Victory Garden Information

By PAUL R. KRONE... Chief of the War Relocation Authority. Another reason for planting more fruits and vegetables is that it is possible in Victory Gardens to eat fresh, but to can or preserve. The fact that the removal of all but two or three inside leaves should be removed before planting.

The flower stems usually should be removed as they appear. New plants from runners should be kept 4 to 6 inches apart. The best results are obtained by fully every 10 days, and care should be exercised not to injure the roots by cultivating too deeply.

A mulch of straw 3 to 4 inches deep should be applied after the first harvest (exclusive of pot and berries) should be removed as soon as growth starts in the spring. Every 10 to 15 days, and care should be exercised not to injure the roots by cultivating too deeply.

Blackouts (Continued from Page 1)... A traffic permit is required to move during the night. Street lights and traffic signals are permitted during the night. The permit holder may be allowed to use a light during the night to go to a local business.

Further on the instructions say: "It should be clearly understood, and the public so advised, that it is not necessary to plant a Victory Garden in a moderately fertile, well drained soil. They are a sandy or gravelly loam that has been well enriched with manure or some other form of organic matter. When the soil is being prepared for planting you should apply about 5 pounds of the 3-8-7 fertilizer—available to Victory Gardeners—per 100 feet of row.

Plow or spade deeply, and remove all white grubs that you can find. Pick up any work the soil. You'll be wise not to plant on a piece of quick grass sod, not only because this sod will harbor a lot of these grubs, but also you'll experience much difficulty in controlling the weeds.

Buy your plants from a reliable nurseryman or take them from a vigorous young fruiting plant. Select medium sized crowns with large, light colored healthy roots.

The plants can be planted in one of three ways. One, they may be placed in matted rows, with the rows spaced 3 to 4 feet apart and plants spaced 10-12 inches in the rows. The runners are then allowed to form a mat 15-18 inches wide. Two, they may be set in hills, with the rows 2 1/2 feet apart and the plants 12-18 inches apart in the rows. In this system, the runners are not allowed to develop. Three, they may be set in a hedge row system, with three feet between the rows and the plant 24 inches apart in the rows. The plants then are allowed to

Under no circumstances shall emergency vehicles be operated with lights on. At 10:15 the Second Blue signal will sound for two minutes marking the ending of the "Air Raid Period." During this period, which continues to 10:25, all Defense forces will remain mobilized. Traffic may resume movement. The Air Clear (WHITE) signal sounds marking the end of the Blackout at 10:25 o'clock.

Certain lights are not to be extinguished at any period of the Blackout. These are: (a) Railroad gate lights. (b) Railroad train lights necessary for operation. (c) Railroad signal lights on right-of-way. (d) Airway Beacon lights. (e) Airway obstruction lights. (f) Radio tower lights. (g) Weather station lights and boat lights. (h) Highway barricade lights. (i) Public works and utilities lights on excavations. (j) Public works and utilities facilities as are or may be employed by the Military Command of the U. S. Citizens Defense Corps of Michigan.
