without.

You had better do this now than have it done for you under more strained and less agreeable circumstances.

MAKE NO MISGUESS ABOUT IT; THE GOVERNMENT NEEDS THIS SCRAP AND IT IS GOING TO HAVE IT!

A Government that has not hesitated to take your son and place him on a firing line or in a submarine or send him above the clouds in war planes is not going to be in the least squeamish about entering your home to take what it needs.

And now to descend to brass tacks on the local angle of this question. When the headlines, and some of the premises for every article of iron, steel, copper, brass, zinc, aluminum, lead, rubber, tin (cans cleaned and pressed) and place them in a receptacle containing nothing else, it becomes the duty of our local authorities to see that they are collected from the place, separated into their respective categories and sent on their way by the most expeditious and direct route to their ultimate destinations.

The Grosse Pointes had a tin can collection on August 29 but instead of getting the expected 30 tons they got seven tons. Not a very flattering expression of the patriotic concern of our people in the salvaging campaign.

The fault for this can be laid largely at the door of the authorities of the village, who, distinguished from the City which makes a separation of the waste materials, the Park, Farms, Shores and Woods merely cart this waste to their respective dumping grounds where it is gone over by a few poor families who sell what they recover to junk dealers. Grosse Pointe City received 36,000 last year for the junk it sold. The other Pointe communities got nothing from this source.

The citizens of the Pointes know this and are highly dissatisfied with the arrangement. They raise the question, most reasonably, why they should not continue to place

Science Church Honors Francis Lyster Jandron

Francis Lyster Jandron, formerly of the Pointe and former treasurer and assistant general manager of the Packard Motor Car Company, has been signally honored by his election to The Christian Science Board of Directors of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts. This is the highest office in the organization to which a Christian Scientist can be advanced. Mr. Jandron is a native of Canada, attended school in the island of Jersey, and afterwards studied in England. Entering business, Mr. Jandron became associated with the Packard Motor Car Company, resigning his position in 1921 to become a Christian Science practitioner. VFW Aiding Air Cadets

Alger Post and Auxiliary Assisting With Enlistments; Meet Every Wednesday

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States have accepted a special war effort assignment given with the approval of Lieutenant General Henry A. Arnold, Chief of Army Air Forces, to assist young men between the ages of 18 and 28 in deciding to enter the air service of the United States as army aviation cadets. Alger Post No. 925 and its Auxiliary have decided to cooperate in this work and have accepted the assignment.

To become an aviation cadet applicants must first pass the air corps, physical and mental examinations. Failure in these tests would bar one from trying again for approximately 30 days. To help avoid this the Aviation Cadet Committee of Alger Post holds meetings on each Wednesday evening at the Club House, for the purpose of answering pertinent questions pertaining to this branch of service.

Physical examinations can be arranged to reveal physical defects which may be corrected before applicants go to the army doctors for final examinations. The mental examinations similar to the army "screening tests" can be taken, giving applicants a chance to determine what subject they may need to brush up on before taking the final army quiz.

So far, on each of the preceding Wednesday evenings, at least seven men have availed themselves of these opportunities. All young men ambitious to become part of the army air service are invited to the Alger Post No. 925, V. F. W. clubroom located at 17145 St. Paul, on any Wednesday evening at 8:30 where they may take a test or receive additional information.

Emergency 'Es' To Be Restricted

WARTIME HOUSEHOLD

LIGHTING As much as one-fourth of the light you pay for may be lost through gas collecting on your lamp bulbs and fixtures. Don't let this cost you extra dollars. Use the light you need in your rooms, and waste electricity. Keep lamps and fixtures clean. Wipe bulbs and reflector bowls frequently. Don't shade inside and out. Use the right size bulbs in your lamps and fixtures, and avoid shades with a white lining.

YOUR REFRIGERATOR Don't overwork your refrigerator. Use the motor in a reasonable way. Have it tested and inspected regularly. It is essential to check it around the refrigerator. Defrost regularly. Clean it with a soft brush. Use a little of the new "No Frost" spray to keep the coils free of ice. Defrost with warm water and add soap.

YOUR VACUUM CLEANER Enjoy the dust bag frequently. Once a month, turn bag inside out and beat thoroughly. Do not wash the bag. Keep brushes free from hair and threads. Replace as they wear or break. See that the removable bag is properly picked up by bag off hairpins, teeth, and metal objects.

The purpose, Commissioner Johnson stated, is to afford Cooper a reasonable time, presumably six months, in which to build himself up physically to a point where a new physical examination, it is hoped, will determine his fitness to again risk the strains which the duties of a fireman often impose.

Commissioner Damman cautioned that care must be taken that such action would not commit the Village to a permanent pension system. The general consensus of the commissioners was that it would not.

Fireman Cooper has, since his suspension, been doing work in the Public Works department suitable to his physical strength, but at a rate of pay considerably less than he received as a regular Village fireman.

Pointe Nurses Kept on Jump

Annual Report Lists Amazing Amount of Activity by Health Dept. Employees

Activities of the three full time nurses employed by the Grosse Pointe Township Health Department are revealed in an annual report, covering the period from April 1941 to March '42, which has just been released by Dr. R. H. Warren, director of the department.

Mesles seemed to be the most prevalent disease in the Pointe area during this period, the report showing that the nurses made 240 visits to or in behalf of patients suffering with this illness. Chicken pox came next, with 100 visits, then scarlet fever, 86. German measles, 68, whooping cough, 40, poliomyelitis, 16, and mumps, 11.

The nurses made a total of 1,695 visits to homes and 1,583 to schools. Sixty-four meetings were attended, 1,245 interviews were given, 1,216 hours were spent in administrative work in the office.

The report lists nine cases of childhood tuberculosis, three of them new cases during the year, and 33 cases of adult tuberculosis, six of these being new ones.

Under the heading of clinics, the figures show a total of 101

Pointes May Follow Detroit 'Library Friends' Movement

Down in Detroit the Public Library is undertaking the formation of a group of public-spirited friends and patrons of the Library in an organization to be known as the 'Friends of the Library.'

One of the prime purposes of such an organization, a number of which are already functioning in some of the larger cities of the country, is to stimulate among the citizens of the community the practice of donating to the Library valuable manuscripts, old books and prints, particularly of local historical interest.

Inquiry at the Grosse Pointe Library elicited the information that while no exactly similar organization existed here there have been somewhat similar groups in the recent past which have worked earnestly and effectively in the interest of the library.

In 1933, during the depths of the depression, when the local institution was embarrassed by lack of funds, a numerous group of Pointe men and women organized to aid the Library. The

children's clinics were attended by 1,463 patients. Complete tonics were given 128 and Schick tests 79. T. B. tests were given 44, whooping cough inoculations to 60 and 65 were vaccinated. Two were given typhoid shots.

The nurses made 452 visits to school rooms and reported 702 minor illnesses. First aid treatment was given in 615 cases and 1,768 eye examinations were conducted. Conferences with principals numbered 275, and interviews with parents 135. A total of 1,464 hours were spent in schools in the Pointe area, and 620 calls were made at homes.

Hold Nine Eye Clinics
A total of nine eye clinics were conducted with 139 attendances and the dental report shows a total of 2,884 inspected in the public schools and 1,151 in the parochial schools. It was found that 115 had already been subjected to orthodonture and 204 were found who needed similar treatment. Ninety-two pupils were found who had no dentists. The figures show that 1,270 pupils were examined whose teeth were "completely O. K."

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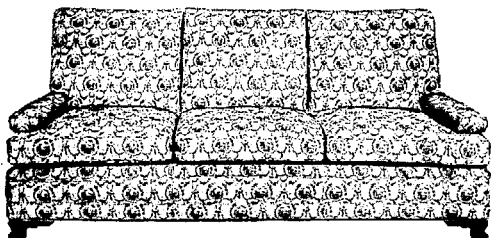

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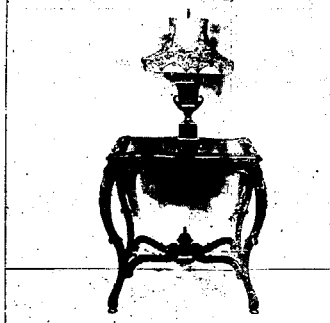
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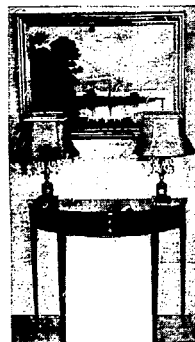

Industrial arts, physical education, and adult education supervision. During the past summer the consolidation of administrative responsibility for these specialized educational services was completed and Mr. Barnes is, in this appointment, directly charged with responsibility for coordinating them.

Hope for Improvements According to Dr. Essert, certain definite improvements are hoped for eventually as a result of Mr. Barnes' new position.

Accelerated improvement of teaching content and methods in reading, writing and citizenship and mathematics in the elementary schools will result from the use of Mrs. Ethel Cove, principal of Trembly School, as Acting Supervisor of Curriculum under Mr. Barnes' direction.

The excellent program of music developed over the past four years under the supervision of William Watkins, has reached a point in the school program where it should be given more time in the daily schedule of hundreds of young musicians. It will be an objective of the Assistant Superintendent to eliminate conflicts of music education with less significant work of the student of music.

For the youth to whom music is important, the Grosse Pointe schools will eventually offer as rich a program as it now does in literature. Mr. Barnes will not only assist Mr. Watkins in developing such a program in music, but will move along the same lines in art, dramatics, and bodily aesthetics.

Physical Education In physical education the demands of the times are for strong, vigorous and healthful bodies to stand up under the rigors of war and a faster tempo of living. This may be accomplished by increased attention to

nutrition and healthful discipline in every elementary school child. It will also demand an enriched program of intramural sports in high school pupils. The secondary schools of Grosse Pointe have usually taken a position of leadership in this kind of program. Mr. Barnes will seek to further stimulate such program in the entire school system.

In industrial arts, the youth of Grosse Pointe schools will be increasingly taught the relationship of science, invention and technical machine and labor to their daily life. The Assistant Superintendent will coordinate vocational training which prepares youth only for those jobs which actually demand their services will be the use of Mrs. Ethel Cove, school and post-graduate training.

Will Bridge Gap Finally, the new organization completed by this appointment will seek to bridge the gap between the present school program and adult education.

Under the supervision of Fortunate Geary, who now becomes associated with Mr. Barnes' department, the present vigorous program of adult education, war production training in Grosse Pointe should become increasingly valuable to the young adult who graduates from high school and remains in the community or is about to enter specialized military service. Mr. Barnes, Mr. Geary and their associates will attempt to relate this adult education to more recent high school experience, and to the age of high school graduates.

The present refinement of the general secondary school curriculum which have been carried cooperatively by the secondary principals and teachers and the Department of Instruction, will be continued under Mr. Barnes' direction.

"Is Admirably Fitted" "Mr. Barnes is admirably fitted for these responsibilities," said Dr. Essert. "In this appointment the Board of Education has recognized his twelve years of splendid achievement in Grosse Pointe Schools, first as Principal of Grosse Pointe High School
