School Board Sees Threat to Pay Raise

Doubts Boost Can Be Confirmed Unless State Aid is Forthcoming Again

Whether a 10 per cent cost of living adjustment up to a maximum of \$100 a year for all school employees during the current fiscal year can be continued during the coming budget year of the Board of Education, or whether all available sources of revenue will have to be marshalled in the direction of paying locally what might be lost in state aid in the present session of the Legislature, was the issue in the meeting on Monday evening, March 20.

As announced in January, a cost of living adjustment was made to all employees of the Board of Education, excepting the superintendent. This adjustment was for the salary of each employe which was to be paid to him during the last five and a half months of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1943.

Adjusted to Formula

While this upward adjustment of all employees of the public schools did not exceed for any individual \$125 for the half-year period, it has increased the public school employees in line with the so-called "upward steel price index" since these had been in July 1, 1942 an average increase of salary schedules of about 3 percent, unless the employe had reached his ceiling. In other words, since January 1, 1941, by reason of the cost of living adjustment during the current fiscal year.

Life-Saving Blood Plasma Made Possible by Red Cross

Tonight, while you sleep, a certain cargo is thundering over the nation's vast air-transportation system—a cargo destined to save the lives of American fighting men in Africa, on Guadalcanal and throughout the world. Packed in heavy refrigerated containers are thousands of pints of human blood—the blood of a nation, given by volunteers who are given by volunteers who are given by the American Red Cross.

Newly recognized as the world's greatest medical undertaking, this section of blood plasma by the Red Cross grew from a small effort launched in February, 1941, at the request of the Army and Navy. Within less than two years more than a million pints have been given blood. Total donations are coming in at the rate of approximately 50,000 pints a week.

List of 89 Draftees Sent For Induction by Board 57

One of the target lists of inductees sent out from Board 57 will go to Fort Custer next Wednesday. They had their physical examination at the induction center on March 24 and following a week's turlough will leave for camp.

The number rejected had not been announced when press time arrived, but in addition to these there will be a considerable number of draftees in school who will get a deferment until after graduation which, in the case of the Grosse Pointe High school, will fall on June 11th.

The Home Front committee which has arranged the selection for the boys called from its long experience in similar affairs that rejection for physical, plus the additional number which will be released temporarily because of their school status, will reduce the actual number of departures to about one-half the total list.

Tax Headache Is Discussed

Serambled Bookkeeping Situation Will Puzzle College of C. P. A.'s

There was a long discussion in the Park Commissioners' meeting Monday night which had its start in a consideration of the report of delinquent tax collectors made by the County Treasurer, but really got nowhere.

The County Treasurer acts as the agent of the Village in the collection of its delinquent taxes. This work is done efficiently and probably at a lower cost than would be the case if the Village did it itself.

These taxes as collected by the Treasurer are remitted to the Village and the Township in the ratio of 60% and 40% respectively.

Properties which go to tax sale and where the owners have not availed themselves of the redemption privileges provided by law, pass eventually into the hands of the State Land Office Bureau. They are then sold in what are colloquially known as "scavenger sales" and must be bid for at an initial offer equal to at least 25% of the assessed valuation of the property.

The procedure for the Village bookkeepers in charge of receiving and properly crediting tax receipts comes in in the handling and crediting to the individual taxable units these payments received by the State Land Office.

The moneys received are for taxes levied, often years before, and on properties which have been subject to all sorts of special levies and assessments. The whole picture represents a serambled bookkeeping situation that would defy the composite judgment of a college of C.P.A.'s.

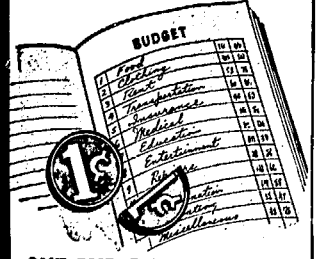

Medical authorities agree that cancer deaths can be reduced if the symptoms are recognized early and prompt treatment is given. This is the work of the Women's Field Army to spread information that "Early Cancer is Curable."

Besides the educational program, the Women's Field Army is supporting a nationally famous research in her research work in cancer at the Wayne Medical Institute. It maintains the Hagedorn Yates Memorial Fund for the early diagnosis and treatment of cancer patients who might otherwise be denied the best of medical care.

A volunteer bandage program has been instituted this year. Many salvaged materials are being put into bandages for indigent patients both in hospitals and at home.
