Rank Savagery

To say that the rioting and mob rule that selzed on Detroit Sunday night and all day Monday was un-American is putting it altogether too mildly. It was uncivilized and rank savager.

The first problem that confronted the authorities was the suppression of mass lawlessness, and in this the Detroit police were having a difficult job, although they battled loyally and bravely.

The arrival of Federal troops just before midnight Monday stopped this phase of lawlessness like a stone wall. Whether there has been any permanent suppression of this tendency time alone can answer.

It is purposeless to go into any detailed discussion of the origin and underlying causes of this outbreak at this time; these are already well known to everybody in the Detroit area.

It is better to face this issue at once for just what it is it was race rioting, pure and simple, in which lawless ele-ments among both negroes and whites seized upon the ex-cuse to indulge their latent instincts for pillage and killing.

This is something that must be stopped and will be stopped if it is necessary to shoot every mob leader in the Detroit area before it is finished business.

Threatened Deluge

The discontent with the administration of our internal The discontent with the administration of our internal wartime economy has recently been swelling into a mighty roar of criticism. The more favorable turn that has come in our military operations has largely banished the panic which laid over the whole nation in the earliest months of the war and has released the attention of the people from the perilous scues of the moment for a closer examination of what is going on at home. They don't like what they see and there is a fast growing disposition to lay the whole mess of domestic confusion right on the doorstep of the President himself.

So far has the control of the internal war economy got
out of hand that it is rapidly breaking down the political
alignment in the Congress, although this in itself is no great
misfortume. Much of the present trouble stems from the
false setup of the Office of Price Administration.

This scheme never had a Chinaman's chance from its birth. It was set to making bricks without straw. The failure of the Administration, with its eye ever on the political thermometer, as it still is, to make adequate provision to control the price of labor, which enters into the price of everything else, and the price of foodstuffs at their source, was like taking two of the legs from under a three legged stoll and expecting it to remain unright.

This situation in turn went still further back to the days when the first erop of planners were killings little pigs and briting farmers not to plant creps and making loans to cotton growers far beyond the world market price of cotton. And by way of sowing more dragon's teeth the administration gave employment, at public expense, to millions of persons in plony jobs, just to take competition away from the tight in group, known as union labor, so that it might continue was a sun on the content of the property of the content of the property of the content of the property high wages.

But all this was so far back in the dim past, all of seve to nine years ago, as to have become completely forgotten the haze and hurly burly of the present anxious moment.

Food is and always has been and always will be the very keystone in the arch of our national economy. If inflation, which seems so imminent, comes roaring down upon us in an uncontrolled flood it will come direct through the food sluiceway. People can go naked and they can walk but they they cannot go without food which is available at prices for which they have the money to pay. This us the first threat to scotch.

Chester Davis, National Food Administrator, whose record in the picture is about so clear-headed as any man we have had playing about the food lot, says the only thing to do is to clothe some one person with enough real authority to handle this food problem in all its angles and subdivisions.

One thing that gives the people of this country such short tempers in viewing the management of our internal affairs in war time is the immeasurably wiser manner in which the people of Great Britain, with infinitely less resources and vestly greater relative responsibility, have handled theirs. And all the people in the Detroit area need do to obtain a clearer view of the picture of san guidance of war time conomy, is to look just across the river.




