War Declared On Wild Life By Gardeners

The Conservation Department has delegated two police officers to hunt down violators of the law. The Victory Garden officials are giving attention to possible depredations that may be caused in the gardens, pheasants and other forms of wild life that are numerously represented in the Pointe. Because the people of the area are fond of these small creatures they are well protected and have consequently increased in number. It is feared that they present a serious menace to the gardens, when they are expected to play a part in the country's food supply.

Will Delegate Two
The matter has been taken up by City Clerk Neff, who is acting in the war garden movement with the State Department Conservation. Everett E. Tuck, supervisor of District No. 17 of the State Conservation Department, stationed in Detroit, has agreed to authorize two of the officers from Grosse Pointe who will be on call if complaints are received in regard to depredations of gardeners by pheasants, etc., and will have authority to shoot them. Private game will not have the same status as these creatures even on their own property. Any game so killed must be turned over to the nearest agency of the State Conservation Department.

Will Turn Hostiles
It is understood when such complaints are received the officers will be notified by the State Department of the properties in the very busy hours when they are most likely to see the rabbits or pheasants in the Pointe area there is much complaint of the destructive activities of the pheasants as well as the rabbits. They will be through whole rows of vegetation as it first appears above ground and pull them up like weeds to get the rabbits out. (Continued on Page 5)

Request to Enlarge War Plant Produces Storm of Protest from Residents

The Vanco Machine and Engineering company made application the other day to the Park Village for a permit to construct an addition to its plant at Charlevoix and Maryland. The request was granted by the Park Village, but it is being protested by the residents of the neighborhood who are objecting to the extension by the neighbors. Soon thereafter the manager planned to hear a lot of objection. At the Commission meeting Monday night a delegation of residents in the neighborhood who live along Maryland south of Charlevoix were present to voice their protests. These protests were from regret at taking an apparently unpatriotic stand against the war effort, and the industry engaged in work to violent opposition to the project.

Two Miraculously Escape Death In Serious Collision on Charlevoix. Schwartz was driving north on Cadieux and failed to stop for Charlevoix. Schwartz' car was demolished and great damage was done to that of Mrs. Ledwick. The police stated it was little less than miraculous that both persons were not killed but they were taken to the Cottage hospital it was found that aside from some severe bruising and shock neither suffered serious injury. They were both discharged from the hospital at 8 o'clock that evening. The accident was first reported to have occurred in the Park bus, when the police reported there it was discovered to have happened in the city and the case turned over to the City police. Detective Louwers took three pictures, which will be used in the future to identify the driver that Schwartz will be prosecuted.

Heretofore the various flotillas which have made up the Coast Guard Reserve's patrol equipment have been composed of a heterogeneous collection of power boats of every conceivable power, speed and description. They have been actually owned and their owners have made a patriotic contribution to the war effort by lending them for this important work. The only recompense they have received has been a not too generous allowance for gas and oil.

Schools Make Particularly Fine Showing

Many Returns Still to Be Made, Fostering Hope Quota Will Be Reached. As the bond campaign swung into the home stretch in the middle of the week, Kenneth L. Moore, chairman for Grosse Pointe, announced the following figures as of Wednesday noon, April 23—Grosse Pointe Park—\$311,000 (inclusive of \$10,000 purchased by the Village Sinking Fund). Grosse Pointe City—approximately \$100,000 (practically no returns from the City when these figures were submitted). Grosse Pointe Farms—\$107,450 (almost a half million of this came from two large subscriptions). Grosse Pointe Shores—\$157,000 (one very large subscription also figured in this total). Grosse Pointe Woods—\$118,175. Public Schools—\$192,000. Private and Parochial Schools—\$58,000. Board of Education and Teachers—\$100,000. Total—\$2,022,425. Chairman Moore expects this figure to be materially increased as the returns from the campaign approach.

Many More Needed by Russian Doctors, Nurses; Jewelers Making Repairs Free

Over five hundred watches have already been sent in to Russian War Relief headquarters and this does not count many more deposited with jewelers throughout the city," said Wendell C. Goodard, Chairman of the Watches for Russia Committee.

Residents of the Detroit area are giving liberally of their time and resources in response to the request by Doctors and Nurses of the Soviet army who are now forced to work without watches because of the almost universal conversion of Russian factories to war production.

The others have been converted to war production. . . watch makers are working on precision parts for fighting equipment. . . thus, a great shortage of watches has developed in Russia, watches needed urgently by thousands of Soviet army doctors and nurses. Jewelers are authorized to accept Watches for Russia. They will give a receipt to each donor, make minor repairs, and handle shipment to headquarters. Or watches may be left at Russian War Relief headquarters, 2208 Penobscot Building.

Shrimp, Egg and Mushrooms
Rice Potatoes or Boiled Rice

1 can shrimp (1 c.)
2 hard-cooked eggs
2 bread-crumbs
1/2 mushrooms, sliced

Chop shrimp, hard-cooked eggs and slice; slice mushrooms and saute in 2 tablespoons margarine. Combine ingredients in greased baking dish. Prepare cream sauce, using 2 tablespoons margarine or poultry fat, 3 tablespoons flour and 1/2 cups milk. Pour into dish, sprinkle bread or cereal crumbs and grated cheese over top and bake moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) until heated through and nicely browned about 30 minutes. Serve 4 or 5.

In putting forth every effort to enroll 500 new members for the Seeing Eye in Detroit this year, emphasis was placed by Mrs. Beatty on the part the school is playing in the war effort. In addition to its continuing program to supply Seeing Eye guides without charge to eligible members of the armed forces who may be called into active service, the Seeing Eye graduates may be placed in over 21 different war jobs and services. Taking these places in defense plants and volunteer war services, these graduates are releasing qualified persons for essential work elsewhere. At present over 750 Seeing Eye dogs are guiding blind men and women to work, to schools or colleges or about the home. Mrs. Beatty stated they may be found throughout the 48 states and Canada.

Ellsworth Smith told of his experiences during the five and a half years since his return with the Seeing Eye from the Barrington, N. J. school where he had worked for a month with his dog at Seeing Eye headquarters. He stressed the independence which blind men and women enjoy with the aid of an educated dog guide, and told of extensive travel throughout the United States which he has negotiated safely with the help of "Tello."
