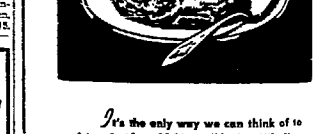

THE COTTAGE WITHIN A SHOP has the whole Pointe talking. One of the most unusual art centers in America has been created right here in Grosse Pointe.

Joseph de Grimme, who established his business here just two years ago, has completely remodeled his salon on Kercheval avenue in the Punch and Judy block and the transformation has attracted art lovers from far and wide.

Long known for the quality of his paintings, etchings and objects d'art, Joseph de Grimme has now furnished them with a worthy setting.

Individual booths, lined with velvet draperies, take up one side of the spacious salon, and in these some of his outstanding paintings are hung where they can be seen to best advantage under special lighting.

Attractive counters display many rare and magnificent art objects on the other side of the wide center aisle.

This delightful little cottage has been copied faithfully in every detail. There is even a second floor window, gay with flower box and overhead lamp.

The furniture inside was the property of Mr. de Grimme in his own chateau in the mountains outside of Vienna, whence he came right after Corporal Schickelgruber took over his former home.

Gleaming copper cooking utensils and bright floral paintings are hung on the walls. The knotty pine furniture, pottery

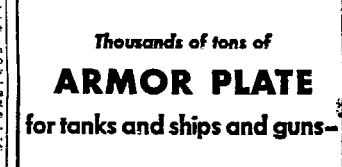

each year, including this year, to keep up a schedule to meet the need when due. Next

year, for the first time, it will be necessary to supplement this yield by appropriations from the current tax levy, due to decreased returns in interest rates from investments. We have usually concluded our year with a substantial reserve to

place in our Capital Improvement Fund to meet part of the cost of necessary plant expansion and alterations that arises currently in a growing community. This year two factors have brought about a temporary postponement of adding to that reserve. Building and maintenance

Letter was Acknowledged

He says that obviously the council has no faith in his ability to run the departments, and that he is tired of being shackled and having the department's morale weakened by the lack of cooperation he has received.

Largely through his efforts, the City of Grosse Pointe won the National Safety Award for pedestrian protection. Considerable friction

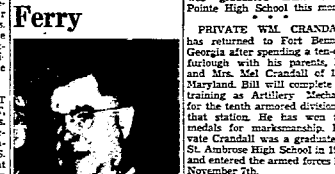
