Too Far Ahead

There is still entirely too much senseless talk going around in this country about the kind of human society we intend to set up throughout the whole world when this war is ever.

About all that the average man in this country knows about the present war is that since Hitler came to power in Germany nine years ago that country has been prepared with diabolical thoroughness for a war of world conquest. Hitler was naive enough to tell us that himself nearly twenty years ago when he wrote Mein Kampf in a prison cell.

The average citizen in this country knows that Hitler, by treaties made to be broken, by training the youth of his country to be international brigands, by instilling in the German people a racial arrogance that is an insult and a menace to the whole civilized world, he, more than any other individual on the planet prepared the Heli's broth which now threatens civilization.

The average American knows that Japan was planning the conquest of all Asia when it sent up its cry of "Asia for the Asiatics" more than a decade ago and that meant war with any country or people who aspired to equal status with the Japanese in their captive half of the world.

We Americans know that the Bombastes Furioso who heads the Italian state, whose ureams of restoring the "Glories" of Ancient Rome were unwisely permitted nourishment in his piffling defeat of a few million black men fighting with spears and obsolete riles in Ethiopia in 1935, sprang at France in her death throes and so not only land in 1918 but committed his people to one of the most disgraceful and cowardly acts in history.

We know that Germany deliberately planned this war and made it inevitable by her attack on Poland after the rape of Czecho-Slovakia.

We know that the Japanese attacked us at Pearl Harbor while their lying ambassadors were estensibly ne-gotiating a modus vivendi in Washington for maintaining the peace in the Pacific.

track thinking citizen or one of the starty-eyed altruist
who dream of a world of sweetness and light while the
destruction of his own homeland is planned by those whose

Such planning at this time is looking much too far into the future, either Mr. Willkie or the Sage of Emporia to the contrary notwithstanding. It leads only to further confusion and a dissipation of thought and energy which now, more than at any time in our whole history, so desperately needs unity and single minded directness.

With these general steps toward a coming world of mutual respect and honor among nations there need be no cholate. We Americans sincerely want that and fortusately our record in the past gives guaranty of our post war attitude. By comparison with that of any other nation on Earth it shines like the morning star.

When, however, we begin to intimate that the war is to be followed by a millenzium in which there will be a leveling off of commercial and industrial privileges and opportunities we are not only failing to act honestly with many of our present allies but we are opening a vertiable many of our present allies and two are opening a vertiable rest of the World and inroducing an economic nightmare for our own people. our own people.

Such a program suggests at once the possibility of the maintenance of the high standards of living in our country; the defenceless competition of American work-men with the cheap labor of Asia and other parts of the World; our impotence to take measures to protect our own, in short, it brings up the whole gamut of American spiritual and material life.

No people in the World wish more sincerely for a better World after the war than the American people. They are in this war quite largely to bring this about, but, primarily they are in it because they have been attacked by ruthless powers who would destroy us if they could, and who could and would if they won the war. Directly this brings us back to the real issue which is nothing less than the preservation of our way of life with all that this implies.

implies.

Our people will not agree for a single moment to any program of post war dispositions which would threaten the favored way of life which we enjoy. What we have we have fought for and worked for all our national life. It has not been gained at the expense of any of those peoples who are our partners in this struggle, nor at the expense of any of those peoples who are our partners in this struggle, nor at the expense of any of those profited substantially by their contacts with us.

We know that we cannot lift 500,000,000 or 1,000,000,000 of the human race to our level of wellbeing by any seartifices or concessions we might miske, and we know also that the attempt to do it would inevitably pull us down to a level approximating their own.

To suggest such a thing is pure fol de rol and only invites a mess of trouble and embarrassment. It could easily lay the foundations for a Third World War.

One job and only one confronts this Nation at this time. We have first to win this most vital war in our whole lattery.

Any present confusion or any ill advised suggestion leading to future trouble is a distinct national disservice

Harmful Censorship

It is difficult for either a Government or its citizens esolve the problem of how much or how little of in-nation concerning military or naval operations should

be divulged.

Information of losses or gains suffered either by us or our enemies which weath be of value to the enemy should unquestionably be withheld. Information which is already known to the enemy should not be withheld from the people at home, come good or bad. To do so only gives support to the charge which is now openly made that it is already a policy of our Government to withhold had news until some good news breaks which can be given out to at least partially offset in.

least partially offsetit.

If this is true the Government must change its policy quickly or the time will come soon when all of its information services will be discredited.

It would be impossible to imagine a more dangerous situation in a nation of free men, where confidence in the honesty of their Government is vital to the successful prosecution. onesty of their (cution of a war.

A Government which is doubtful of the stamins of its people and of their ability to withstand the shock of had news without a serious deterioration of morale, has already led them half way down the road to defeat.

The other day the country learned that three of its heavy cruizers had been sunk in the Solomon Islands. This was a naval disaster of hig proportions, but the bad effect on public morale was increased ten fold by the accompanying information that the loss had occurred two menths before.

The people can take bad news but they will not long tolerate an obvious distrust by their own Government of their heart and staying qualifies.

In plain language the Japanese War office in Tokyo knew what had happened to three of our important naval units in the far off Soulh Facilite two months before the American people knew it. The Government's handling of this information was a bungling affront to the people.
