Sugar Cards And Coffee Well Mixed

Sugar Hoarders Can't Get Coupon Books; Coffee to Be Rationed on Coupons
Coffee and sugar have got tangled up among the rationees. When the Sugar cards were issued some hoarders were refused to persons who had sugar reserves in their homes in excess of the modest amount permitted by the rationing regulations.
As many persons had a considerable cache of sugar to the rationing regulations, these parties are still hoarding sugar with coffee running under way on the 25th, and the present intention being to issue the sugar card for the first allotment, the problem at the moment is how to use up the surplus sugar cards, going to get coffee.
Industrious Lacking
So far the local rationing board has had no instructions covering the dilemma. One suggestion in the local office, that may be employed in the absence of a card or instructions from the rationers, would be to issue the sugar coupon books to individuals who have no coffee to turn out. The body of a woman, tentatively identified as Mary Green-son, aged 55, 4844 Algou ave., was taken from Lake St. Clair by the Grand Marine police yesterday. Identity was established by a wedding ring that the woman was wearing.
At noon yesterday, J. L. V. Loxton, an agent for the South River County, 1932 E. Jefferson, reported to the Park police that a woman's hat was found on the beach at the foot of Grand Marine.
Detective Arthur Robert Butts and Sergeant Lawrence Butts returned to the scene and discovered the body about ten feet out from the beach. Because the woman was wearing a reddish brown hat, the Detectives were unable to locate the body immediately, because they thought the floating object was a mass of leaves.
The detectives estimated that the body had been in the water about 10 hours.

All Legitimate Gas Needs Will Be Met

Rationing Board Will Not Withhold Fuel in Any Cases of Business Necessity; Must Sell Extra Tires, Cooperate in 'Riding Club' for Extra Gas

L. M. Bartlett, member of the Grosse Pointe Rationing Board and in charge of the gas rationing procedure for the Pointe area, emphasizes the extreme importance of every car driver, either of passenger car or commercial vehicle, arranging early for his gas allocation.
The driver of every passenger car, whether used as such or intended for use as a taxi, must first possess a Basic Mileage Book. The procurement of a supplementary gas allowance is a later procedure which can only be effected by first obtaining the basic or "A" card. The elementary schools throughout the Pointe were open from 8:30 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. yesterday, are open today during these same hours and will be open again tomorrow for the same period to accommodate applicants for the Basic Mileage cards. Every person who owns a passenger car is entitled to one of these Basic Mileage Books.
For Supplementary Gas
All those who contemplate the necessity of supplementary gas allowances should obtain the necessary forms the element of any school where they make application for the initial Basic Mileage Book. The card can be taken home and filed out immediately and mailed to the Rationing Board at 311 Jefferson. Failure to do this promptly will probably result in their not getting their Supplementary gas cards, commonly referred to as "B" and "C" cards until some time after December 1.

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War is Interfering With School League

Under Cities Loop Curtails Inter-School Contests Due to Transportation Problems

Because of limitation of transportation facilities, the Cities League, of which Grosse Pointe High School is a member, has curtailed inter-school athletic and other contests for the current school year.

At a recent meeting of league members, it was decided that no member schools be permitted to withdraw from the league because of unfavorable conditions of transportation difficulties.

Rumney Asks To Resign as City's Mayor

Has Gone Into Aircraft Production Service for Duration; Council Demurs

Mayor Mason P. Rumney, of Grosse Pointe City, who was called into production service by the Army an intensive couple weeks ago tried to resign as Mayor of the City Council Monday afternoon.

It was so discouraged by every one of the Councilmen that he finally withdrew his resignation from the office, at least for the time being.

The Mayor stated that all of his time heretofore for the duration of the war would belong to the Government and that his continuation in the Mayor's office would only be possible if each of the Councilmen would in some way practically take over all of his duties during the war.

The Councilmen were all opposed to his resignation, and they were earnestly anxious to make a division of executive duties which would assure the retention of Mr. Rumney as titular head of the municipality.

The Mayor stated that even this arrangement might not be practicable, as when he accepted the summons to Government service one of the conditions which was applicable in all similar situations, was that the Government had first and exclusive claim on all of his time. This right might not be invoked in his case as head of a municipal government, but it was felt that the possibility be kept in mind.

In Aircraft Production
Mayor Rumney will be in the production service for the Central District in Aircraft building which commences this week. As President of the Detroit Steel Products Company, which has expanded for years in the manufacture of metal in Detroit, he is particularly qualified to give valuable aid to the Government in the strengthening out of hot metals that arise in securing essential metal in aircraft building.

His headquarters for the time being will be at the Graham-Bishop plant out on Warren avenue.

He emphasized again that all of his time belonged to the Government. On inquiry from the other Councilmen present as to his probable ability to attend the monthly evening meetings of the Council, he stated:

The Grosse Pointe Office of the Citizens' Service Corps has approved expansion of its program of rapid expansion in the Grosse Pointe area. Capt. John J. O'Brien, area commander, has announced the formation of the Citizens' Service Corps for the Grosse Pointe area.

The Citizens' Service Corps embraces all those persons of Grosse Pointe who are available for work which do not fall within the classification of regular and seasonal employees, such as police and fire departments, and road work and medical corps.

 - 1 cup flour
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 cup finely grated raw potatoes
 - 1 cup finely grated raw carrots
 - 1 cup currants or seedless raisins
 - 1 cup chopped walnut kernels
 - Mix and sift sugar, flour, baking powder, salt and soda. Add remaining ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Steam two hours in small molds or three hours in large mold if used. Serve with hard sauce or any favorite steamed pudding sauce.

application of gas rationing in this area.

Mayor Runney's letter, which was identical to all the parties to whom he appealed, was as follows:

November 8, 1942
Honorable Donald M. Nelson, Chairman, War Production Board, Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:

While Grosse Pointe is strictly a residential area, its residents are largely engaged in war activities; its men are in war plants and war industries, its women in a score of highly important volunteer defense activities. Because of its location, Grosse Pointe depends almost wholly on the motor car for its transportation, especially now that defense plants are scattered over such a wide territory.

Gasoline rationing, as presently planned and proposed, threatens extreme hardships for Grosse Pointe residents, and at the same time seriously threatens disruption of our all-out war effort. Even though war workers in the course of time will be given adequate gasoline for necessary driving, the immense number of cars throughout this section makes an appreciable delay in classification impossible.

Grosse Pointe is convinced that a controlled 35-mile speed limit will achieve all desired conservation of rubber, held by governmental agencies to be the sole objective of rationing. We are not in the position of asking that proposed gasoline rationing be abandoned, but we do earnestly request that rationing be delayed a sufficient time for governmental experts to make such exhaustive surveys to ascertain if a strictly enforced 35-mile speed limit will not achieve everything desired, without breaking down our war efforts, disrupting our economic life and lowering our civilian morale.

We plead that you give this thing over from the rubber rationing. I think it is inadvisable and unnecessary except as a last resort—and I have not yet reached the "last resort" by any means. I am very much afraid that the rubber rationing system will create serious interference with actual war production work in the defense sectors of southeastern Michigan.

But M. Henderson and his OPA staff are adamant on the subject.

You will understand of course that I have not mentioned the new entirely drastic and beyond my legislative reach. The Bureau of the Automobile has said that all that I can do is to "share" with them. This is what I have been doing with all the complaints I have sent to you in the past few weeks. I have finally put the whole thing squarely up to you, Mr. Henderson. I have put him on notice regarding the matter which he is writing and I asked him to send a high ranking official immediately to the Detroit area not only to contact the local problem at first hand but also to stay there (in the event of rationing) so as to be able to apply immediate and adequate corrections to the rationing rules and regulations if they should be found to be unworkable.

I wish this answer to your letter might be more direct, helpful. But I think I have now exhausted all of my own resources in connection with this preventive and post-ventive procedure. I shall see that your letter is immediately sent to Mr. Henderson's personal attention.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, Michigan

TO THE ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE:

NOTICE is hereby given that a Special Election for the purpose of considering the adoption of an Amendment to the Charter of said Village will be held on

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1942

at the polling place in the Municipal Building, 795 Lake Shore Road, in said village.

The polls will be open from 8:00 o'clock A. M. to 8:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern War Time on said day.

The purpose and object of such special election are to determine whether or not a proposed amendment to the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores adding a new Chapter XI providing for Employees' Retirement System, as approved by the Village Council on November 9, 1942, be adopted, in the words and figures as follows:

Chapter XI, EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Section 1. NAME AND DATE OF ESTABLISHMENT—A Retirement System for the employees of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, hereinafter referred to as the Retirement System, is hereby established for the purpose of providing retirement allowances for the employees of the Village. The effective date of this Amendment shall be the first day of January, 1943. The fiscal year of the Retirement System shall coincide with the fiscal year of the Village, as provided in Chapter VI, A, Section 1, of this Charter.

Section 2. ADMINISTRATION OF RETIREMENT SYSTEM—There is hereby created a Retirement Commission, hereinafter referred to as the Commission, in whom is vested the general administration, management and responsibility for the proper operation of the Retirement System and for making effective the provisions of this Charter Amendment. The Commission shall be organized immediately after four Commissioners, provided for in Section 3 hereof, have qualified and taken the oath of office.

Section 3. COMMISSION PERSONNEL—The Commission shall consist of five Commissioners, as follows:

(a) Two electors of the Village to be appointed by the Village Council upon nomination by the President of the Village.

(b) The Village President, ex-officio, who shall be Chairman of the Commission.

(c) Two members of the Retirement System to be elected by the membership of the Retirement System under such rules and regulations as the Commission may adopt.

Section 4. TERM OF OFFICE OF COMMISSIONERS—At the first election held, the President shall appoint two members of the Retirement System to serve as Commissioners and shall be elected and have qualified. The Commission so constituted shall order and arrange for an election by the employees, to be held within thirty days from the effective date of this Amendment. The regular term of office for such appointive and elective Commissioners shall be two years. At the first election, the member Commissioner with the greater number of votes shall serve two years; and the member Commissioner with the lesser number of votes shall serve one year.

Section 5. VACANCY ON COMMISSION—If a vacancy occurs in the office of Commissioner through death, inability to serve, dismissal from service, or for other reasons, the vacancy shall be filled within sixty days after the date of the vacancy, for the unexpired term, in the same manner as the one who was previously filled.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION—(a) Each Commissioner shall qualify for office and file a bond as provided by Chapter III, Subdivision D of the Charter of this Village.

(b) The Commission shall elect from its members a Vice-Chairman, and shall appoint a Secretary who need not be a member of the Commission. The Treasurer of the Village shall be Commissioner and the Treasurer of the Retirement System shall be a member of the Commission. It shall adopt its own rules and procedure and shall keep a record of its proceedings. The Commission shall hold special and regular meetings at such times as it shall deem necessary.

(c) Four members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum, and at least three concurring votes shall be necessary for a decision by the Commissioners at any meeting of the Commission.

(d) The members of the Commission shall serve without compensation for their services as members. The Commission may be compensated for such legal, actuarial, medical, and other services as shall be required, and compensation for such services shall be fixed by the Commission, subject to the approval of the Council.

(e) The Commission shall adopt mortality, service expense, compensation experience and other rates which may be necessary.

(f) The Commission shall keep, or cause to be kept, such data as shall be necessary for an accurate valuation of the various funds of the Retirement System. The Commission shall render a written report to the Council on or before the 15th day of May each year showing the fiscal transactions of the Retirement System for the year ending the preceding thirty-first day of March.

Section 7. DEFINITIONS—The following words and phrases as used in this amendment unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context shall have the following meaning:

(a) "Employee" shall mean any regular or permanent officer, agent, servant or employee of the Village, whose services are compensated on a regular basis. However, it shall not include elective officials of the Village; nor shall it include any employee whose compensation averages less than five hundred dollars per year in any three-year period. In all cases of doubt the Commission shall decide who is an employee within the meaning of this Amendment.

(b) "Member" shall mean each and every person who is an employee within the above definition, on and after the effective date of this Amendment.

(c) "Village" shall mean the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, State of Michigan.

(d) "Council" shall mean the Village Council of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores.

(e) "Service" shall mean service rendered as an employee of the Village and paid for by the Village.

(f) "Favor Service" shall mean service rendered prior to the effective date of this Amendment.

(g) "Prior Service Pension"—A prior service pension equal to two-one hundred thirty-fifths (2/135) of his average final compensation for each year of prior service credited to his service account; provided that if the membership service when added to the prior service exceeds thirty (30) years, then the membership service shall be reduced so that the total of membership service and prior service is not greater than thirty (30) years; provided further, that the total pension portions provided by the Village in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this Section shall not exceed twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

(h) "Minimum retirement allowance payable to any member who retires from service at age sixty-five years or over, with twenty or more years of prior service to his credit shall be twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

(i) To be eligible to receive the pension portions provided by the Village in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Section, a member without prior service credit must have at least ten years of membership service credit.

(j) If a member is receiving benefits under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation, or similar law, at the time of his retirement, then during the period he is receiving such benefits after his retirement, the pension portions provided by the Village in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this Section shall be reduced by the amount of such Workmen's Compensation benefits.

Section 10. OPTIONAL RETIREMENT ALLOWANCES—Until the first payment on account of any benefits becomes normally due, a member may elect to receive his benefit in a retirement allowance payable throughout life; or he may elect to receive the actuarial equivalent of that benefit. If a member elects a reduced retirement allowance payable throughout life in accordance with Options I, II and III as hereinafter provided, if a member dies within thirty days after his retirement becomes effective, an option election shall be effective; such a member shall be considered in service of the Village at his death and his accumulated contribution shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of Section 16 hereof.

Option I. CASH REFUND ANNUITY—If a member dies before he has received in payment of the annuity portion of his retirement allowance, the present value of the annuity portion of his retirement allowance as it was at the time of his retirement, the balance shall be paid in a single sum to such person or persons as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission, or if there be no such designated person or persons, then to his legal representatives; or

Option II. JOINT AND LAST SURVIVORSHIP ANNUITY—If a member dies, his reduced retirement allowance will be continued throughout the life of an individual named by him, or if there be no such designated person or persons, then to his legal representatives; or

Option III. JOINT AND LAST SURVIVORSHIP ANNUITY—If a member dies, his reduced retirement allowance will be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission at the time of his retirement; or

Section 11. ANNUITY SAVINGS FUND—(a) The Annuity Savings Fund shall be a fund in which shall be accumulated all regular interest, contributions from the membership of members to provide for their annuities and from which shall be paid all annuities, refunds of accumulated contributions, and all benefits in lieu of annuities.

(b) **MEMBERS' CONTRIBUTIONS**—The contributions of a member to the Annuity Savings Fund shall be five (5) per cent of his gross salary.

(c) **MEMBERS' CONTRIBUTIONS DEDUCTED FROM PAYROLLS**—The Treasurer of the Village shall cause the members' contributions to be deducted from the pay of each member on or before the 15th day of each month of every payroll period, so long as he shall remain a member. The contribution provided for herein shall be made, notwithstanding the fact that the member may be on leave of absence, or that his salary may be reduced, or that his pay may be suspended, or that he may be on a reduced salary or compensation, and payment of his salary or compensation shall not constitute discharge and acquittance of all claims and demands whatsoever for services rendered by such person during such pay period, except as to the deduction of his contributions from the pay of such member. The Village Treasurer shall certify to the Commission, on each payroll, the amount of contributions deducted from the pay of each member and each of said amounts shall be paid into the said Annuity Savings Fund and shall be credited to the individual account of each member from whose contribution said deduction was made.

(d) **RE-PAyment OF CONTRIBUTIONS PREVIOUSLY REFUNDED**—In addition to the contribution deducted from the pay of a member, if the member has previously received a refund of his contributions, he may have previously withdrawn therefrom as provided in this Retirement System.

Section 12. REFUND OF MEMBERS' CONTRIBUTIONS—(a) Should a member cease to be an employee before attaining the age of sixty years, he shall be paid all or part of the accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund, with regular interest thereon credited to the thirty-first day of March preceding the date his name last appeared on the payroll, as he shall demand in writing on forms furnished by the Commission.

(b) **DEATH OF A MEMBER**—Should a member die before his retirement allowance becomes effective, the amount of the accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund, at the time of his death, shall be paid to the person or persons named in the option election, or if there be no such designated person or persons, then to his legal representative.

(c) **WITHHOLDING CONTRIBUTIONS**—The Commission may, in its discretion, withhold for not more than three years after a member has ceased to be an employee, payment of all or part of his contributions.

Section 13. SOLVENCY OF ANNUITY SAVINGS FUND—If at the end of any fiscal year the value of the assets of the Annuity Savings Fund be less than one hundred per cent of the accumulated reserves for the payment of all pensions and therefrom then the annuities payable during the ensuing fiscal year shall be pro-rated according to the solvency percent of the said fund.

Section 14. EXPENSE FUND—The Expense Fund shall be a fund in which shall be credited all money provided by the Village to pay the administration expense of the Retirement System and from which shall be paid all expenses necessary in connection with the administration and operation of the Retirement System. The Commission shall certify annually and the Village shall pay into the Expense Fund the amounts of money required to pay the administration and operation expenses of the Retirement System.

Section 15. PENSION ACCUMULATION FUND—(a) The Pension Accumulation Fund shall be the fund in which shall be accumulated reserves for the payment of all pensions and other benefits payable from the contributions made by the Village and from the contributions made by members, and other benefits in lieu thereof, to members as provided in this Amendment.

(b) Upon the basis of such mortality table, member interest, and other tables, as the Commission shall adopt, the Actuary shall compute annually, as such each member's required contribution to the Pension Accumulation Fund, as provided in the provisions of this Amendment. The pension reserve liabilities, as computed, shall be amortized by making regular interest, over a period of years to be determined by the Commission, subject to the approval of the Village Council; provided that such period of amortization shall not exceed the life expectancy of the members as determined by the Actuary. The Commission shall certify annually to the Village the amount of the Pension Accumulation Fund. The Village shall pay into the Pension Accumulation Fund the amortization payment so determined. Provided, however, that anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, the Commission shall never certify and the Village shall never be required to pay into the Pension Accumulation Fund, in any year, a sum larger than the sum which will equal fifteen percent (15%) of the aggregate pay, salary, or compensation received by members during the preceding fiscal year.

(c) If, at the end of any fiscal year, the amount of the assets of the Retirement System credited to the Pension Accumulation Fund, together with the present value of the Village's future contributions, be less than one hundred per cent (100%) of the present value of the benefits payable or to be payable from the Pension Accumulation Fund, then the pension, or other benefits in lieu of pension, payable from the said Fund, shall be pro-rated during the ensuing fiscal year, according to the solvency percent so determined.

Section 16. PAYMENT OF FUNDS—(a) All moneys accruing to the various funds of this Retirement System shall be collected by the Village Treasurer, and shall be deposited by him in the name of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, Michigan, in a separate fund, or in a separate banking institution as shall be designated by the Council as a depository for the funds of the Retirement System, and the Treasurer and such institution shall furnish security for such funds as the Council may require.

(b) **WARRANTS**—No money shall be drawn from the Retirement System Fund except upon the warrant of the Village Treasurer, countersigned by the Chairman of the Retirement Commission or such other person as may be duly authorized by the Council. No warrants shall be issued until they shall have been first authorized by the Council.

(c) **COMMISSION TO FURNISH LISTS**—The Commission shall cause its Secretary or other person to be designated to prepare a list or lists, each month, of all salaries, pensions and demands payable out of the Retirement System Fund during the current month, and such lists shall be the same to the Village Treasurer at least three days before the first Monday of each month. Such list or lists shall contain such information as may be required by the Village Treasurer, and its correctness shall be certified by the Commission to the Commission on such information as may be delivered by the Commission. The Village Treasurer shall audit the information contained on such list, and shall present the same to the Council which shall cause the issuance of such warrants on the Retirement System funds in payment of such items, as shall be approved by it.

(d) Moneys belonging the Retirement System Fund shall be invested and re-invested by the Council upon the recommendation of the Commission in such stocks, bonds, obligations or other securities as may from time to time be legal for the investment of Village moneys consisting any sinking fund of the Village as provided in Chapter VI, Section 12 of the Charter of the Village, or as may be legal for the investment of Village funds by virtue of the statutes of the State of Michigan.

(e) The Council shall have full power to hold, sell, purchase, assign, transfer and dispose of any securities or investments of the Commission, any of the securities and investments in which any of the funds created herein shall have been invested as well as the proceeds of said investments, and any moneys belonging to said funds.

(f) Subject to the approval of the Council, the Commission annually shall allow regular interest on the average amount of assets in each of the funds for the preceding year. The amount so allowed shall be credited to the Pension Accumulation Fund and shall be credited thereto annually by the Village Treasurer from interest and other earnings on the moneys of the Retirement System, or by additional amount received to meet the regular interest on the funds of the Retirement System shall be paid by the Village and any excess of earnings shall be paid to the Council which shall be credited to the Pension Accumulation Fund.

Section 17. ASSIGNMENTS PROHIBITED—The right of a person to a pension, an annuity, or a retirement allowance, or return of contributions, the pension, annuity, or retirement allowance itself, any special benefit, any other right accrued or accruing to any person under the provisions of this Retirement System and the moneys in the Pension Accumulation Fund of this Retirement System shall be assignable and shall not be subject to execution, garnishment, attachment, or operation of bankruptcy or insolvency law, or any other process of law whatsoever, and shall be exempt except as specifically provided in this Retirement System.

Section 18. ERRORS—Should any error or error in the records result to the detriment of any beneficiary receiving from the Retirement System more or less than he would have been entitled to receive had the records been correct, the Commission shall correct such error, and as far as practicable, shall adjust the payment in such a manner that the actuarial equivalent of the benefit to which such member or beneficiary was correctly entitled shall be paid.

Section 19. LIMITATION OF OTHER STATUTES—Should any employee of the Village be required by law now enacted or which may be enacted, or any amendments or rulings in connection therewith having the force of law, to accept coverage under any Federal or State annuity, pension, retirement, or old age security system; and should the Village or such employee be required to make contributions to or be subject to payroll or other taxes in support or partial support of such annuity, pension, retirement, or old age security system; then the amount of the contributions to the Village and the members to the Retirement System created by this Charter Amendment shall be reduced to the extent of the contributions required by such Federal or State system; and the pension portion of the retirement allowance of such member shall be reduced by the amount of such annuity, pension, allowance or other benefit received by the member from such Federal or State annuity, pension, retirement, or old age security system.

Section 20. AD-AM PROVISIONS OF LAW INCONSISTENT with the provisions of this Amendment are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

(b) If any part, article, chapter, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Amendment is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or in violation of any law, the validity of the remaining parts, articles, chapters, sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Amendment, or the Amendment as a whole, shall not be affected.
