It provides coffee for breakfast, bouillon for dinner, and a package of lemon juice powder to make lemonade for supper. Ration K also included malted milk tablets, biscuits, a bar of chocolate, and three sticks of chewing gum.

Danaher Co. of which he was president; the Booth Kelly Lumber Company of Eugene, Ore., of which he was also president; the Michigan Coal and Lumber Co. of Grand Rapids.

He was a graduate of Georgetown University and belonged to the following clubs: the Detroit Athletic Club, the Detroit Golf Club, the Lechmere Country Club and the Detroit Country Club.

He is survived by his wife, Anna H., daughter, Mary Elizabeth, and a son, John E., all of whom live in Detroit.

Pointe Flyer Is Honored

Lieut. Edward Maliszewski Awarded Air Medal After Bombing Mission

Lieut. Edward P. Maliszewski of Bedford road has been awarded his third citation within a month, according to an announcement from Army Air Forces headquarters in London.

Lieutenant Maliszewski's latest award was the Air Medal, a decoration for "meritorious achievement while participating in an aerial flight. He has already been given the Purple Heart and Distinguished Flying Cross.

The Pointer's latest venture came when he was co-piloting a Flying Fortress which was returning to England after a bombing mission over Lille, France. He and his comrades fought off 30 Focke-Wulf 190's, shot down at least four of them, and brought their ship home with a badly damaged wing tip, one dead engine and half-frozen controls.

Park Council Meeting Postponed; Lack Quorum

The regular bi weekly meeting of the Park Village commission, which was postponed from Monday (Washington's Birthday) to Tuesday failed of a quorum on account of the absence of three of the six village commissioners.

Commissioner Kenneth Cunningham was out of the city; Commissioner Eritsch was confined to his home by illness; and Commissioner Damman, who had phoned in earlier in the evening that he would be present although a little late, called up a few minutes after eight o'clock and stated he would be unable to attend, because of a business engagement that detained him.

Commissioners Johnson, Van Deusen and Bartram will be given out of the meeting, as was President Goddard. The meeting was postponed until next Monday, March 2.

Teachers to Conduct Free Clinics on Income Taxation

Citizens of Grosse Pointe who are about to enlist in the great American army of income-tax payers were invited today by Superintendent Paul Esert of the schools to attend free clinics on income taxation and the preparation of Federal income-tax returns to be conducted by high school teachers who have volunteered for this patriotic service.

General information to be made available at the clinics will be of value especially to persons who this year will file an income-tax return for the first time and are not familiar with the forms and requirements. Many other Grosse Pointe residents, however, will want to attend the clinics, it is expected, to familiarize themselves with the general information offered.

Three Separate Clinics

Places and dates for the clinics were announced by Superintendent Esert as follows:

1. Peter School (Genevieve and Nottingham), March 1 and 2 at 7:45 p. m.

2. Grosse Pointe High School (Fisher Road and Grosse Pointe Blvd.), March 1 and 2 and 7:45 p. m.

3. DeWitt School (Vernier Road), March 1, 2 and 3 at 7:45 p. m.

The teachers who will explain the "who-what-how-when" of Federal income taxes have volunteered their assistance to the public and to the Government at the suggestion of leading educators and educational organizations. Superintendent Esert said they will have at hand official data supplied by the Bureau of Internal Revenue giving the answers to the common income-tax questions. The Revenue Bureau is the tax-collecting agency of the Treasury Department.

Nothing Personal

It was emphasized by Superintendent Esert that only general information will be given out of the clinics. The teachers, he said, should not be requested to fill out, or assist in filling out, any-

one's return, or to pass on questions of a personal or technical nature. For detailed information required in individual cases, inquiries will be referred to an official publication or to a field representative of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Superintendent Esert said the clinics were intended especially for the benefit of new income-tax payers who incomes of not more than \$3,000. For each person, a simplified form of return has been provided, designated as Form 1058A. Use of this form eliminates all but a very few calculations for the income-tax payer and saves both time and trouble. This form is expected to gain wide popularity this year, particularly among the estimated 8,000,000 Americans whose names will go on the income tax rolls for the first time.

The teachers will explain how the form may be used by both single and married persons, with certain limitations, and demonstrate its advantages from the standpoint of ease of preparation, quick determination of the amount of tax due, and avoidance of detailed calculations.

Plan Is Nationwide

Plans for participation of qualified teachers in this timely program of income-tax education are nationwide and were mapped by leaders in educational fields after consultation with officials of the Treasury Department.

The teachers were appealed to, Superintendent Esert said, because as an educational activity the program fitted well into their own field of interest, and also because teachers as a class have been highly sensitive to the implications of the war and cognizant of what is at stake.

Their response, he added, had been in keeping with the record of teachers generally for readiness and generosity in the performance of sometimes unrequited public service.

Camera Club To Shoot Models

Simultaneous with the announcement of the appointment of Don Thomas as chairman of the Grosse Pointe Camera Club Model Committee, Mr. Thomas invites all of the club members to bring their cameras to meet Tuesday evening's meeting in order that they may photograph the professional models which he will have there.

To test the ability and skill of the members, the models will be blond and brunet, of the fairest sex, and they will bring a large wardrobe of formal, bathing suits, sport clothes, snow and ski suits, etc. It will be a busy evening for the members, for each will have an opportunity to pose the models as they wish and the finished pictures are to be submitted for judging.

Tuesday's meeting is the result of extensive planning by Mr. Thomas who has had much experience with the Seacab Club in a similar capacity. Because of his photographic knowledge, Mr. Thomas has spent much time in obtaining professional models who are photographs.

Mr. E. L. Hewitt, Jr., president of the Club, says that the last meeting of the club indicated that the club's growth promises to pass its former record. Mr. Hewitt is also inviting those who are not members of the club but interested in joining with the group's activities, to call on him personally in connection with the same.

Kind of "offense" committed by groups of boys, during last year, is far too long to here—and some of them are too hard to print ANY MORE. Last week, another appeared on the docket—the "sit-down". All of them on Kercheval avenue, in Patch and Judy block, had placed the glass in their cars, because a car of boys rocks through them, late at night.

After one sheep had had the replaced, they found a hole in a new pane, made by a beam. A lot of fun for the "little kiddies", no doubt—much fun for the store owner, who has a hard time to replace anything that has broken. Nor would it be fun happened to the parents of children—who are to take their training and good habits.

Every community would take the attitude of the Southern and hold parents responsible for the behavior of their children, many law parents might be up enough to take their children to the "sit-down" if they stand it, then if we keep on talking about "being and being" and everybody BUT the parents-for what their children do.

Herewith I present the true facts on January 2nd, 1943, I met Trustee Stratton at the shopping center on Kercheval Avenue. After exchanging mutual greetings Trustee Stratton advised that I was to hear a case on January 6th involving one Edward Kolowice. Trustee Stratton ordered that the violator should be fined \$100.00 and that the "C" ration book be revoked. I replied that we would try the case in an open Court and see what the facts were.

The facts as presented in open Court on January 6th, 1943, are as follows: Edward Kolowice pleaded guilty to speeding fifty miles an hour on Kercheval Ave. at 6:15 A. M. December 28, 1942. No evidence of drinking. The Court rendered the following judgment: \$25.00 fine and VOLUNTARILY surrender the "C" ration book or in the alternative pay a \$200.00 fine. Edward Kolowice chose to pay the \$250.00 fine.

A portion of the Price Fixing Authority to revoke any citizens rationing book. The Federal Government (Office of Price Administration) since last production in rationing matters. Our citizens would be in dire peril if their rationing books could be revoked by a week known Justice upon the order of Trustee Stratton.

At a four man meeting of the Trustees held on January 18, 1943, Trustee Stratton offered his criticism, not in a peaceful manner, but in a vengeful manner, for his failure to drop to the Court his vengeful desire. I believe that Trustee Stratton owes your Honorable body a most humble apology for not informing his colleagues and deceiving them into assisting Trustee Stratton to achieve his personal vengeance and to overcome the ends of Justice.

As Justice of the Peace, I cannot condone Trustee Stratton's actions. It is a Justice's duty to protect the citizens against unwarranted abuse, and for the protection of our citizens, I take this opportunity to inform the electorate of Trustee Stratton's challenge to the proper administration of Justice.

I herewith resign from further participation in Court matters in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms.
