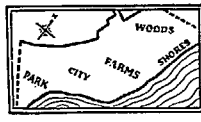

Anglo-American Relations

Now that Britain has been able to spare certain elements of her own sorely needed sea strength to help us enter our Atlantic coast, we will hear less about our entry into this war to pull her chestnuts out of the fire and much less about Lend-Lease and the other war-time transaction carried on at our expense.

It is unfortunate that so many of the bright young men on whom we depend largely for our war needs and the interpretation of history in the making have an abbreviated understanding of the whole general picture of Anglo-American relations.

Everybody knows, of course, we have had two wars with England. What many have never grasped, however, is that the American Revolution was, on England's part simply an attempt to keep within the folds of her empire a group of rebellious colonies, carried on in a desultory fashion for seven years while she was engaged in vitally more important enterprises in Europe.

Where England failed in her effort we succeeded in several subsequent military enterprises of similar purpose; as for example, the Mexican War to make good our admission of Texas, the Civil War, the Philippine Insurrection in 1899-1901, and the last in which we cavalierly ignored the fact that we were newcomers in the islands and that the Filipino people had already carried on a four years' war for independence from their Spanish oppressors.

The War of 1812, often referred to as our second war for independence, was caused by England's unwillingness to accord to her late colonies, now launched on the stormy road of independence, the same freedom of action which she stoutly maintained for herself.

When Captain Robert B. Ingham, British Minister in London, that the United States should take cognizance of the conspiracy that was on foot in Europe to force the lately successful rebellious colonies of South America into a renewed allegiance to the Spanish throne he, in his own language, "called the New World into existence to redress the balance of the Old."

For Britain's master strategy for the maintenance of the balance of power on the continent of Europe but for us it was the recognition by the greatest sea power in the world of our position of primacy in the Western Hemisphere, a recognition that has never been denied by Britain since that distant day which has ever since its pronouncement been the cardinal point in all our foreign policy.

This was the original Atlantic Charter. It has since been reaffirmed by countless experiences, and mounting convincingly to a prime point in British foreign policy, which is the maintenance of American goodwill, and to the subconscious understanding on our part that these people, living on that small island on the northwestern fringe of Europe, are and have been for generations past our only basic allies in any world crisis.

It was in evidence of this understanding that Commodore Tatnall, in command of our China station during the war between Britain and China in 1840, who, when he saw a small British corvette about to be annihilated by a swarm of British junk-boats, temper mounting by the spectacle of mere of his own race and speech in deadly peril, bellowed from his bridge, "Hell! Blood is thicker than water; sound clear for action." A few well directed broadsides from the heavier American frigate and the issue was settled.

This was what John Bright, the Great Commoner of Britain and the leader of the middle classes of the England that will always be meant when he pleaded the cause of free men against human slavery so effectively at Rochester, England, December 3, 1861, as to stave the hand of the then Tory government of Britain that was itching to interfere in the war between the states at the height of the Trent Affair.

It was the understanding of the essential reality of the Anglo-American accord that determined the same British government to agree so readily to the arbitration of the Alabama claims and its payment to us of \$15,000,000 gold.

Admiral Chichester, in command of the British fleet in Manila Bay in the Summer of 1898 had this same thing in mind when he told Von Deterlots, in response to the German naval commander's query, that only he (Chichester) and Admiral Dewey knew what joint action the two fleets would take if the Germans started anything.

The British Admiral at Manilla was that day along the same lines when he tipped off our Consul Darric that Cervera had sailed from Spain.

The British naval officers at Hong Kong were of similar mind in 1898 when they kindly made a "loan" of 8-inch

his main battleships, and which by a significant coincidence exactly fitted the American fleet. A day or two later he sailed from Mirza Bay to his world changing victory on May 1 at Manila.

Such experiences could be multiplied indefinitely out of the records of the last century and more, known, however, in this day only to the relatively few who have made an intimate and friendly study of the relations between the two countries.

The British Government has always placed first emphasis on the interests of its subjects and its people, and so does every other government that is worth the name. Our own has played no mean role in this same game and invariably with the enthusiastic approval of our own people.

These momentary disputes that arise in the realm of trade and normal peacetime contacts will not, however, blind the vision of thinking men and women to the elemental and enduring qualities of Anglo-American understanding.

Today our countries are united as co-champions of a common cause whose issues transcend all divisional lines of politics or of trade and industry. It is nothing less than the perpetuation of human freedom and of a decent human society in the world in which we and our children must live.

prevent flooded basements where rich are below the high water level of Milk River, they will reduce greatly the number of basements that would be flooded in case the power lines are again struck by lightning during a storm of cloud-burst proportions.

The news received about the additional money to be granted the Wayne County Road Commission to install the interceptor sanitary sewer is very good indeed because it is something that has long been wanted and hoped for and means the solution of our sewage disposal.

**Bids Too High**

This work was to have been started last spring but when bids were received for the work by the Wayne County Road Commission, they were found to be much higher than the amounts appropriated and the Federal grant to build this sewer. Additional funds were applied for and it has taken all summer to get a favorable reply.

This proposed interceptor is to be a six foot diameter barrel installed parallel to the main sewer and coming from the Nine Mile Road through our Village into the River. The proposed installation in Grosse Pointe Farms from where sewage is pumped into the river.

This interceptor is to be about 40 feet deep and is to be installed by tunneling. It is designed to handle only the so-called dry weather flow or raw sewage during the winter months. It will not be filled in at this time as it will still be needed as an outlet for the water which will be a great deal less dirty and polluted because the raw sewage will no longer be pumped into it.
