Sanitary Conditions Menace Growing Population to North and West

The rapid increase in population in the Woods, Grosse, and East Detroit, due largely to war industry work, the sanitary conditions in this area have caused concern to the government.

This area has been disposing of its sewage, untreated, into Lake St. Clair. Its formal adoption, however, will depend on the drafting of a contract between the Farm and Wayne county under which the Farm will pump the sanitary sewage to lower Macomb county and Great Township, Grosse Pointe Woods and Grosse Pointe Shores in Wayne county.

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Victory Via Playfields

The Detroit Board of Education did a wise thing the other night in voting down a proposal to banish competitive athletics from the schools during the duration of the war. At the very moment when the Government is virtually directing a change in the curricula of the American public school system the better to prepare the boys, and to a certain extent the girls also, for more effective service to their country in time of war, it would have been worse than foolish to have prohibited those school interests which directly contribute to the building of muscle, courage and character; mighty desirable qualities in embryo soldiers.

"Morale building" is a much overplayed term in the "everybody do something" atmosphere of the war. There is a well justified suspicion that in some directions it has degenerated into a mere racket serving as a cloak of respectability for a bunch of able bodied gentlemen who might better be toting a rifle.

There can be no question however about the type of morale building expressed in the athletic games displayed on the school campuses. It makes better men by every test of the boys who participate and excites a wholesome envy among the lads in the stand who wish they could be down on the field with the "heroes."

Wellington said the battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eton. America must not pass up its opportunity to win some not far distant Armageddon by the present abandonment of its own countless playing fields.

Offices and Men

In a very few days the people of Michigan are going to decide at the polls whether or not those of their number who reside in Wayne County are to be privileged by a special provision in the state constitution to set up a new structure of county government, which for convenience sake has been popularly called "Home Rule."

Those who would be affected by this change, the residents of Wayne County, constitute probably somewhat less than two fifths of the state's population.

The primary change that would be effected in the county government, if the Home Rule amendment prevails, would be the abolition of the present cumbersome Board of 161 County Supervisors and the substitution therefor of a small and more efficient group of 21 regularly elected supervisors from duly designated subdivisions of the county.

The present unwieldy Board of Supervisors is even less representative of the people than appears, as upwards of fifty of its number find their places on the Board under a system of selection somewhat akin to the archaic "Rotten Boroughs" scheme that prevailed in England a century ago.

Here in Grosse Pointe, which is an especially favored community built up largely on the desire of many former residents of Detroit to create a residential section where they might escape the governmental supervision of Detroit and enjoy a certain form of "home rule" of their own, there is a disposition to look askance at any change in the county government which might at some future time, with the enlarged county powers which the proposed change implies, become an encroachment on the very "home rule" qualities of their present status which they cherish very highly.

The people of the Pointes however must remember that they are an integral part of the County, inseparably tied up with it in all matters having to do with questions of County government and that they must weigh for themselves the merits or objections to the new plan.

The quality of local government, be it village, city or county, depends more on the character and abilities of the men who administer it than upon the particular structure under which they function. Good men in office will, and usually do, give a good accounting even under a poor structural setup, while inversely, the best structure humbly devisable will not assure honest and efficient government under the administration of men who are incapable or venal.

The reason the Pointe communities have enjoyed through the years a superior type of local government has been because they have been fortunate enough to find among their citizens a class of men who have been willing to serve on their Committees and Councils, at a considerable sacrifice of time and personal convenience, for the public good rather than their own private advantage.

Crime Stuff
We were discussing crimes and prisons and the Man Who Knew told us many stories. Some day he said, he would put them all into a book, but that would be, perhaps, a year or two from now and if I wanted I could use some of the anecdotes, provided I didn't mention his name. Here they are:

A man charged with murdering his wife in Alabama was indicted for manslaughter. There was no question of a guilty but a jury returned the verdict "Guilty of horse-stealing." The judge asked the foreman for an explanation. The answer was: "This is not a case of manslaughter but woman-slaughter, for which the law makes no provision. We felt, however, the man deserved to be hanged, so we brought in a verdict of horse-stealing which in this section is a re to swine him." The judge discharged the prisoner who had been convicted of crime not charged in the indictment.

Marian Payne, wife of a prominent attorney of Amarillo, Tex., was brutally murdered one morning in 1929. Her husband offered \$5,000 as a reward for the arrest of the killer. Amarillo's leading editor, Gene Howe, accepted the challenge and enlisted the aid of A. McDonald, eminent Kansas City newspaper man. Three weeks later, Payne was arrested and confessed to the crime. He is the only criminal on record who ever bought a reward for his own capture.

On the other hand, Ulysses Johnson is the only man in America who is serving time in prison because he solved a crime. Johnson wanted to be a detective. He applied for a job on the police force of a small Missouri town but was rejected. Two weeks later, on March 10, 1937, a train was wrecked. For months the police were baffled. Finally, Johnson offered his services and came back with the incriminating evidence (a pick that was used in the derail) so quickly the police became suspicious. They questioned Johnson and he confessed to the crime. He had wrecked the train in the hope of gaining recognition through the solution of the case and winning, perhaps, what he considered so much—a job as a detective.

Manuel DeLima, 18-year-old Brazilian, killed a Norwegian citizen on a Swedish ship in American waters during a dispute over a shaving brush. The newspapers demanded the right to try the young man and finally it was decided to turn him over to his native country. Said DeLima, who later was acquitted: "I'll never shave again. I'll grow the biggest beard in history." And he did.

Ever hear of a murdered woman getting married? In 1932, Condy Danby was convicted of murdering Mary Vireeny in Kentucky. The corpse, which was a number of bones found in a cave. After Condy served 10 years in prison Mary showed up—and denied the man was dead. It was then proved that the bones were those of a delirious Condy. Danby was released and later Mary married her life long sweetheart. Nobody knows, though, where Mary was during those 10 years.

The first woman to wear "slacks" was Marie Olivier, a Frenchwoman. She had been convicted of marrying three husbands without awaiting for the demise of or divorce from any of them. In order to make her aware that she wasn't doing the right thing, the court ordered her to wear pants for the rest of her life.

At the turn of the century, Dave Tucker held up an Oregon bank in his home town at the point of a gun. He was sentenced to a long term in prison and, after 10 years was released. For a long time he headed around the country, avoiding his home town, but finally he returned, worked hard, prospered and eventually won the respect of his fellow citizens. Twenty years later he became president of the bank he once had robbed.

With Their Own Weapons

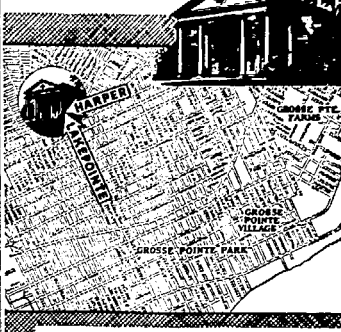
There has been a deal of talk in this country ever since we got into the war for months ago about this being an "all out war," a "total war," etc, but there are still a vast number of persons who do not realize that this means everybody and everything in the Nation. If they do realize it they still fail to give visual evidence of the fact.

This will come, of course, with the increasing economic pressure and change which is the inevitable accompaniment of modern war. The full efficiency of the country cannot be directed toward staying a winning war until the recognition of this changed status takes place. By executive orders, by the constantly enlarged war powers conferred upon the President by Congress as well as by the force of natural economic processes the American people are undergoing a rapid orientation which will point every face toward war. And the sooner this complete conversion is achieved the sooner will a grisly task be finished.

We are pitted against two nations which have directed their whole economy towards the waging of war. Their economy has been arranged towards this end not only during the actual progress of war but in both cases has antedated war itself by many years. Germany and Japan were on a more complete war basis five years before the war started than we are today nine months after our actual entry, and more than two years after the time of its clear inevitability.

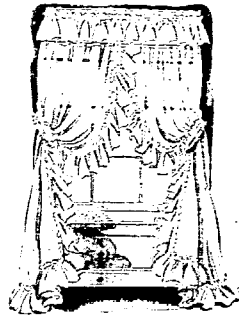

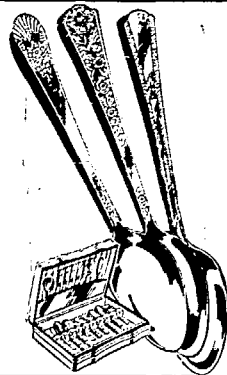

Wipe all lamp bulbs frequently—also reflector bowls and ceiling fixtures. Dust your lamp shades inside and out. Remember that dust collects insidiously, day by day—cleaning lights before you replace them.

SECOND—Dark colored lamp shades soak up light like a thirsty sponge absorbing water. A light colored shade is far more efficient because it reflects more light into the room where it can do some good. If you have a dark shade and want to increase its usefulness, try fitting it with a white lining. The difference in the amount of light reflected will surprise you!

THIRD—Use the right size bulbs in your lamps and fixtures. Too large a bulb can result in just as poor lighting as too small a bulb.
