### Policeman's Request All Warned To Observe Regulations

They are Earl Fields, aged 14, height 5'11"; weight 165 pounds; of 90 Napoleon; Jimmie MacIntosh, aged 16, height 6 feet, weight 135 pounds; of 350 Providence; and George Green, aged 14, height 5'7"; weight 125 pounds; of 72 Napoleon, all as severely entered in the draft in the Farms police department.

When the boys were last seen walking towards Detroit on Tuesday morning, each carried a satchel full of war surplus approved pattern, and patriotically colored respectively red, blue and blue.

From various bits of recent conversation it is believed the boys are headed for either the Navy or Coast Guard. The police officer cynically suggests that the boys will probably be about here any time.

Anybody running across these potential patriots, will relieve a load of parental anxiety if they will promptly report their observations to the Farms police.

### Pointe Again Takes Legal Spotlight; This Time Raid Warden's Injury is Cause

Test Case is Filed to Determine Extent of Government's Liability for Harm Suffered by Volunteers in Line of Duty

Grosse Pointe came into the legal spotlight this week with the filing of a test case to determine the extent to which the Federal Government is liable for injuries suffered in line of duty by a volunteer defense worker.

The case, involving Mrs. Theodora A. Jacob of 1595 Lechmere boulevard, Grosse Pointe Woods, is the first of its kind to be filed in Michigan and probably one of the first in the United States.

Injured on Duty

Mrs. Jacob, an air raid warden, was injured while patrolling the beach in the case of the day-time raid last Feb. 3. She sustained a sprained knee and a stretched cuticle when she fell on the icy sidewalk.

She was treated by a private physician and was obliged to wear crutches for three weeks and to wear an elastic knee pad for approximately a month.

The fact that her injuries were relatively minor actually enhances the importance of the case. Had she been killed or had she been obliged to undergo long and expensive hospital treatment, the Government's liability under the new law might have been considered certain.

As matters stand, Mrs. Jacobs was loathe to file a claim, at least for more than doctor's fees, but was persuaded to act, in addition, compensation for time lost as a result of the injury.

So new was the procedure involved that the county, state and federal departments were in a quandary about which forms should be filed out and where they were to be filed.

The first word that George Elworthy, coordinator of the Grosse Pointe OGD area, had of the liability program, came in a letter from Capt. Don Leonard, state director, written Feb. 24. The state officer asked that preliminary injury reports be presented not only of current cases but also of past cases under which compensation might be due.

Injury Reported

Mrs. Jacob's injury was immediately reported. Many questions both here and at the state and federal agencies. For example, did Mrs. Jacob have a social security number? She did not. Therefore, one would have to be assigned to her or the claim would have to be handled through some other agency than the Social Security Administration.

At length the claim has presumably reached the right channel. When a decision has been reached, Grosse Pointe may become known as the point of origin for a claim which will serve as a precedent in scores of similar compensation cases.

### Pointe Buys \$1,300,000 of War Bonds

School Children Responsible for Sales of More Than \$100,000; Workers Needed

Up to Tuesday night the total bond subscriptions for the Grosse Pointe area were approximately \$1,300,000. Of the amount \$100,000 had been raised by the school children in public, parochial and private schools combined.

The quota for the public schools alone for the year is \$25,000 and there seems to be little doubt but that they will easily meet or exceed their quota, as it is reported that a large portion has come from them.

There is need for about 400 canvassers, or "Gallants" as they are called but thus far hardly half of this number have been enrolled.

The women of the A.M.V.S. earnestly ask that patriotic men and women who have some spare time, shall report to the headquarters at 17027 Kercheval and enroll. It is one of the most worthwhile forms of war service that is presented to the people here at home.

A new ruling by the Treasury Department in connection with the bond drive stipulates that wherever any community raises enough money in the drive to equal the cost of a liberty ship, it may select the name for the ship, preferably that of a local hero, and may also receive a hero's rating in combat service.

In addition to this a pledge will be set in the ship commemorating the community which directly raised the money which went into its construction.

Editor's Note: Could such a ship be better named than the U. S. S. Sustain? After the first Pointer killed in the war, Morgan Marsh died at Pearl Harbor.

### Two Narrowly Escape Blaze

Cooley Fire in DeVoy Home Believed Started by Cigarette Smoker

One of the most serious fires that has visited the Farms section in a long time occurred in the fire and burglar alarm building at 4150 W. Water, near the intersection of the water tower, early last Saturday morning.

The Farms fire department received a telephone call at 4:50 p. m. and Chief George Danson was notified at his home five minutes later.

When the firemen arrived the building was a mass of black smoke and flames. A fireman dropped a lit cigarette and the fire spread to a davenport by the fire of several guests who had been there earlier in the day.

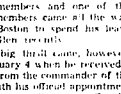
### Farms Stays Within Budget

The Farms village independent total budget in the last fiscal year, which runs from March 1 to March 31, 1943, was \$278,944.

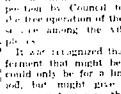

The Farms administration officials, however, seem to have done a pretty good job in village matters and to spend the year in the black.

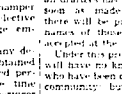

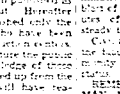

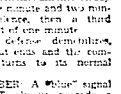

## Progress Shown By Woods Church

The reports of the boards showed a year of very encouraging prosperity, and a substantial sum contributed above the running expenses was added to the Building Fund.

## Students Crowding War Age Urged to Accelerate Studies

In the Grosse Pointe High School there are 161 boys who are or will be 18 before they enter the 12A. This constitutes 31 per cent of the boys on 10B through 12B.

There are also many girls who fall in this age group. Both boys and girls are now being especially urged to attend summer school and to accelerate by taking extra hours each semester. Mr. Walter E. Clumson, principal of the high school, states that "Students, even though they may be in the ninth grade at the present, who know that they will be 18 or over when they graduate should seriously consider attending summer school and also taking extra hours during the winter semester so that they will be able to graduate before they are called into the armed forces. In the case of the girls they are usually needed in all industries, especially typing, and we expect a high percentage of these at summer school."

Men in the service may earn toward graduation 10 hours credit for completion of the 3 week basic military training, and to exceed 20 additional hours credit for courses under the Armed Forces Institute system and specialist courses. Those entering the Army before finishing high school can be given credit for their basic military training, also credit for work taken in correspondence following the Armed Forces Institute program, and also credit for specialist courses in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps. This plan was explained to boys in January and copies of the plan distributed. Copies of this plan may be secured in the high school office. If a boy has enough courses through the plan, it might be possible for him to enter college after the war as a sophomore. Students taking 15 hours work during summer school are required to report for approved study in the afternoon, probably 1:30 to 3:30.

With the increasing number of Government checks that are coming into circulation the police authorities of the country are making a close study of the measures that should be taken to protect the public against their alteration or forgery.

Millions of dependents of the United States Secret Service in its program of education, urging the public to be on guard against the theft and forgery of Government checks. Will you help prevent crime, and at the same time protect yourself from hardships and losses?

Here's how persons receiving Government checks can help: 1. Put a lock on your mailbox if it does not already have one.

2. Print your name clearly on your mailbox. Notify your post-office of change of address if you move.

3. Do NOT endorse your check until you present it for cashing.

4. Try to cash your check in the same place each month.

5. Always present proper identification in cashing checks.

6. Notify issuing agency immediately if checks are not received when due.

Here's how merchants cashing Government checks can help: 1. Insist upon proper identification.

2. Request customer to endorse check in your presence, writing his address as well as his name on check.

3. Check should be initiated by person approving or accepting it, indicating the type of identification presented by the customer.

CAT TALES

For generations, people have been writing about cats. Of cats, who are frequently depicted as less intelligent than dogs. The fact that they are so intelligent and play dead on command, is a mystery to those who know them.

Dear Fryer— You have had a lot in your catology column about the cute little tittle and ways of our cat friends, but it has brought to my mind an incident at which I was a front seat witness, with which I believe the innale courage and lightning speed with which Sir Feline acts in his really serious moments.

Some years ago I had an errand at a copper camp in Cochise County, Arizona. At the company store where the Mexican laborers at the mine got their Chili Pie Queens and other delishious seasonal condiments which, miraculously, do not burn out the heart of your true Latin as they would that of an Anglo-Saxon, they had an enormous Maltese cat. He was a real beauty, one of the largest and most heroic specimens of the tribe I have ever seen. I became quite attached to him and he seemed to reciprocate.

Harry Alexander, the superintendent of the mine, told me that the camp was built across what had evidently been for ages a narrow runway or skidway for the big grey mountain ratters which habitually came down that gully in the summer from the higher levels of the Paradise mountains to the lower levels of the mine.

In fact Alexander told me, he had personally killed thirty snakes within the enclosure of the mine in the single month of August of the year before.

This did not add any to the peace of mind of the casual idler who had already contracted the habit of looking under his coat each night before retiring, nor whether any rattlesnakes, gila monsters, scorpions, loads on scorpions, flies, day when the heavily copper screened door might have been momentarily open.

Well, to get to the cat story. One day Alexander and I were walking about the camp, which contained a dozen or more low-dome brick buildings, about 12x20 ft. all of the same size and placed end to end, with a space of about six feet between buildings, around three sides of a quadrangle.

Suddenly my heart stopped beating as I before me reined a big arm with a warning to keep quiet. Pointing with his finger to a point between the Office and the dining room buildings, and not more than fifteen feet from where we stood, I saw something I will never forget.

Mr. Tommy, flattened close to the ground and tense, was approaching a big rattler not more than four feet from his whiskers. We watched the tableau for possibly ten or fifteen seconds. Suddenly we were both conscious of some kind of movement, but the next instant Tommy had that rattler by his neck, medially behind his head and with an overhand.

Then followed the most violent convulsions and tumbling about I have ever seen. The snake was a powerful reptile and tossed Tommy around like a football. But Tommy never relaxed his original hold for a split second. He just attached to his business in hand which was to keep chewing industriously on the snake.

In a surprisingly short time Tommy had served the spinal cord and the snake was dead. Rattle snakes are more easily killed than most any other of the snake family, but the sheer courage of that magnificent tomcat and his knowledge of just where to grab the instant which told him to never let loose impressed me greatly. He was a natural born killer and skilled at his job.

But the most impressive part of his whole performance to me was the fact that he did it so quickly and so easily.

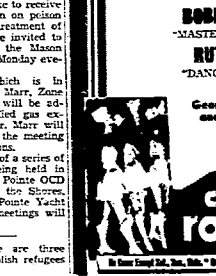

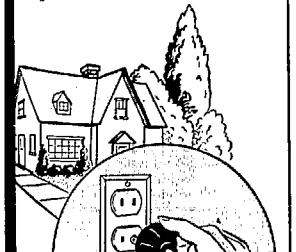

### How to save war power in your own home

There is no shortage of electricity in this area. But waste power turns the wheels in thousands of war power producing plants and tanks and guns. Here is WAR POWER and should not be wasted. Here are a few simple rules for saving electricity in your own home:



1. Use an electric range, use the *waterless* cooking method wherever possible. (Half-cup is a full quart of water.) Plan thrifty even meals: Cooking a whole meal at one time is economical and saves time. Use the new "meat-extender" recipes are tasty even after the food has reached the steaming point. Use the same care with your other electric appliances. Don't leave them turned on and they go away and get them (your electric iron or toaster, for example) disconnect the plug when they are temporarily not in use. Clark, District Director of the War Manpower Commission, issued an order declaring essential the cleaning, pressing and repairing of personal wearing apparel (including uniforms) and household linens. Usually dry cleaned, along with the collection, storage and delivery of such apparel and fabrics when directly connected with cleaning, pressing, repairing, etc.

The War Manpower Commission has ordered that the following services be eliminated as a definite means of conserving manpower. They are:

**Services Eliminated**  
1. Cleaning and repairing of men's and women's hats and heavy shoes.  
2. Cleaning and renovating of pillow cases.  
3. Cleaning, pressing and repairing of toys.  
4. Cleaning of pocketbooks.  
5. Cleaning of shoes and slippers.  
6. Cleaning, shining and re-polishing of dress and household shoes.  
7. Cleaning, pressing and restitching of men's and women's hats and shoes.  
8. Cleaning of gloves.  
9. Cleaning of men's white shirts.  
10. Cleaning of washable neckties.  
11. Dyeing of all garments.  
12. The use of labor in removing or reinserting of window shades, bottom buttons, buckles and fasteners, and in the re-stitching of garments. (The same must be re-stitched before the garments are accepted for cleaning, pressing, repairing, etc.)
