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War Chest Meaning

Never before have the people of the Detroit Metropolitan area been asked to contribute to a cause which strikes so many responsive chords as the great War Chest drive which opened last Monday.

Not only does it include all of those worthy agencies for the relief of human distress and for social betterment which normally benefit from the Community Fund, but the appeal is doubly strong this year in that it presents to all an opportunity to give to those peoples who are suffering and dying in the great cause which brought us into the struggle.

In this great cosmopolitan community there are large racial groups which will find in them allocations from the Detroit War Chest a direct outlet for their contributions for the help of dear ones back in the homeland whence they came so recently.

Knee little Holland and Norway who refused to bend the knee to the conqueror; Mighty Russia whose titanic struggle for her freedom and for ours, is drenching her soil with the blood of countless thousands of her sons; Ancient China, who lifted her hoary head above the graves of departed empires to fight our battle in the Far East years before we dreamed of entering the war; Poland, a once proud nation in Central Europe and again to take her rightful place in the world of free and friendly states; Rookribred Britain, who stood for more than a year as the sole barrier against the hordes of barbarism, who has held the highways of the seas at fearful cost and fought a battle in her own skies that future historians will agree in a common struggle to save the world for freedom, will be beneficiaries of what we here in this splendid Detroit community give between now and November 12.

It is not enough that Detroit should be the industrial capital of the Arsenal of Democracy. Out of the generous wage which tens of thousands of us receive we must cheerfully part with a decent proportion for those who have thus far done most of the actual fighting and the dying in our common cause.

Voters' Responsibilities—1942

It is always the duty of every qualified elector to vote. It is doubly important that the citizen should vote in the years of the national election, and supremely important that they should vote in war time.

This is the one and only opportunity the people have to express an authoritative opinion on the conduct of the war by the national administration. There should be no misunderstanding as to the effective quality of this voice. A notable reduction in the majority party's representation in the House could only be interpreted as indicating discontent with the conduct of the war. Inversely, little change in the House would reflect public contentment, or an increase in the Democratic majority could only be accepted as strong approval.

Local candidates will, as always, be selected largely on their personal popularity or recognized qualifications. Proposed constitutional changes this year justify the close attention of the voters. In one instance they will decide whether a constitutional convention is to be held to prepare a general revision of the basic law of the state and in another case authorization is to be either granted or denied for the people of Wayne county to set up a new form of county government for this county. This is the so-called Home Rule Amendment and the concern only to the people of Wayne county but to be passed upon by the electorate of the whole state.

Along with the disposition of the various personal candidates by the voters comes the larger implication of the degree of earnestness the men and women of the country feel as participants in their own affairs. Neglect of the privilege of voting is a direct abatement of the favorite charge of the totalitarian enemies of our country that the people of democracies are notoriously indifferent and unworthy of voice or authority in government.

Opportunity

The people of Michigan will have an opportunity next Tuesday to vote for a candidate for the United States Senate whose chief claim to their support is the diploma he holds as a graduate of the Huey Long college of statecraft in Louisiana.

If the electorate of this supposedly intelligent state wishes to be represented in the Upper House of the National Legislature by this type of statesman, a choice is offered here which should not be ignored.

With the election coming up next Tuesday, Claude G. McDonald, Republican candidate for Congress, has issued the following statement:

"The New Deal strategy seems to be the setting up of bureaus and overstaffing them with the result that a certain proportion of the votes are subsidized. Millions of people are dependent on the Democratic party and its sympathizers for their livelihood. In most cases, they vote for the side that controls their jobs. There are five million people or more on the government payroll today.

"I am told the Navy Department alone, before the War, was employing 30,000 people. At the same time, Japan was employing 1,000 people to do the same job. This sort of overstaffing is not only expensive but it tends to reduce efficiency, and is the reason for a good part of the bungling that has gone on since.

"Another phase of the New Deal strategy is Regimentation. I will admit that there is a certain amount of this necessary in war time, but I do not approve of the very same attempt to use the war as an excuse to put across measures that further regimentation has against the people unecessarily.

"Your gas rationing in this territory is one example. In my opinion, that is entirely unnecessary and is going to be very harmful to the Defense Program, because of the long distances working men have to travel to and from their jobs. As will result, a traffic problem that will be hard to solve.

"Sugar rationing is another example. The regular use of sugar up to 65 years of age is healthier, and it's all part of a plan that was laid out long before the war started.

"I think we should do everything in our power to get back to the Republican form of government, which the founders of this Republic adopted, and which the New Deal seems bent upon destroying. You never hear men of our government refer to us as a Republic anymore, as they did when I went to school. Our great leaders of history always refer to this country as a Republic.

Big Dressing Quota Handed To Red Cross

Will Keep Station No. 1 Busy All Winter Starting Monday; Need Workers

The American Red Cross Station No. 1, located at 5377 Fisher road, which is Grosse Pointe's own organization will open next Monday, November 2, on a five day per week basis, Monday through Friday from 9:30 a. m. to 4 p. m.

The Detroit Red Cross area, of which the Pointe is a part, has had a quota of 2,000,000 surgical dressings placed upon it. This huge quota will keep all the Red Cross stations in the area working at top speed for the next five months, well through the winter. Mrs. Mable Taylor, in charge of the Grosse Pointe station urges all former workers to report for duty next Monday and will welcome the aid of any of the ladies of the Pointe who have had experience in surgical dressing work.

No particular proportion of this area quota is handed to the Grosse Pointe station. It has always been the practice here to make all they could. How well this has been done in the past is evidenced by the fact that the local station has produced as high as 50,000 dressings in a single month. This rate of output means that the Pointe, with practically one-sixth of the population of the county, has produced a tenth of the present quota for the entire area, which is estimated to run about 500,000 dressings a month.

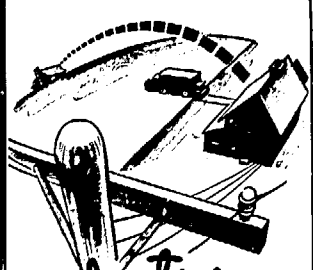

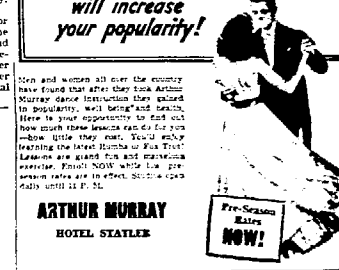



and a system of relief mains of moderate size to connect local street sewers to the interceptor mains. Only the first part of this program has carried out. In view of this situation, it is clear that the drainage problem of the village will not be solved until the system of relief mains is built.

As a result of heavy storms in the summer of 1941, the village commission retained a firm of consulting civil engineers to make a survey and to draw up plans and specifications for the relief mains necessary for completing the system. This was before Pearl Harbor. A preliminary report of the engineers in January 1942 estimated the cost of this work to be as follows:

(a) For immediate construction — \$233,120.00
(b) For future construction — 145,210.00
Total — 378,330.00

Upon the basis of this estimate, the village commission ordered the engineers to proceed to prepare detailed plans and specifications for the \$34,100 portion of the relief mains program which in detailed plans were ready. The cost of materials and labor included due to war conditions, to such an extent that the engineers estimate of cost was revised upward by \$55,235.00 with indications that costs would rise considerably more by the time the village could be approved by the voters.

of jamaica flooding cases reported this year were due to local trouble. In one case the plumbing inspector reached into the basement floor drain and pulled out a toy rubber ball which was causing the stoppage. In another case, a broken stick in the floor sewer permitted the earth to clog the sewer. In several cases the householders have found that by having their plumbers rod out their house sewers they were able to dispose of grease, which was stopping the flow. In other cases the stoppage was caused by a broken sewer rod through from the street. Upon digging up the house sewer, they found it partially or completely clogged with tree roots. The village desires to be helpful to the householders in finding the cause of their sewer troubles but it can not go into the plumbing business. If a basement floods during a storm and if the water does not recede promptly after the storm, local trouble is indicated. Any householder having this kind of trouble is advised to call his plumber. If there is any doubt on the part of the householder as to the cause of this trouble, the village will be glad to send its plumbing inspector to inspect the premises and to give his advice. No charge will be made for such service.

In conclusion the village feels that by prosecuting its sewer cleaning program diligently until every sewer that can be cleaned has been cleaned and by cooperating fully with the householders who are experiencing back-water trouble, the village will get the most efficient service possible out of its sewerage system. Any further improvement in public sewerage facilities must wait until the village normal construction conditions after the war.
