**Parking Plot Big Success**

**Records Kept by Supervisor Show Residents of All Points Using It**

The Park's parking plot has been a success from the day it opened. Lee Hunter, the supervisor, has been keeping a record of the cars using the different Pointe municipalities represented.

At a meeting of the Park Commissioners Monday night in a discussion of the parking plot matter, President Goddard stated the Pointe area of the OCD was giving attention to the matter of working out a fair apportionment of the parking plot costs with the view of having each of the five municipalities assume its own share.

Supervisor Hunter's tally show that white cars from the Park and the City predominated in the first few days the plot was opened, this had leveled off. On Monday the count showed Park, 15; City, 14; Farms, 13; Shores, 12; and Woods, 13.

The Park authorities are willing that everyone be permitted to park their cars on the plot as long as there is room. When the time comes that the plot is filled to its utmost capacity it will be necessary to give preference to citizens who must leave their cars there when going on into Detroit as the plot was planned as an aid to saving rubber and gas rather than as a mere convenience for short time parking by persons driving in the neighborhood.

opening, however, it has been necessary to have four persons constantly on hand with a fifth during certain hours. With the subsidence of the holiday rush, however, it is believed two or three persons could maintain the office efficiently.

**Chief Makes Statement**

Norbert P. Neff, Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe, who has taken the leadership in the work of arranging for the local office, prepared a statement appraising the people of Grosse Pointe area of the location and functions of the office. He had 2,500 of these district bulletins throughout the Pointe, which included one to every store and business.

Chief Neff's circular read as follows:

To the Residents in The Grosse Pointe Area:

The Mayor and Council of the City of Grosse Pointe, recognizing the acute need of adequate postal facilities in the Grosse Pointe Area, have made it possible for the United States Postal Authorities to make at least temporary provision for a so-called "Christmas" Postoffice in the City owned building at 17410 Maumee, between Neff and St. Clair streets from the First and Police Station, as per the following official postoffice announcement:

On December 15, a temporary postoffice station will be established at 17410 Maumee Avenue for acceptance of Holiday Greeting Cards, parcel post packages, including insured and C.O.D. parcels and for the sale of stamps.

This station is for the Grosse Pointe Area and will remain open until December 24, 1942, in honor of the people of the Grosse Pointe.

Greeting cards presented at the postoffice or deposited in the street letter boxes should be stamped under a facing slip of identification. This will eliminate two handlings in the postoffice and saves much time and labor. The scheduled hours are planned as follows:

Daily, 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.  
Sunday, Dec. 13, 1942, 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.

(There will be no money orders, registered mail, postal savings or bond facilities or service available at this station. Apply for the same at Kercheval-Mari-borough Station).

The city government is pleased to be able to cooperate in the emergency and hopes that its action and the helpful cooperation manifested by the Postoffice Authorities will prove to be of great benefit to the entire community.

**Police Are Proud of Shell-Loader**

The Park police are mighty proud of their new shell-loading machine, which was recently purchased to reload shells for target practice.

The handyman of the department, Sgt. David Logan, has been appointed chief "bullet maker" and he seems to be going to town with the device. Sergeant Logan pointed out that the empty shell cases are saved and the lead is reclaimed from the target range, which is located on the third floor of the municipal building.

The empty cases are placed in the machine which punches out the old firing cap and inserts a new one. The shell is then placed under the powder hopper and just the right amount is dropped into it. Next, a lead

slug is put in the shell and forced into place by the machine. The lead slug are made in a special mold which turns out four at a time. The slugs are also given a coat of grease before they are inserted in the shell. Approximately 800 shells an hour can be loaded by the machine.

## Tips From Torch

- Breakfast: Shredded Apples, Skinned Raisins, Coffee
- Luncheon: Eggplant Sandwiches, Asparagus Vinaigrette Salad, Tea
- Dinner: Meat Loaf Scandinavian, Brussels Sprouts, Diced Carrots, Hearts of Romanine, Fresh Fruit, Coffee
- Baked Apples

RECIPES  
Select best, good-looking baking apples. Wash and remove core. Place in a deep baking pan. In the center of each apple place 1 or 2 tablespoons brown or granulated sugar and 1 teaspoon butter. Pour 1 cup of water around apples and bake covered in moderate oven (375 degrees) about 45 minutes.

Eggplant Sandwiches  
Sliced eggplant in thin slices and submerge in cold water to which has been added a scant teaspoon of salt. Let soak for one-half hour. Lift eggplant from water and dry on towel. Then dip eggplant in beaten egg and roll in cracker crumbs. Sauté in butter (if you can get it) until brown drain on brown paper. Now place a slice of tomato on each sautéed slice of eggplant.

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 2 hard boiled eggs (chopped)
- 1 medium onion (chopped)
- 3 thin slices Swiss or Gruyere cheese
- 1 tomato (sliced thin)
- 1 egg
- Method: Mix ground beef, eggs and enough bread to hold meat together. Then add 1 can of tomato sauce, 1 egg over meat, now a 1/2 slice of onion. Over this the hamme and cheese. Top layer of sliced tomato and pepper to taste. Roll in you would a jelly roll. Bake in heavy skillet and brown by in 2 tablespoons of butter. Add 1 can of tomato sauce and cook in a slow oven (300 degrees) about 45 minutes. Slice or serve.

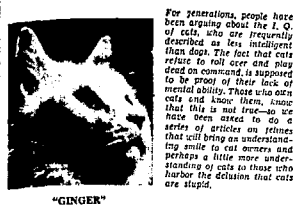

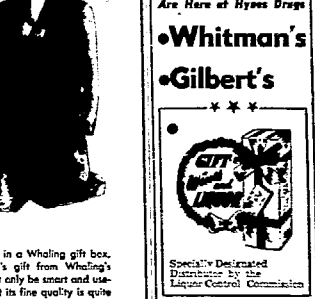

#### ELECTION PRECINCT NUMBER 22

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods being bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Mack Avenue and the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence north along the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as extended; thence north along the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as extended to the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence east along the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence north along the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the place of beginning.

#### ELECTION PRECINCT NUMBER 23

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods being bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Mack Avenue and the south line of P. C. 577; thence east along the south line of P. #### ELECTION PRECINCT NUMBER 26

That part of Grosse Pointe Woods being bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods and the south line of P. C. 156; thence west along the south line of P. C. 156 to the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as extended; thence north along the centerline of Charlevoix Avenue as extended to the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence east along the north boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods; thence north along the east boundary line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods to the place of beginning.

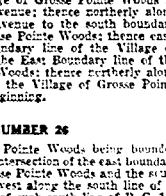

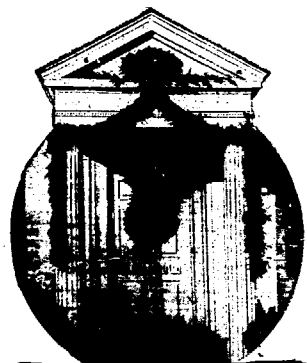

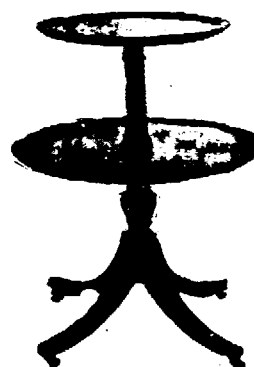
