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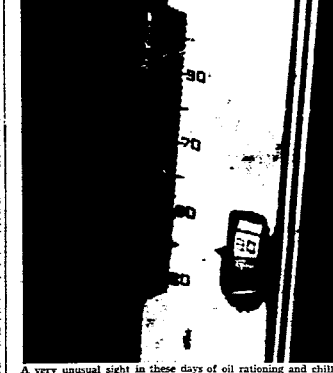
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What's This We See?



A very unusual sight in these days of oil rationing and chilly homes is the thermostat pictured above. The thermostat registers a neat 82, guaranteed to stop all shivers, and the gadget is set high enough to insure that no one will freeze here. Where was this taken? In the Grosse Pointe Park Municipal building, which ought to be about the most popular place in the Pointe these trying days. The building is heated with coal, which hasn't been rationed to date.

Village Manager Lane states that it has been found necessary to set the thermometer at approximately 82 degrees, where it is now located in the Village Clerk's office, to assure a comfortable degree of heat in the Council Chamber, which is occupied every day by Draft Board No. 57 and its employees, and in the Township office.

It has been found by experience that if it is set at normal temperature of 70-72 degrees these offices are not warm enough for comfortable working conditions, and if set at the 65 degrees recommended by the government in its fuel rationing program they would be absolutely untenable.

Moreover the Township rents its quarters from the Park Village and the relationship of landlord and tenant implies an additional obligation on the part of the landlord to heed complaints regarding heat from that quarter.

Park Leaders Given Support

Petitions Being Circulated Requesting Four to Run Again for Office

Three Village Commissioners and a Village Clerk are to be elected at the spring elections in the Park this year and petitions are already in circulation requesting Commissioners Kenneth W. Cunningham, Arthur P. Johnson and Archie Dannan to run again to succeed themselves.

There is also a petition in circulation asking that Clerk William G. Stumman run again for Village Clerk.

The dates for the registration of candidates are January 16 and 23.

Primary February 5
The primary election is held on February 8 and the election on March 15.

If not more than eight candidates, all told, are filed, i. e. two for each of the three commissioner offices to be filled and one more candidate for clerk it will not be necessary to hold a primary election. If a ninth name should appear, however, a primary election would have to be held.

The usual cost of the primary election to the Park village is about \$100. Two voting districts are operated; one in the Municipal building and the other in the Defer school. Each of these are manned by an election board which regulates in both the primary and regular elections.

Are Paid by Day
The board members are paid on a per diem basis which largely accounts for the additional expense entailed by a primary election.

Heretofore there have been eight persons on our board and seven on the other, but this year the Commissioners have decided, in the interest of economy, that the work can be done by a board of six in each district.

Organization Of War Clubs Started Here

Mrs. Henry Burritt Is Chairman of Committee Undertaking Important Task

Mrs. Henry Burritt, chairman of the War Club committee of the Citizens Service Corps, has undertaken a task which is not only the initial undertaking of the CSC in this area but one of its most important and exacting jobs.

Her immediate problem is the organization of a large number of Neighborhood or "Little War Clubs. The purpose is to eventually enroll every man and woman and even the well grown youngsters into groups, whence through the medium of the Citizens Service Corps they will be directed into such divisions of civilian war work for which their talents or strength best fit them.

The formation of the "Little War Clubs is the first organized effort, sponsored from Washington, to enroll the civilian population of the nation in total war effort. The work is one of the departments of the Citizens Service Corps of which John J. O'Brien of Grosse Pointe Farms is the chairman.

This work is regarded as so important for the whole country that in neighboring Detroit a special allocation of funds (reported to be \$20,000) has already been set aside from Washington to help defray the expenses of the enrollment. Here in the Grosse Pointe area, Mrs. O'Brien says, it is the intention to make no special fund for funds outside of the point's quota.

The boys were brought to the Neighborhood Club by members of the Red Cross Motor Corps working under the direction of Mrs. R. M. Beale. After they had been taken care of in the check room by the efficient services of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Boy Scout Troop No. 96, they were provided with familiar advertising slogans, and before long every card had been discovered by the hostess assigned to the firm responsible for the slogan. And the music began.

By long experience the Hostess Corps knows that the boys like best is to be introduced to dancing.

School Threat

Only the present biennium unless it is continued many of the 12 school districts which are now governed by the 65 per cent clause stand to lose a considerable sum of money. The effect of this loss will not be felt by the taxpayers throughout the state, however, for the grants will simply be redistributed to other school districts.

"This is not equalizing educational opportunity," said the local superintendent, "but simply an attempt to make more schools out of food ones."

Serious Blow to Poine

"This loss will be a very serious blow to the local schools," continued Dr. Ezzert. "Many school districts in the state where the assessed valuation is low and the tax rate is very low, erroneously assume that financial resources of the school district in Grosse Pointe and districts of similar valuation are relatively unlimited. This is not true.

"The Grosse Pointe School District together with Grosse Pointe Township and the County are governed by the 15 mill tax limitation. The loss of this \$500,000 to the Grosse Pointe School district would take better than one-half mill on our present valuation to replace by local financing.

Diplomas

The second plan which was approved by the Board of Education was that of allowing high school credit for certain educational experiences acquired while in the armed services. 2. Credit will be granted for satisfactory completion of correspondence study completed during the war.

Traffic Deaths Show Big Drop

A fifteen-year record was

established last week when the Accident Prevention Bureau of the Detroit Police Department reported that only 18 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the month of December.

This was the lowest number of traffic deaths for any December since the Police Department began maintaining records in 1927. Traffic fatalities for 1942 totaled 223, as compared with

277 fatalities in 1941 and 242 in 1940. This reduction was accomplished despite the decrease of several complicating factors so far as accident exposure is concerned. While the number of vehicles gradually decreased in Detroit during 1942 because of the national conservation program and the rationing of gasoline, this was partially or totally offset by the substantial increase in industrial employment, the steady growth in Detroit's population, and a sharp upswing in business activity. The number of pedestrians on the streets was increased by hundreds of thousands.
