# WATER BOMBS

## Chilly Homes Provide Much Conversation

Many Families Forced To Contract With Living Into Smaller Quarters

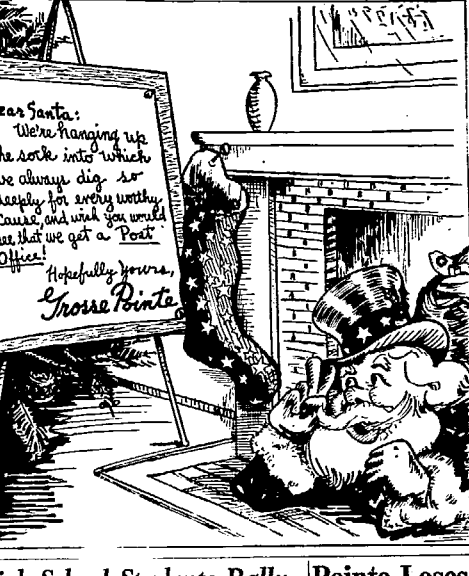
The fuel oil rationing has raised a commotion in the homes of the people of the Grosse Pointe area. In this community there is a greater proportion of the residents who live in condominium residences than in any other section of the state or even of the whole country.

These homes with their roomy reception halls, big living rooms, libraries, sun rooms, great kitchens and numerous auxiliary serving rooms on first floor and the many bedrooms and baths and dressing rooms on the second, all in addition to large spaces set aside for servants quarters, present a heating problem which it has been impossible to solve with the drastically curtailed fuel supply now in force.

**Stories Are Many**

The stories that are about in the community concerning the makeshift arrangements for the winter approximation to comfortable living possible, are many and varied. Most of them are about as strictly "off the wall" as the most fantastic, but nevertheless reflect a general goodwill and good sportsmanship. The servant problem, however, proved an unmitigated calamity. Many semi-freezing families have been forced to contract with living into smaller quarters.

## Pointe's OCD Needs Ignored By Capital

Help Promised After Survey Was Completed In October Has Not Arrived

Almost with the inception of the Civilian Defense work in this area an attempt was made to obtain from the Government a supply of that type of equipment which it had been announced the War department was prepared to furnish CD organizations.

After repeated requests addressed to the War Department Major C. E. Brillhart, Chicago Liaison officer between the OCD and the War Department, came here to the Pointe on October 31 and made what was supposed to be a thorough survey of the area and the preparation for Civilian Defense that had been set up by the community on its own initiative.

**Was Well Impressed**

The Major seemed to be well impressed by what he discovered here in the way of local provisions and made a report to Washington which he has not yet received.

1. That the Five Grosse Pointes and Gratiot township, being largely residential, presents a vulnerable target to enemy bombers and could be expected to suffer heavily in the event of a surprise bombing.

2. That a surprisingly large percentage of war plant executives live in touch with their industries in the event of a bombing.

3. That the OCD is well organized and is functioning as capably as could be expected.

4. That the amount of equipment, but that more equipment should be provided more promptly.

This was an encouraging report and seemed to promise early attention to the Pointe area. The simple fact is, however, that this was the last gesture of help for the region that has come from the office of the local OCD.

On inquiry Monday it was learned that the report had not been forwarded to Washington.

## OCU Urges Special Caution in Holidays

George Elworthy, local coordinator of the OCD, has issued the following statement in connection with the danger of enemy action during the holiday season:

"Because of the enemy's known proclivities to strike on holidays or when vigilance is relaxed, the Grosse Pointe Office of Civilian Defense is asking all departments of the local OCD organization to be particularly vigilant and prepared for action throughout the holiday season.

There are no present indications that an attack is afoot, but this action is recommended for preparedness and as a precautionary method."

**Farms Council Asks for P. O.**

Trustees of Village Lent Enthusiastic Support To Get Permanent Relief

The Village Council of the Farms at the meeting Monday night adopted strong resolutions calling upon the Postmaster General to give the United States to establish post office facilities in Grosse Pointe.

The trustees to similar action already taken or about to be by the other Pointe communities. The trustees are all in full agreement as to the utmost lack of postal facilities in this important area and the justice of their claim, and they are favorable endorsement by the Federal authorities. The resolution, adopted unanimously, and their action in using voice was as follows:

**The Resolution**

WHEREAS, The Grosse Pointe communities, representing a population of approximately 35,000, have been for some time past with inadequate post office facilities and service;

AND WHEREAS, The post office now serving said communities is a branch of the Detroit post office and located at the far end of the area and serves a large east side population of Detroit; and

WHEREAS, During ordinary business seasons of the year the accommodations of said east side Detroit post office are grossly over-taxed by the demands of residents of Detroit that the reasonable requirements of the residents of the Grosse Pointe communities cannot be properly served and they are forced to submit to unreasonable delay and great inconvenience; and

WHEREAS, There are now available sufficient unoccupied space in commercial buildings in the Grosse Pointe area conveniently located to take care of the postal demands of the community which can be obtained by the Government for the establishment of a Grosse Pointe post office station, and which can be served by post office facilities at a comparative nominal cost and without the use of materials essential to the war effort;

RESOLVED, That the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms, one of the municipalities in the Grosse Pointe communities, with a population of approximately 6,500, be authorized to request the Postmaster General of the United States to be prepared to assist in the purchase of land and to be prepared to assist in the construction of the reasonable demands and requirements of the Grosse Pointe communities for additional and separate post office facilities so as to reduce the people of said communities from the inconveniences and hardships in which they are subjected when called upon to use the Federal postal service.

## Uniform Traffic Ordinance Tabled

The attempt to make uniform and codified traffic laws for the whole Grosse Pointe area which originated in the Park a year or more ago, still runs its weary course.

An ordinance covering the subject has been prepared for many months, but each municipality to which it has been submitted in turn seems to require time and more one in which to consider it. This was the disposition of the ordinance met at the Farms meeting Monday night. The police requested more time for its proper disapproval. Without the matter being tabled.

A uniform traffic law for the Pointe is urgently needed. It will be a contribution of the police to the safety of the area, and it will possess the advantage of being predigestible matter.

## High School Students Rally To Rescue of Ration Board; Finish Big 'Tailoring' Job

Seniors Pitch in and Complete Task of Preparing Fuel Oil Books for Pointe Consumers; Turnout Is Almost Unanimous

The boys and girls of the senior class at the Grosse Pointe high school have come to the rescue of the Rationing Board in getting out the fuel oil rationing cards.

The Board was deeply concerned with the problem of preparing the rationing cards for more than 2,500 books totaling more than 2,500. ## Pointe Loses Emory L. Ford

Heart Attack Proves Fatal to Head of One of Area's Most Prominent Families

The death of Emory Leyden Ford of Grosse Pointe Shores removes from the Detroit area one of its most outstanding citizens and the surviving head of one of the most prominent and oldest families in Southeastern Michigan.

Mr. Ford died on Sunday in Jennings Hospital following a short illness which succeeded a heart attack a few days ago. He was 62 years old. He was the president of the Michigan Alkali company, a concern which had been founded by his grandfather, the late John S. Ford, Mr. Ford had spent practically all his active business life since his graduation from Princeton, in 1896, in the service of this organization.

During his career with this company he had been successively chairman, purchasing agent, secretary-treasurer, vice-president and finally president in 1939.

He had been prominent for years as a leader in the civic and charitable work of the region. He was one of the founders of the Detroit Community Fund and during the last war was director of shipping for the American Red Cross.

His club affiliations included the Yonkotege, the Detroit Club, the County Club of Detroit, the University Club and the Detroit Boat Club.

He was survived by a son, Emory Meran Ford; a grandson, Thomas Evans Ford, and three sisters, Mrs. Elmer D. Speck, Mrs. Harry M. Torey and Mrs. Joseph B. Schlottman, all of Grosse Pointe.

The funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the family home, 485 Lake Shore, Grosse Pointe Shores, burial was in Elmwood cemetery.

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## Son of Pointe Woman Escapes in Air Crash

Mrs. Clarence E. Reichelt of Grosse Pointe Park, who was flying to Tampa, Kansas, to visit her son, Sergt. Harold Clements of the 48th Central Postal Directory, escaped in the crash of a four-motored bomber near St. Louis.

Sergent Clements was in the tail of the plane with another member of the crew when it crashed a few minutes after leaving the airport. The impact shared off the section with the rest of the plane, which burst into flame. Clements' companion and the seven other members of the crew were killed.

## Firemen Battle Stubborn Blaze

Fire destroyed the roof and caused considerable damage to a two family brick house at 1538 Somerset Sunday afternoon. The fire was started on the roof by sparks from a dirty chimney and had burned through the attic before the alarm was turned in.

When firemen arrived the blaze had reached the second floor and flames were thirty feet high. It took five hours to bring the fire under control.

The City Directory lists the occupants as Mrs. Sallie T. Broderick and Mrs. Rose Laurie Downstarr. The building is owned by Dr. Walter Ford, 626 Mt. Court, Dearborn.

## Uncle Sam Is Apologetic; But Mail Must Go Through

William Hoffman, aged 16, of 2021 Stratford, Detroit, driving a U. S. Army Chevrolet truck, went blank temporarily as a mail delivery truck in the distribution of Christmas mail, backed up his truck at Elbow and Jefferson corners to help in the rush of Christmas mail delivery.

The police decided on the "judger" pass on the somewhat complicated issue of the relative importance of getting Uncle Sam's mail through on Christmas, mail schedule and the elasticity of Village, County and State laws and ordinances made and provided appointing to minors, reckless driving, picking up letters and what will you.

## Report Gives Little Hope For Reduced Water Rate

Village Engineer Smith submitted an interesting and exhaustive report on the operations of the water service during the meeting of the Village Council Monday night.

Following a query that had been made at the meeting, the report said that the outside consumption and 45% cost part as to the priority of reducing the water rates in the Village. The informed Council that the average annual income from the water service for the last two years had been \$31,200. Of this sum 43% or \$20,100 had come from "outsider" consumption and 45% or \$56,700 from "inside" consumption or from residents of the Village.

The outside consumption represents water sold wholesale to other communities, at 5c per 1,000 cubic feet. Twelve per cent or \$4,500 came from other sources.

The amount of water sold at expense for the same ten year period was \$76,000, which included not only the operating expenses of the plant but also \$40,000,000 cubic feet of sewage water at a cost to the village of \$11,000 annually. Depreciation and bond interest amounted to \$23,000 a year.

The resulting net revenue from the Village's water service was \$3,500 annually.

An interesting disclosure of the report was the wide variance in the amount of water sold in dry and wet seasons when the outdoors use much or little water for lawn sprinkling and other purposes. The variation between the high and low years amounts to as much as 20,000,000 cubic feet.

Due to the uncertainty as to the cost of the load on the water pumping plant and the impossibility of figuring the cost of future labor and supply bills, Mr. Smith thought it unadvisable to figure at this time an reduction in water rates.

## Woods Youth Confesses to Paint Store Robbery

Detroit police last week apprehended Marvin Horn, 23, of 1335 Ania avenue, Grosse Pointe Woods, in connection with a robbery of a paint store in Detroit.

Horn confessed to the robbery of the Mackall Paint and Supply Company, 1724 Mack, on November 21, in which he had taken about \$100 from the cash register. He will be prosecuted in Detroit.

Friday night the Devils traveled to Fordson for their first league game and were handed their second defeat of the season 22-17. Saturday proved to be a different matter and the Pointers waltzed to an easy victory over Roseville 42-16.

At Fordson the Devils played almost flawless basketball in the first two quarters, but they slumped badly in the last half in which they could gather but four points while Fordson picked up 12 points, enough to put the game on ice.

Work Like Machines Working like a machine and setting up their plays, the Devils ran roughshod over a gallant but thoroughly outplayed Roseville team. Displaying crisp passing and nice work off the backboard the Pointers scored more points in the first half than in the entire game at Fordson and nearly as

many in the second quarter against Fordson. They picked up 15 points in the big second quarter.

Every player on the bench saw action as Grosse Pointe piled up the points. The Devils don't play again until January 8 when they meet Mt. Clemens in quest of their first league victory.

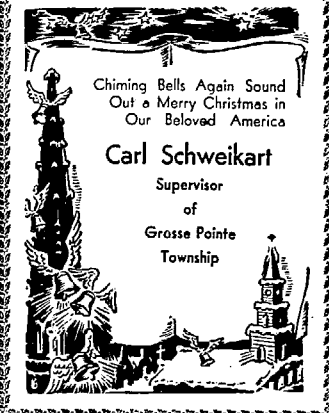

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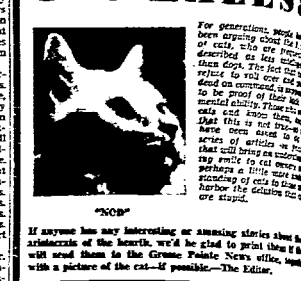
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## CAT TALES

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#### FOR THE HOLIDAYS

##### Fillet of Fish with White Wine

Two 1/2 lb. fillet of haddock or cod, 2 allspice berries, 1 cup white wine, 3 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 egg yolk, slightly beaten, Salt, pepper. Put the onions and seasonings in a fat dish, then the fillets. Barely cover with cold water and the wine. Let soak for at least 2 hours. Then put on the stove and let simmer—not boil—until the fish is tender, about 15 minutes. Skirt the butter, add the flour, and enough of the fish liquor to make about 1/2 cup of sauce. Season to taste with salt and pepper and add more wine if you wish. Just before taking off the stove, stir in the egg yolk rapidly. Over the drained fish, and brown under the broiler. 4-6 servings.

##### Kidners with Red Wine

Ten lamb or veal kidneys, 2 carrots, diced, 2 good sized onions coarsely chopped, 2 stalks celery, diced, 2 big tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 cup consommé or bouillon, 1 cup red wine, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour.

Cook the onions in the butter until tender, add the flour and when a good brown, add the carrots, celery, parsley, bouillon and about half the wine. When they begin to be tender, add the kidneys (washed, sliced and with three removed). When almost done, add the rest of the wine. Serve, as soon as kidneys are done, with brown rice. Serves 4 generously.

##### Wartime Cake

Two cups brown sugar, 2 cups hot water, 2 tablespoons lard, 1/2 pk. seedless raisins (cut open), Salt, cloves, cinnamon, 1 tablespoon cocoa. Beat these ingredients for five minutes after they begin to bubble. When cold, add 1/2 tablespoon of soda, dissolved in 1 teaspoonful of hot water. Add 3 cups of ordinary flour (sifted). Bake in 2 loaves in a slow oven for about 45 minutes.

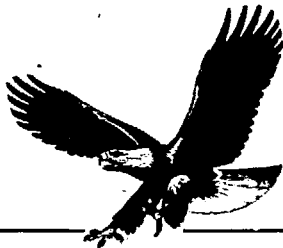
