WAAC is on Hand Much of the success of the occasion was caused by the presence of Miss Lorraine Rethoret, Grosse Pointe's latest contribution to the Women's Army Auxiliary, and the New Silhouette presentation last week.

Miss Rethoret, whose home is on Neff road, made an inspiring little speech to the boys, wishing them all good luck on their Great Adventure. Miss Rethoret is herself headed for active participation in the war as she leaves Saturday for Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., where she enters training for the WAAC's.

When the special bus pulled out with its freight of young men going to war, Miss Rethoret and a couple of women friends joined the boys and accompanied them to the Michigan Central station. The last recollection of the farewell group left behind at the Neighborhood club was of strains of lively song that trailed behind the bus.

Local Pupils at Michigan Make Outstanding Records

The 33 recommended alumni of Grosse Pointe High School who entered at the University of Michigan as freshmen in September earned outstanding superior marks in their first-semester college work, a report received last week from the University registrar revealed.

Although the group is the largest ever to be recommended by Grosse Pointe High School to the University of Michigan, only twice before have such high marks been achieved by freshmen from Grosse Pointe. In each of these cases the groups were much smaller.

The average of the first semester for the entire group was 1.550 or B. Of the 45.6 per cent above a B, 18.6 per cent were A's and 27.0 per cent B's. Of the other grades 47.8 per cent were C's, 6.7 per cent D's, and no one had a failing mark.

The four scholarship holders are Fred Gallagher, Carter Zelenak, Helen Briggs, and William Meecham. The average of their grades was 53 per cent A's, 25 per cent B's, 15 per cent C's, and no D's or F's.

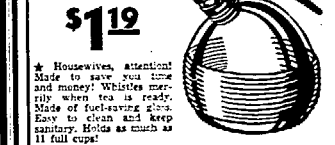

WHEN YOU FLY KITES, PLAY SAFE—THIS WAY

SPRING WEATHER brings out kites, of course. It's fun to fly them—but be sure to see that it's done safely! When the youngsters go out with kites, see that these safety rules are observed for the children's sake!

Fly kites only in the open fields, entirely away from any electric line. This is safer for the kite, too; it doesn't get tangled with wires and lost or broken.

String containing metal (such as Christmas tinsel cord) should not be used. If it should come in contact with an electric line, serious injury might result. Even plain cotton cord conducts electricity when wet, so don't allow kite-flying during a rain.

String that has fallen into puddles should be well dried out before use. Don't use metal frames in kites.

A live wire looks like any other wire. It may not be an electric line, but another wire carrying electricity can charge it by touching it some place that you cannot see. So teach children to stay clear of any wires while flying kites.

Kite flying is fun—and it's safe, when you're careful.

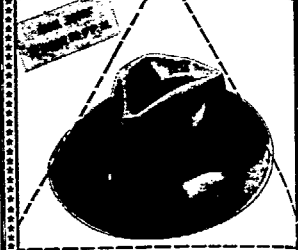
Mary Ann Dewey is Chairman of Event to be Given Service men in Neighborhood Club Saturday Evening

Red Cross Fills Big Need in Life of Wartime Woman

Contributions Make Program Possible

Contributions During Campaign Will Allow Great Organization to Continue Its Wartime Activities Along Home Front

On the Home Front, where food comes by the inch and cents by the yard, the little woman has to be a combination adding-machine, juggler, file clerk and dietitian to serve even a simple lunch for three.

The newly expanded nutrition program of the American Red Cross comes to the rescue with classes in cooking and nutrition work. This is one of the many war-time services of the Red Cross which will be made possible by your contribution to the 1943 War Fund.

50 Per Cent Increase

The War Fund Campaign, which opened on March 1 and closes throughout the month, has set a goal of \$3,000,000 for the County—a 50 per cent increase over last year. As the fund goes the \$1,000,000 mark, the weather indicates fair weather ahead. But from now on, the goal will be attained by dint of per cent plucking from door to door.

First returns from the household canvasses throughout the county indicates that donations are up at least the hoped for 50 per cent and even more. There are the mother and father, for instance, who last year gave \$2, but this year set aside \$25 from their limited budget to be given to the Red Cross War Fund. Their boy, you see, is in the Army and has written back home from England of the many fine things the Red Cross is doing for them.

Way of Saying Thank You

Creamed Fish In Day's Menu

If your adults won't drink milk or your little rations won't serve all the family, giving the grown-ups their daily pint, make a main dish of creamed fish.

- Waxy's Meat
- Creamed Codfish
- Ricet Potatoes
- Squash
- Apple-Celery Salad
- Pecan Muffins
- Coffee
- Creamed Codfish
- 1/2 box salt
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1/2 tsp. Dash salt
- 1 tbsp. butter
- Sprinkling of pepper
- 1/2 cup flour
- Shred codfish and cover with cold water; simmer gently for 5 minutes or so, then drain.
- Melt butter or margarine in saucepan, add flour and milk, gradually add to flour mixture, stirring over low fire and, stirring all the time, let come to low boil and thicken.
- Add codfish, and add a sprinkling of pepper. Taste, and if necessary, add salt. Serves 3 or 4.

- Pecan Muffins
- 2 c. sifted flour
- 1/2 c. broken
- 2/3 tsp. baking powder
- 1 c. milk
- 3 tbsps. sugar
- 1 egg, salt
- 8 tbsps. melted butter

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, sugar and salt, and sift again; add wet mixture. Combine beaten egg and milk and add to flour mixture, stirring only until mixed, but not smooth. Add shortening and blend. Do not beat. Bake in greased muffin pans in moderately hot oven (325 degrees F.) 20 to 30 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

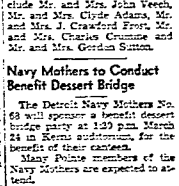

Army and Navy Plan Tests For Students Here April 2

The Army has announced that it is giving an Army College Training Program Test (A-12) along with the Navy College Training Program Test (V-12) Friday, April 2, in the Grosse Pointe High School cafeteria at 8:45 a.m.

This Army test is designed to provide information useful to the Armed Forces in— (a) selecting students for college training under the Army Specialized Training Program, (b) classifying all others in respect to relative trainability.

The purpose of the Army Specialized Training Program is to train men in technical and professional skills required by the Army. Doctors, engineers, psychologists, linguists, physicists, mathematicians, and students of foreign areas are needed in large numbers. The Army has established its program in colleges where such training can best be given.

After an individual has completed the normal twelve weeks of basic military training at an Army Camp and has shown that he is capable of entering the specialized training program, he will be assigned to an Army Specialized Training Unit as an enlisted man on active duty, receiving the pay of a private, to take up a curriculum of study for which he has shown himself qualified.

Students who prefer the Navy program should be notified of their graduation from a secondary school but who are not continuing their education in an accredited college or university.

Sewage Disposal Problem Is Aired

Murray Smith, the Farms executive, disclosed at the Farms Council meeting Monday night that due to the early appearance of pollution in the water this year the village had begun the distribution of the water supply in January instead of April as usual.

This introduced an informal discussion of the sewage disposal question that has been before the Council for some time.

The Farms itself has no disposal problem of its own except incidentally as the village is concerned with preservation of the region east and north of the Farms, largely due to the expansion of war industries.
