been drafted and amended three different times and is approved in its final form at the Monday meeting. It is as follows:

RESOLVED, That the policy of the club shall be as follows:

(1) Legal holidays shall include only (a) New Year's, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas (the succeeding day to be observed when any of these falls on a Sunday) and (b) Sundays. Legal holidays shall not be observed in the Police Department, the Fire Department or the Park Department (during the park season) or whenever there is an emergency. Those members of the Police Department who customarily work without regard to Sundays shall also be compensated on days off, and those members of the Police Department who customarily work on Sundays shall be compensated on their regular legal holidays shall be allowed an additional compensating annual vacation period of one annual vacation period.

(2) An annual vacation of two calendar weeks with pay will be allowed to regular employees in the service of the Village for the entire preceding calendar year. A proportionate vacation will be allowed where the service covers only part of the preceding calendar year.

(3) In case of such members of the Fire Department as are governed by Act 125 P.A., 1925, the periods of duty provided for by said Act shall be considered as in lieu of legal holidays and vacations.

(4) Sick leave without deduction in pay shall be allowed from time to time, in amounts equal to three per cent (3%) of the earnings of such employee since January 1, 1933, plus unused sick leave accumulated under prior regulations. Sick leave shall cease to accumulate when an employee has to his credit accumulated sick leave credits equal to 1 month's pay.

(5) Absence without pay and without pay shall be allowed in the discretion of the Village Manager when the employee shall be absent without pay and shall be subject to such disciplinary action as the Village Manager shall deem appropriate. Absence without leave for five (5) consecutive days shall be deemed a resignation.

(6) Employees entering Military Service will, during the absence, be afforded the same honorarium discharge from such Service, be afforded an opportunity to resume their former position in the Village, provided the position has not been abolished and they are then able to perform the duties thereof and in other cases an effort will be made to place them in some other position if there is a vacancy. New employees replacing employees in Military Service shall be advised of the temporary nature of their employment.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That the Village Manager shall adopt such rules and regulations as may be necessary for carrying out the policy herein stated and for the handling of other personnel matters.

A second factor contributing to substantial reduction in expenditures is the reduction of bonded indebtedness from operating expenditures. This has been made possible because the school district is completing payments on the Pierce Junior High School Building in the proposed budget with a balance of only \$20,000 as compared with previous annual installments of \$70,000 over the past four years. Definite reductions are proposed also in operation of plant, in auxiliary activities, in fixed charges and in capital outlay.

Expenditures in other years.

Three, while careful economy has been practiced in estimating expenditures for supplies, heat, water, gas and other services, due recognition of rising cost in these items was allowed for.

Summarizing the policy expressed in the budget for the 1943-44 year, the report of the Superintendent said: "Above all the budget is designed to avoid seriously penalizing the youth of this community in the interest of economy. Further cuts can be made, but only at the expense of risking the quality of education which Grosse Pointe provides for its youth. During this war period, the demands of the nation upon its school systems are even heavier than during peace.

"Youth's training must, of necessity, contribute soundly to the winning of the war. To meet the delocalizations of personnel and of services and at the same time to increase and enrich our contribution to the national effort will demand a fine balance between the pressures of increased cost for and increased demands upon public services."

Other significant facts about this budget are: One, it provides for the first time for scheduling from operating expenditures, losses in interest earnings yielded from sinking fund investments. It is necessary to set aside \$10,000 in 1943-44 and subsequent years to offset depreciation in earnings of sinking fund investments due to decreased rates of interest.

Two, necessary building repairs and alterations have been provided for, since the Board of Education felt that it would be false economy to attempt to save on the upkeep of the plant this year and have to add these necessary
