



### C. G. Reserves Impatiently Await Breaking Up of Ice

The Grosse Pointe men who are in the Coast Guard Reserve are all set to resume active duty in river and lake patrol as soon as the ice goes out and navigation resumes.

Flotilla 17-02, (which used to be the old Flotilla No. 72, based at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club) is made up largely of men who live in the Pointe area and are under Commander H. W. Hagenmeyer of Lakeshore, Grosse Pointe Park.

The 52 men in this unit have been undergoing an intensive training all winter in navigation and boat handling and are much better prepared in the technique of their work than they were last summer.

Commander Hagenmeyer says the Flotilla is ready to take up its active duties as they may be designated by the Regular United States Coast Guard under which it operates. The word to go will no doubt come as soon as the ice breaks.

The composition of a Flotilla, as fixed by the United States Coast Guard, is 52 men, to which the local flotilla exactly conforms.

There is a Commander, a Vice Commander, a Junior Commander, a Yeoman, 12 Coxswains and 35 Seaman.

When on active duty the Coast Guard Reserve exercises the same powers and functions as the Regular U. S. C. G. The Reserves are largely recruited from the ranks of the Auxiliary Coast Guard which represented the civilian's part in harbor and river patrol and protection.

The Reserves carried their time each month to the work than the Auxiliaries and more nearly approximate the work of the regulars. There has been a gradual transition from the status of auxiliaries to that of Reserves and the probabilities are that before long the latter will be entirely absorbed by the Reserves.

The serious nature of the Reserve's work is evidenced in their actually taking the place of the regulars in much of the river and lake patrol duties. Their services enable the release of a constantly growing number of the Regular U. S. C. G. for war service, which has already taken many of them into the foreign field.

### Park Remains On War Time

#### Commissioners Pass Resolution Setting Question for Duration

Grosse Pointe Park is definitely committed to retaining Eastern Standard War Time.

At the meeting of the Village Commission last Monday action was taken by the passage of a resolution which settles this question for the duration of the war, or until Congress formally repeals National War Time.

The act recently passed by the Michigan legislature specifically permits individual municipalities to adhere to the time arrangement adopted by Congress if they so elect. The nearness of the Park to Detroit, which has decided to retain Eastern War Time, obviously determined the choice of the Park. It is altogether probable that this committee's interests are so closely tied up with the big city that it would be impractical to have a different time set up.

In the discussion of the matter at the Commission's meeting it developed that its action respecting the Village time only so long as War time remains a national provision. If at the end of the war Congress takes action to re-establish the former Eastern Standard time it will automatically apply here.

This provision is also made clear in the state act passed last month, in reference to municipal action.

Of the \$27,374 which the Village of Grosse Pointe Parks received in 1942 as its share of the Gas and Weight tax the final balance of \$9,492 was reported at the commissioners' meeting last Monday night.

On a query raised by some of the Commissioners as to the prospects for receipts from this tax for the current year, Commissioner Van Deusen stated it was

estimated there would be a falling off in this revenue of approximately 25 per cent in 1943. "Gas rationing, and particularly the wearing out of tires which cannot be replaced, will cut into car driving at an accelerated rate during the present year," he stated.
