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Survivor of Army Air Crash Visiting Parents in Pointe

Sergeant Harwell Clements Thrown Clear When Ship Hit Farmhouse Outside of St. Louis December 16

Aerial Gunner Sergeant Harwell J. Clements, survivor of the tragic Army plane crash which killed seven Corps soldiers shortly after their ship left Lambert field, St. Louis, the night of Tuesday, December 16, is back home in the Pointe enjoying a well-earned furlough.

Sergeant Clements is visiting his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence E. Ratcliffe, of 11717 road. He arrived Monday and leaves next Sunday to report for duty in Tokyo, Kan. Army regulations make it impossible for Clements to say much about the crash.

Here is Flaps's Tell: The Sergeant and his second mate were in the tail of the plane when it crashed into a farm house, creating a flaming inferno. Clements pulled his seatmate, Robert Randall of Galveston, Tex., through the window and, undoubtedly saving his life. Randall's back was broken, but when Clements visited him in the hospital in St. Louis a week after the crash, he recovered well on the road to recovery.

After removing Randall, Clements obtained a fire extinguisher and tried to get to the cockpit in the main part of the ship. The cabin was a mass of ages and exploding bullets and was driven back.

Sergeant Clements enlisted in the Army last April. He was sent to the Aerial Gunner School at Las Vegas, from where he graduated with high honors last June.

He is what is known as a "all Slinger" in Army Air Corps jargon.

Chief-Stricken Over Loss: Clements is grief stricken over the loss of his crew. "They were the best gang I ever had," he says. "They were perfect in every way."

He has received a letter from the parents of one of the crew members at the time of the crash, Lieut. W. P. McDonald, of Stockton, Calif., asking for details of the tragedy.

School Board Is Confronted By Demand for Pay Boosts

There was a meeting of the Grosse Pointe School Board Monday night in the Board of Education on St. Clair avenue, at which John Mazur, representing the Greater Detroit District Council No. 77 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, appeared to present the demands of the Building, Maintenance employees of the School District.

In answer to a question put by Dr. Paul L. Essert, Superintendent of the School District, Mr. Mazur stated that already 98% of the employees in this category were enrolled in this union.

There were but two demands presented by the union spokesman. These were: 1st. Recognition of this union as the bargaining agent for those employees of the school district who are already enrolled as members, or who may hereafter become members of this union.

2nd. A 25% wage increase for the employees, or a minimum increase of \$400 per year when the 25% of the wages now paid would fall below the \$400 minimum. This increase to be effective as of January 1, 1943.

There was a lengthy discussion on the part of the Board as to the legality of recognizing this union as the sole bargaining agent. This question remained unsettled with the end of the meeting, but Mr. Mazur in clarifying the intent of his demand stated that its purpose was that:

(a) Employees shall be given the right to join any union of their own choosing, and (b) They shall have the right to select their own representative.

A meeting of the School employees who are concerned with this question is to be held on January 13, and speaking for them Mr. Mazur asked that the answer of the school authorities be forthcoming by that date.

Quintet Plans Concert For Boys Entering Army

The "Hobby Springs quintet," a group of musicians who play for their own enjoyment, are arranging to give a concert on February 24 for the benefit of the fund which provides the treats and entertainment for the boys marching away to service. This is the work assumed by the Breakfast Club of the Home Front organization.

The Quintet is strictly a non-commercial organization and it never plays for hire.

Its members are Donald Fairbairn, cellist; Otto Mann, violinist; Mrs. Sylvia Mann, pianist; Edward Klepac, violinist; and Martin Taylor, drummer, violinist.

The concert will be held in the Danvers Junior Musical Studio in the Funch and Judy Building.

These men of British ancestry have always been welcomed at all social functions arranged for all of the allied fighting forces. In some instances they have felt a certain difficulty in accepting the hospitality of American homes. This is doubtless traceable to little differences in social customs and environment.

This has not occurred in all cases by any means as many of these young British officers have had as thoroughly good times here socially as they ever had in the home lands.

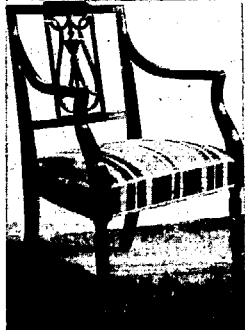

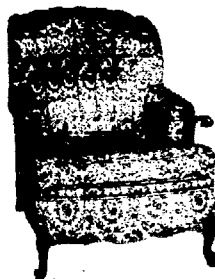

Citrus Fruits in Day's Menu

By BETTY NEWMAN

Our Vitamin "C" needs can be largely taken care of if we see to it that we get a sufficient amount of citrus fruit in our menu—plum, of course, sundine. For a gala meal, start with a tangerine cocktail and serve a two-crust grapefruit-pie for dessert.

This Week's Menu
Tangerine Cocktail
Custard Style Lamb Shoulder
Roasted Potatoes
Canned Green Beans
Montefiore Tomato Salad
Two-Crust Grapefruit Pie
Coffee

Tangerine Cocktail

- 3 grapefruits
4 tangerines
syrup
3 trops candied ginger

Cut grapefruit in halves, remove all pulp, keeping sections as perfect as possible. Scoop out membranes and leave shells plain or cut in scallops with scissors. Peel tangerine sections, pare grove and cut in slices, moisten with a bit of fruit juice, and put several strips of candied ginger in center of each cup. Chill thoroughly before serving. Serves 6.

Custard Style Lamb Shoulder
Have your butcher prepare a custom style shoulder of lamb. It is made by removing bones from a lamb shoulder, leaving a good sized pocket for dressing. Season inside and out with salt and pepper, fill loosely with celery dressing, sew or skewer opening inside and out with uncooked pan, fat side up, and roast without water in moderate oven at 350 degrees F., allowing 25 to 30 minutes per pound.

Celery Dressing

- 1 finely chopped celery
1 tsp. minced onion
1 tsp. parsley
1 tsp. butter
2/3 c. bread crumbs
1/2 tsp. majonaise
1/4 tsp. celery seed
1/2 tsp. salt

Cook celery, onion and parsley in butter for a few minutes, add other ingredients and enough water or soup stock to make dressing slightly moist.

Two-Crust Grapefruit Pie

- 1 recipe plain pastry
2/3 c. grapefruit sections
1/4 c. honey
3/4 trops. flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 trops. butter

Line 8-inch pie pan with one-half the pastry. Mix honey, flour, cinnamon and nutmeg. Place one-half grapefruit sections in pie pan, sprinkle with half honey mixture, repeat, dot with butter, top with remaining pastry. Bake in very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 25 minutes. Serve with topping of: grated cheese, hard sauce, whipped cream, or peanut butter as garnish.
